BURIED TODAY.—The burial of the late William Mahar took place this morning. The funeral procession was headed by the City Band, then followed members of the City Fire Brigade, members of the Benevolent Irish Society, and a large number of citizens. The fire bell was tolled during the time that the procession passed through the streets.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT AT CRAFORD.—Mr. JESSE CROSSMAN, of Craford, had his hand cut off this morning and his arm terribly lacerated from the elbow down, while sawing wood. The machinery driving the saw was operated by horse power, and while Mr. Crossman was removing a log, his arm came in contact with the saw with the result as above stated. The injury sustained is of a most painful nature. The arm will have to be amputated at the elbow.

PRIZE AWARDED.—By a letter to the Judge Deputy of Charlottetown Lodge, I. O. G. T., we learn that a fine life-size photo of Dr. D. H. Mann, of New York, Right Worthy Grand Templar of the order, has been presented to the lodge. Two prizes were offered for the largest increase in membership during the past two quarters. Refuge Lodge, Montague, gained first prize with 60 members and Charlottetown second with 24.

POLICE COURT.—One drunk, Martin Smith, was fined \$2 or 10 days for drunkenness.

Edward Cullen, a lad arrested to give evidence in a Scott Act prosecution against Richard Collins, remains in custody until tomorrow morning.

Five Scott Act cases will occupy the Magistrate's attention to-morrow. Sixty-two cases were heard and disposed of at the Police Court for the month ending today. For violating the Canada Temperance Act there were 13 convictions and 4 dismissals. For drunkenness there were 15 convictions. For malicious injury to property there were 4 convictions; disorderly driving, 2 convictions; larceny, 2 convictions; nuisance, 3 convictions; interfering with police, 1 conviction; disturbing religious worship, 1 conviction; assault, 3 convictions and 2 dismissals, and 2 offenders were sent to the Supreme Court for trial.

Amid the excitement attending the eastern question the affairs of the Transvaal have been almost lost sight of. Recent events seem likely to bring them to the front with a jerk. The treaty made between the Transvaal and the Orange Free State for offensive and defensive purposes, followed up by the suppression of The Johannesburg Star, the leading English journal of the Rand, for its criticisms of the Boer Government, seem to suggest a disposition on the part of President Kruger to assume an offensive, if not an aggressive, attitude. The suppression of a newspaper for freedom of speech is an act of intolerance on the part of the Boer Government that will be regarded by many as a justification of the severe things that have been said of the system of government that obtains at Pretoria, the Transvaal capital, and it will create a sympathy with the English-speaking people of Johannesburg that will make it difficult to avoid a decisive step of some kind by the Imperial Government.

The Abegweits worked hard, but on account of the good defence of Summerside were unable to score. AN EMERGENCY MEETING OF THE SUMMERSIDE LIBERAL CLUB.

There was an emergency meeting of the Liberal Club held late in the evening. No resolutions were considered before, and as the interest of our party was greatly advanced by the report of the late meeting, I deem it my duty from a party point of view to give the public a summary of the proceedings of the last one.

As soon as a goodly number of members made their appearance, the President announced the subject for discussion and settlement.

Mr. President.—I have called you together on this occasion to advise you of the vacancy of the office of Inspector of the Light House contract. As you are aware, no success has attended me to resign. I believe in the policy of the Liberal Party in governing the country by commissions; but when they propose to pay me for my labor, care, and great skill, and attention as Inspector by a tendering commission, on an Inspector by tendering commission, I am done with Government jobs. What is a government for if not to give lucrative positions to their friends? As I know that several of you are more than anxious to see me in the office, I will be glad to replace me as Inspector. It is for you to fill this vacancy, and the only stipulation I insist on is that my acceptance shall be a staunch Protest.

On resuming his seat Mr. Moral mounted the rostrum.

Mr. Moral.—I am willing to take the job and my qualifications warrant it. I can meet the approval of the President. I am a true Liberal in all my services and influence are eagerly sought after by the Conservative party. With one exception I have loyally supported the Liberal party by my vote and influence. This exception was occasioned by the very liberal allowance made me on the eve of an election, by both of the great parties. Having been amply provided for by either, no blame can attach to me for this many course. A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush, was an old adage in my firm's belief at one time, and I should believe in this spurious wisdom. At the election referred to, when I maintained a position of neutrality I had two birds in the hand,—fat ones at that; but both took flight. My house was forcibly entered, my person brutally assaulted, my furniture almost destroyed, and my person shamelessly despoiled of the pecuniary inducements freely given me by both parties. I should be entitled to some consideration for the (I must say) ruinous treatment towards me at that occasion. My business as a carpenter is no longer profitable. George has taken my safe and business is at a low ebb. But I don't blame George for that. Considering my antecedents and ability I claim that I am entitled to this position.

The next to address the club was Mr. Weak-Ham.—I also am an applicant for the cast-off clothes of the President and I consider myself better qualified and politically more deserving than the man who has just resumed his seat. I person who has just levies contributions from both parties unworthy of attention at the hands of the Great Liberal party. Such conduct is not honest, and I would scorn anyone guilty of such a despicable behaviour. My principle has always been: get the stuff, and then deliver the goods according to contract. We should frown on dishonesty in this, and daily reward it as it is. I am not a Protestant, but I am subject to conviction; and, if this qualification is indispensable, I am quite willing to become one on the shortest notice.

This speech disturbed the feelings of many of the members present, assuming that it was a covert attack upon a majority of the club.

In the cause of honesty and morality, the Deacon appeared upon the scene. The Deacon.—I am opposed to corruption at elections. No man should sell his vote for filthy lucre. He should vote on principle for the maintenance of the Liberal Party and the Protestant faith.

This speech instead of calming the agitated members, greatly aroused their ire; and Mr. Moral rose to speak.

Mr. Moral.—According to the President and the Deacon, none but Protestants need apply for office. This attitude is taken, no doubt, to shut me out from getting the Brazil place that was promised me. No doubt Mac, the Tailor, could qualify for the place, as he can sit the Boyne Water standing on his head. Just wait until the Pope's man comes along. He will lead the fanatics of the club another dance. It is disgusting to hear the Deacon and the President reflecting on the members of this club who may have received a small remuneration for their votes. I would like to ask what has been their own conduct? Is it pure and undefiled? Some of us may have taken a few dollars in exchange for our votes, thereby following the example of Mr. Mac's "business is business" friend; but they go for higher game. Their considerations are good fat offices. Out on such hypocrisy! I deal in spot cash on a small scale, but they do an immense business in futures. I note that the conduct of Mr. Moral is to be commended on business and equitable grounds.

This motion was seconded in an able speech by Mr. Jelash. In spite of the frantic efforts of the President and Deacon the motion was carried by a two-thirds vote. The meeting dispersed in disorder.
