Cameron Rink Arrives Home

How did Cameron do?—these were the words we heard echoed around the streets of Charlottetown, most frequently, throughout last week, while the Doug Cameron foursome was participating in the Tournament of Champions being held in Toronto's Maple Leaf Garden.

This was the second year for the Tournament of Champions which is an invitational affair promoted by Doug Maxwell. An executive is chosen to invite what they (the executive) consider to be the eight top curling teams from Canada and the United States; so it is quite an honor to even receive an invitation to this tourney.

This was the first major bonspiel that the newly formed Cameron foursome had competed in as they had just formed their rink at the beginning of this season. We had a chat with Doug at a welcome home reception for the local curlers at the Charlottetown Curling Club Sunday evening and he said he was more than pleased with his second place finish in the star-studded bonspiel. Cameron told us that he wouldn't trade the three members of his rink for any three curlers in the Dominion.

The Charlottetown rink picked up \$2,500 in merchandise for capturing second place in the Toronto bonspiel along with the honor of having defeated several of the best in the game, including the Ernie Richardson rink which has more or less dominated the Canadian curling scene for the past few years. The President of the Charlottetown Curling Club, Dr. Clark Gallant, told us that outside of the St. Dunstan's University debating team that Cameron's performance was the best he could recall for an Island team in a Dominion competition such as this. We believe Dr. Gallant is right, but if any of our readers can think of a better showing, by an Island team, in Dominion competition we would appreciate hearing from them.

The Cameron rink includes: Doug Cameron, Allan Smith, George Dillon and Bob Dillon. We would like to offer our sincere congratulations to the local foursome for a fine performance.

The next big attraction on the local curling scene will be staged during the final week of this month. At the Charlottetown club the men's Senior (over 55 years of age) will hold the spotlight and this year's tourney will be on a National basis. The tourney is being sponsored by Seagrams and the winner of the local tourney will be competing in the Seagram National Championship at Port Arthur, Ontario.

While the 'old timers' are battling it out at the Charlottetown club the 'youngsters' will be duelling for the Provincial Schoolboy Championship at the Belvedere Golf and Winter Club. The Schoolboy championship is staged in order to decide the Island's representative in the Canadian Schoolboy Championships to be held in Fredericton, N.B. about mid-February. Club officials expect about 10 teams to be participating in the Provincial championship. This will be the largest entry list ever and should provide some good, exciting curling. The winning team will receive the Pepsi-Cola Trophy emblematic of the championship and the right to enter the national competition.

Will Chuvalo Again Blow His Big Chance

By JERRY GLADMAN Canadian Press Staff Writer George Chuvalo's reputation for blowing his big chances has created a lot of 'scipples' among those who have watched the career of the 37-year-old Canadian heavyweight champion. But the Toronto boxer insists it will be a 'new' Chuvalo who tangles with former world champion Floyd Patterson in New York's Madison Square Garden Feb. 1.

Allowing for the inevitable optimism that blossoms in a training camp, there appears to be more than wishful thinking behind the confidence shared by Chuvalo's handlers. 'This is the new Chuvalo,' says manager Irv Ungerman, a prominent Toronto businessman who rescued Chuvalo from obscurity and helped him on his way to a shot at Patterson. 'George's impressive victory over Doug Jones in New York in October earned him the recognition he deserved years ago.'

Chuvalo moved into the heavyweight title picture with a 14th-round knockout over Jones, previously rated No. 1 contender off November 10 and apparently look tough to nudge out of there. AHL Aces Must Wear Helmets In League Games

NEW YORK (AP) — Professional hockey won't be using its head until it orders all players to wear helmets, insists Bernie Geoffrion. Geoffrion, former National Hockey League player, is the coach of Quebec Aces, whose 16 players recently started to wear head protectors. The Aces, currently leading the Eastern Division of the American League, are the first team in more than three decades to make helmets mandatory. Yvan Cournoyer of Montreal Canadiens, Pit Martin of Detroit Red Wings and Red Kelly and Billy Harris of Toronto Maple Leafs, all forwards, wear helmets regularly in the National League.

The other guys came to me and said they wanted to start wearing helmets,' Geoffrion said. 'Then the whole team started playing with them and I was very happy. Pollock Has A Tough Road In His First Year As GM

By JOE DUPUIS MONTREAL (CP) — One of Sam Pollock's problems is that unless Montreal Canadiens finish first in the National Hockey League this season he'll be at the mercy of the critics. It's his first season as general manager of the team, having succeeded Frank Selke, and last year's first-place finish makes it a tough one to follow. The only way he can improve on the job done by his successor would be to reach the Stanley Cup finals, something Canadiens failed to do last season, and perhaps win the cup. But with the club in the thick of the fight for the top spot in the league, the critics are quiet. Not that Pollock is concerned. 'The only difference about my job now is that I'm responsible for making the final decision. But that doesn't bother me. It's what I want to do.'

When the 38-year-old Pollock was named general manager, he got a job that many thought would go to Kenny Reardon, the former star defenceman. 'I had an idea this job might be open before it was offered to me,' Pollock says. 'You just seem to know those things. But it was still a big surprise getting it.'

EASY CHOICE David Molson, the team's president, admits that the final choice was between Pollock and Reardon but adds that it didn't really give a chance to show what he could do when he turned out years ago with Montreal Royals junior team. He got into coaching in 1947-48 when he took over Montreal Junior Canadiens, and two seasons later, at 25, became the youngest coach of a Memorial Cup winner.

'We can keep a pretty good check on every hockey player in the country in this way; when scoring the goals, who isn't that sort of thing?' Pollock has also been described as a walking encyclopedia, able to dredge up out of his memory the statistical records of players past and present.

But another reason he finds himself with this new responsibility is that he has been grooming himself for a top management position for years. Son of an immigrant Irishman and a Newfoundland-born mother, Pollock never played
