The well was 47 feet deep and had but little water in it, still the little fellow who is only 7 years old was pulled up without a scratch for a few scratches. His escape was miraculous.

GOOD MARKET FOR HORSES.—The St. John says: A few days ago W. S. McKie, of Charlottetown, took the pure-bred Percheron stallion Duroc and two matched pairs to Bangor. He found no difficulty whatever in selling the latter at good prices, and Duroc was left in Bangor for service during the season. Mr. McKie says there is a fine market in Bangor for driving horses and matched pairs, and intends to bring a carload to the city in a short time.

INTERESTING TRIAL.—On the 29th ult. Mr. Warburton, representing the Attorney-General, attended the Magistrate's Court, Alberton, and watched the case of the Queen at the prosecution of O'Brien vs. Barrett, in a case of suspected arson, growing out of O'Brien's barn being destroyed last fall. A large number of persons were summoned to the Court, and as no convicting evidence was produced—Mr. Warburton advised the justices to dismiss the case.

FOOTBALL.—A large number of college students and others witnessed the match "North of Kent St. vs South of Kent St." at the Park last evening. The North side won the toss, and chose to take advantage of the strong westerly wind. The South side kicked off, and this ball was quickly returned. THE ADDRESS PASSED UNANIMOUSLY
