## Flames Engulf Home; Woman Hospitalized

**TIGNISH**—One woman is hospitalized as a result of burns she received when her home was burned at North, three miles north of here Saturday evening. The fire destroyed the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Hackett, sending Mrs. Hackett to the Western Hospital suffering from burns and shock.

Her young son suffered burns on his face and neck when his sister, Wilma McHugh received burns on her legs. After treatment both were allowed to leave the hospital.

Mr. Hackett was in Halifax where he is employed. The fire is believed to have started when a bottle of naphtha, used for filling a gas lamp, exploded when it was dropped on the floor.

The Tignish fire department found the blaze out of control when it arrived on the scene.

## India Rejects Proposal To Avoid Fighting Zone

**NEW DELHI (AP)**—India has rejected a Communist Chinese proposal that Indian forces stay out of Himalayan areas evacuated by Communist troops after the Nov. 22 cease-fire in the India-China border conflict, the foreign ministry reported.

The Red Chinese proposal was made in a letter from Premier Chou En-lai to Prime Minister Nehru Dec. 20. The proposal, a and Nehru's reply dated Jan. 1 were made public by the foreign ministry.

Nehru wrote that by repeating the old arguments they should "explore what other possibilities are available to avoid the development of further conflict." He referred to the proposals of the six non-aligned nations that met last month in Colombo.

Nehru also referred to his own suggestion in the Indian parliament that the dispute be referred "for a decision on its merits" to the International Court of Justice at The Hague.

To stabilize the cease-fire, Chou had proposed that the Chinese withdraw the "Indian troops should stay in their present positions along the entire Chinese-Indian border" pending agreement on the disengagement of forces.

**REJECTS PLAN**  
 Nehru called this "the only new suggestion in your present letter." He termed it worse than the previous Chinese proposals because, Nehru said, it "seeks to exclude Indian armed forces from the entire area of Indian territory subjected to this latest aggression since Sept. 8, 1962, that is, from Indian territory... in the western sector."

The Chinese are holding fast in the eastern area of the border but are withdrawing from northeast India. So far Indian troops have not re-occupied the northeast.

They have also been hanging back to avoid giving the Chinese any provocation that might bring renewed fighting.

## U.S. Increase In Steel Output Is Predicted

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—Steel Magazine says it expects a 10-percent increase in steel production in the first quarter in spite of seasonal cutbacks by some of the industry's biggest customers.

Demand from automakers, railroad suppliers, farm equipment manufacturers, and machinery builders should be more than offset seasonal downward trends in structural fabricating, and building of oil production and pipeline construction, the metalworking weekly says.

"Although consumption may be a little lower than it was in the fourth quarter, demand for new steel will be greater. Reason: Users have done about all the inventory cutting they can do. Buyers who dipped into stockpiles to meet some of their needs in the fourth quarter must now order as much steel as they plan to consume."

As a result, the magazine adds, first-quarter ingot production will be close to 28,000,000 tons, or 2,700,000 in the quarter just ended.

This month's output will be about 8,000,000, Steel estimates an increase of 400,000 tons over December. Production in the week ending Jan. 19 will be about the same as the 12,000 tons the magazine estimates the industry poured last week.

"Steelmakers who expected the year to start with a bang are disappointed with the market's sluggishness but are still confident of eventual improvement," Steel says. "If steelmen are optimistic in the face of the market's sluggishness, it's because their best customers are doing so well."

## New York Stock Market Posts 4th Straight Weekly Advance

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The stock market last week weathered profit-taking on its prolonged advance so well that it posted its fourth straight weekly advance.

The Dow Jones industrial average ended the week with a gain of 9.37 at 67.93. This indicator had rolled up a total advance of 102.58 since the feathered lows of the Cuban crisis last Oct. 26.

Many on Wall Street had looked for a decline during what was generally conceded to be one of the greatest recovery moves in Wall Street history. It was obvious that many traders were selling to make good their profits, but as prices softened there were always others to pick up stock.

As the market advanced, the market had strung together nine straight sessions in which more to the heavy trading declined, even though on two of those sessions losses by key stocks might have led to a decline to popular market averages.

Trading was active, volume reaching 23,896,153 shares, compared with 17,934,486 for the four-day trading week preceding. It was the heaviest turnover for a five-day trading week since the week ended Dec. 8, when 29,901,000 shares changed hands.

**AVERAGE CLIMBS**  
 The Associated Press average of 49 stocks advanced 2.6 to 252.0.

Tuesday brought the week's biggest rally, paced by motors, General Motors, Ford, Chrysler, and American Motors all touched new highs for the year. General Motors making a high of 50.

Profiting again was dominant on Wednesday, but the underpinning of the market were too strong that, although average fell, a more stock advanced and declined in the list as a whole.

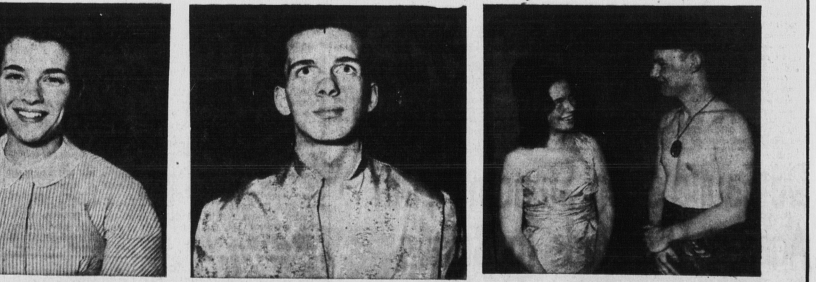

**TIGNISH**—Very Rev. J.M. Rooney, parish priest at St. Simon and St. Jude's Roman Catholic Church, Tignish, will celebrate 40 years in the priesthood today.

Born in Iona, P.E.I., on Nov. 14, 1888, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Rooney, he attended St. Dunstan's College and the Grand Seminary of Quebec, and was ordained to the priesthood Jan. 14, 1923, in his home church at Iona by the late Most Rev. Henry J. O'Leary, D.D.
