

FISHING BOUNTIES.

**Alleged Frauds in P. E. Island.**  
OTTAWA, July 13—(Special)—The Public Accounts Committee began today the investigation of the alleged P. E. Island fishery bounty frauds.

Mr. S. B. Kent of the Department of Fisheries told of the method of distributing the bounties.

Mr. Powell has suggested that Island witnesses be examined at home by officials of the Auditor General's Department to be sent down to the Island.

The Committee has not yet decided upon a course of action in that regard. Steps will be taken to find whether frauds have been practiced as alleged, and if wrong-doing is established it will be searched to the bottom.

**Allen vs. the Steam Navigation Company.** In this case, upon motion of Mr. F. L. Hazard for defendant, a rule nisi for new trial was obtained.

**Lee and wife vs. Simmons.** The rule nisi was upon motion of Mr. Stewart, Q. C., discharged with costs. Mr. McQuarrie contra.

**In the case of Davis vs. Matheson,** for an alleged breach of contract, the argument on the demurrer was concluded and judgment reserved. McLeod, Q. C., and Bentley argued the case in support of the demurrer. Peters, Q. C., and Stewart contra.

**Robinson vs. the British American Insurance Company.** In this case, upon motion of Mr. Stewart, Q. C., a rule nisi for new trial was granted.

**In the cases of Rose Simpson against Thompson and Robertson,** the Court, upon motion of Mr. Stewart, Q. C., granted a rule nisi to set aside the judgment of Mr. Justice Hodgson, recently given. 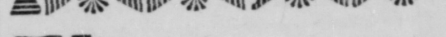

**BODY FOUND.**—The body of the Assyrian boy Basha was found by divers in his berth in the steerage quarters of the ill-fated Portia a day or two ago. It is thought that the little fellow never awakened. Asleep or sick, when the steamer struck, and the other passengers rushed on deck, he remained in his berth, and three-quarters of an hour afterwards, when the ship went down, he went with her to the bottom.

**ORINOCO CHARTERED.**—The Red Cross Line have chartered the Orinoco, one of the Quebec steamship company's fleet, to take the place of the Portia. She will sail from New York on Saturday of next week, the date scheduled for the Portia, so that there will be no break in the services between New York, Halifax and St. John's, Nfld. The Orinoco has made one or two trips to Charlottetown, and is a steamship of the best description.

**EXTRAORDINARY.**—Mr. Duncan, of West Kent School, brought to town this morning a lump of petrified wood, part of a larger lump which was, last winter, taken from the heart of a birch tree by his brother-in-law, Mr. William Gillis, of Orwell. The tree from which it was taken was about fifteen inches in diameter and hollow at the butt, but quite green and sound above the point at which the lump of petrified wood was found. **LIVED ON GRASS.**—According to a recent despatch from Vancouver William Edwards, a miner, hailing from New York, is in the Rossland hospital, a living example of the astounding fact that a man can eat grass as an exclusive diet for eighteen days and live to tell the tale. Edwards was employed to do some work on Sophie Mountain, a very wild part of British Columbia. He camped on the mountain with two companions. His companions left him alone one day and Edwards thought he would clamber up the mountain side for a short distance. He could not find his way back to the camp and for 18 days grass, roots and weeds made up his diet. When found he was almost dead.

John McIntosh, of Hopewell, Pictou, took place yesterday afternoon at the residence of the bride's father, George Thompson, 208 Robie Street.
