## UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

### Suggested Plan of War

#### THE EVENT OF HOSTILITIES

to be a Campaign of Surprises by the United States,

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The war with Spain will probably be something like a duel, and in this view of the matter likely to be quickly over and will cost the United States in money a little more than fifty millions. This is, of course, a conservative estimate. It is assumed that the administration will plan for a number of surprises which will not assume, in its actual operation, that its demonstration against Cuba will not be interfered with by a Spanish fleet. It is to intercept and ward off such possible attack by Spain that the United States flying squadron is to go to Porto Rico, while the Key West squadron goes to Cuba, and the United States government in every other way strive to guard against deception and strategy by Spain.

It is present the outlook of the Government is that Cuba will be surrendered by General Blanco under a blockade of the United States fleet and bombardment of the fortifications, if that becomes necessary, while the insurgents are attacking in the rear, and that then, with the assistance of the Powers, Spain will seek an arrangement with the United States by which it will save something from the wreck in the form of its war debt.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

### The Fighting Must Cease

SO SAYS PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Republicans Applaud and Democrats Groan.

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The President's message, immediately after being read, was referred to the Foreign Relations Committee. There was no demonstration in the House, either in approval or disapproval, from crowded galleries throughout its delivery; but there was a sharp burst of applause from the Republican side when, towards the close of the message, the President said that the war in Cuba must cease. At the conclusion of the reading, about half of the Republicans applauded and several of the Democrats groaned.

## CANADA AND THE STATES.

### Convention to be Held.

THE ALASKA BOUNDARY TO BE SETTLED BY ARBITRATION.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, April 12.—Coming negotiations between Canada and United States on trade, fishery and other matters will be held at Ottawa, probably in June. The British and Canadian Plenipotentiaries will be Sir Julian Pauncefote, Sir Richard Cartwright and Sir Louis Davies.

It is understood that the Imperial Government is anxious to see a friendly agreement brought about. If these points now in dispute are settled, the question of the boundary between Alaska and Canada will be submitted to arbitration, and a settlement of it will speedily follow.

#### WAR RISKS.

Underwriters Demanding Higher Rates of Insurance.

The demand for war risks by local exporters and ship owners is active in American cities, marine underwriters reporting many enquiries. There was some advance over the prevailing rates of last week. The rates for American sailing vessels in trade with West Indian ports, or ports on the east coast of South America, were about 5 per cent. American steamers for the same ports taking rates from 1 per cent to 1 1/2 per cent, while 10 per cent. was asked for American sailing vessels trading with the south side of Cuba. The rates for neutral sailing vessels ranged about 1/2 of 1 per cent, while for neutral steamers only about 1-8 of 1 per cent. was demanded.

## THE FUTURE RELATIONS

### Of Spain and the United States

NOW RESTS WITH CONGRESS.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, April 12.—The future of the relations of the United States and Spain now rests with Congress. What course it will pursue cannot be foretold. The Foreign Committees of both Houses now have the subject in their control, and after due deliberation will report to their respective branches what they consider should be the attitude of the United States on the grave question presented. An early action by the committee is expected.

#### PHILIPPINE UPRISING.

Report That Rebels Have Been Subdued.

Hong Kong advices report that the rising of the Colinas in Zambales has been subdued. The troops killed thousands of Indians, including hundreds of women and children.

A rebel meeting in Manila was surprised by civil guards, who killed 11 in the house and took 60 prisoners. All the prisoners were shot the same day without trial. Six of the guards were wounded and two killed. The alarm has subsided.

Zambales is a province of Luzon, the largest of the Philippine Islands on which Manila, the capital, is situated. It is a long and narrow belt, stretching about 90 miles on the west side of the island, between the Bay of Langayen on the north and that of Subic on the South. The nearest point of the province is about 40 miles from Manila. The capital is Iba, and the population is estimated at 94,000.

#### "PAUL THE CRIPPLE."

The Dramatic Club of St. Dunstan's College last evening presented "Paul the Cripple" to an audience which filled the Opera House. The drama consists of three acts with prologue, and has an interesting plot. It is much too wordy however, and some of the scenes would be materially improved by a judicious application of the pruning knife.

The part of "Paul" was taken in a natural and sympathetic manner by Master Clifford Cox, and his imperfection throughout was very clever for a lad of his years. Mr. J. H. Macdonald played the part of "Anthony," the cruel brother of "Paul," and did it very well. But the infusion of a little more life into his acting would have made the impersonation more acceptable.

Mr. J. J. MacGowan, who impersonated "Nicklas," was one of the best characters in the cast. His make-up as the beggar was excellent and his rendering of the part sympathetic. Mr. Lynch as "Linus," the servant, was also well made up, and he made the most of a small part. But the causes which led to the restoration of his sight towards the end of the play were not made apparent to the audience.

Mr. Ryan as "Urban," the leader of the bandits, was sanguinary-looking enough for anything, and performed his part very well indeed. He was ably supported by Messrs. Tobin and Foran.

The parts of "Count Felix" and "Philip" were creditably taken by Messrs. P. F. Doyle and P. G. O'Neill, respectively.

The other characters in the play were made the most of, and the presentation, on the whole, was very good, many of the performers receiving well-merited applause. But, as has already been pointed out, the play is too wordy and would have been improved by the cutting down of some of the scenes. The stage settings, too, might have been better.

Between the acts of the drama Miss Hyndman sang two solos with skill and in a sympathetic manner and was presented with floral tributes by some of her admirers in the audience. Miss Maisie Coady also danced the tambourine dance very skillfully, and was rewarded with rounds of applause.

The performance was in aid of the new Cathedral fund, and a snug sum must have been realized.
