**World of Tomorrow Is Peaceful Place**

NEW YORK, July 6.—The world of tomorrow, take it from the police and hospital authorities, is a peaceful sort of place where nothing ever happens in the way of crime, and illness is practically unknown.

Although 12,000,000 persons have passed through the New York World's Fair gates since the April 8 opening, only five have been arrested and only 37 have required hospital treatment.

The arrests, said Chief Inspector Richard Sheridan of the fair police were all for misdemeanors, such as those of the uninformed gentlemen who stripped and went swimming in a fountain pool at 3 a. m., and the high flyer who clambered up the parachute-jumping tower after the closing hour, got scared, and had to be helped down.

None of the arrests has been for drunkenness, however, and if there are any, "we intend to sober 'em up," remarked the chief.

**Canadian Corps Plan Rejected By Government**

OTTAWA, July 6.—(CP)—Heavy cost and the regimentation involved were two of the grounds on which the Dominion Government declined the Canadian Corps Association's plan of vocational camps for 50,000 unemployed youths, labor minister Rogers said tonight.

In a statement outlining the Government's reasons for not accepting the plan, Mr. Rogers said it had been studied carefully and seriously but its cost—calculated at about \$50,000,000 yearly—made it "almost prohibitive." The plan would place the youths in 10 such camps for two years.

The labor minister noted that labor and youth organizations in Canada had declared themselves definitely opposed to the plan. "It involves a degree of regimentation and a type of institutional life not in keeping with Canadian traditions," he said.

The people of Canada have not yet shown their willingness to submit to "employment for all at the price of regimentation." It was also felt undesirable to remove young men from normal contacts for two years.

While the Canadian Corps Association suggested that part of the cost might be defrayed by production in the camps of useful commodities, the Government considers that "inevitably employment of such a large number of men on the manufacture of commodities now supplied by private industry would cause disturbance and dislocation." It would cause additional unemployment because of private industry's inability to retain normal staffs of workers.

Wages and conditions provided in the plan also would prove attractive to men now working on Canadian farms, the minister said, and the result would be to denude the farms already understaffed of young men.

The plan would set up in camp centres vocational facilities duplicating existing facilities. From the standpoint of placement, too, it would be a great disadvantage to have vocational training concentrated far from industry itself.

LONDON, July 6.—(CP)—Lieut.-Colonel John A. Herbert, the new Governor of Bengal, was knighted by the King at Buckingham Palace. Later Sir John and Lady Herbert lunched with the King.

**Portable Hog Cabins**  
(Experimental Farms News)

The portable hog cabin is gradually finding a distinct place on nearly every mixed farm where hogs play an important role, states A. H. Colbert, Dominion Experimental Station, Rosthern, Sask. It is convenient, cheap, simple in construction, durable, adaptable, and readily movable from place to place to permit rotation of pasture lots during the summer months. If the sides are hinged so that they open up from the bottom and are supported in line with the eaves, the cabin may also take the place of shade trees in the hottest weather—the pigs will rest in comfort on the floors while gentle breezes play over them.

With the coming of winter, the cabin can be moved to a convenient place near the farm buildings and if the weather is severe the sides and one end banked with straw packed in between the walls and a framework of lumber or wire constructed about eighteen inches away. The entrance end may as a rule be left unbanked.

The house can be constructed at a cost of \$15 to \$25 for materials. If it is desired to paint the building and lengthen its period of usefulness, it would be advisable to use planed boards. Planks should be used for the flooring.

Where feeder hogs are housed in banked colony houses and kept well bedded and dry, very little trouble is generally experienced with either rickets or rheumatism.

At the Experimental Station at Rosthern, tests have proved that the "A" type of cabin is not so suitable and convenient as the colony house with 30 to 36 inch sides and a plank floor. The latter is easier to clean and disinfect, more durable permits better ventilation, and the same floor area gives more ample accommodation for heavy sows.

Farrowing tests have proved that pregnant sows housed in colony houses during winter weather and moved early spring gave stronger and more vigorous litters than sows housed in barns with other live stock.

Plans and specifications for a hog cabin are contained in Circular No. 78, "The All Year Hog Cabin", issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and obtainable on request.
