Gleanings From My Common-place Books.

AGES OF BRITISH PRIME MINISTERS.
It was at the age of fifty-five years and four months that Lord Salisbury was summoned by the Queen, in 1885, to be Prime Minister; a fact which the curious may care to note, because it was at exactly the same age that Lord Melbourne was requested by King William IV. to carry on the Government, and consented. It might also be borne in mind that—desperate as the fortunes of his party then appeared—Lord Melbourne contrived to remain at the head of affairs, with a brief interval, for the next seven years. Of living politicians, Mr. Gladstone entered on his first Premiership and his sixtieth year in the same month of December, 1868. Lord Granville was but forty-four years old when asked (in the summer of 1859) to undertake the formation of a Ministry. Lord Hartington attained to the like honor in the course of his forty-seventh year. It may be remarked that no leader of party in the present century has been offered the supreme post in the Government till well past his eighth lustre; and some of the most eminent have had to wait very much longer. Lord Palmerston had turned the point of threescore and ten before he was invited to take the Treasury; and Mr. Disraeli had advanced into his sixty-fourth year when he received a certain command to repair to Osborne, in the spring of 1868. In spite of the start which wealth and rank could give to great abilities, Lord Derby had not been "sent for" till he was fifty-two, and another twelvemonth elapsed ere he could succeed in constructing a Cabinet.

Mr. Gladstone Talks.
ON HOME RULE, THE FISHERIES AND THE SACKVILLE INCIDENT.

Mr. Gladstone arrived at Birmingham on Monday, where he will remain most of the week. The entire city is *en fete* in his honor. On arrival in the city, he was driven to the town hall in a carriage drawn by four horses. A great crowd awaited him, and numerous deputations presented him with addresses. Gladstone in a speech said his addresses fully recognized the fact that the Irish question was really an English-Scottish-Welsh question, and until this question was settled the country could know neither solid peace nor effective progress. He said all efforts to solve the fisheries question with the United States were egregiously failures. The liberals did not wish to increase the difficulty of settling the matter in dispute, but were desirous that by a judicious choice of persons and the suggestion of measures the question would be settled in a manner tending to draw both countries into closer relations. The Sackville incident, he said, was extremely unfortunate. It resulted in the infliction of a serious slight and disparagement upon England. He hoped the matter was susceptible of satisfactory explanation. The incident ought to serve to moderate the little spirit of vaunting and bragging which is in vogue among many Tories.

Sackville Dismissal.
The *Paris Journal Des Debats*, referring to the motives for the dismissal of Lord Sackville, says: "It is permissible to think that these are not very exalted motives which can be admitted without a sense of shame, but then they are very practical motives, and if they were ignored, this Sackville business would be utterly incomprehensible."

The London *Times*, in a long editorial on the presidential contest and the Sackville matter, says: "There is not the slightest reason to retaliate on Minister Phelps, and advises the Government to show deliberation in choosing a successor to Lord Sackville. It adds that the election may involve a change in the government, that the matter is one of perfect indifference to Englishmen, but that March next will be fully time enough to appoint a successor to Sackville."
