Owners Confirm Arena To Be Sold

Capt. Carl F. Burke, managing director of Maritime Central Airways yesterday continued the speculation that Charlottetown's Sports Arena is on the auction block. Capt. Burke told the Guardian, "Patrons of MCA are not interested in operating the rink any longer," but only because of mounting deficits, but also because a major expenditure would have to be made to put the structure in operation condition for another season.

He also said that "some consideration in the price" would be given by MCA if the city should decide to purchase and operate the arena. "We will not go to the city for help," he said. "We are not interested in subsidies. I don't think we're interested in operating the arena for another year."

Tax Bills Ready Soon

City controller John Butler announced yesterday that the billing of some 7,500 taxpayers for educational and personal property taxes will get underway around the end of April.

As in previous years the bills will be made up and sent out from city hall in alphabetical order and is expected to take about three weeks. Payments can again be made on the installment basis with the first installment due on receipt of the bill.

On the matter of billing for property tax, Mr. Butler said that by the time the educational billing has been completed he is hopeful that the city council will have struck the property tax and mailing of these bills will start as soon as the last educational tax bill has gone out.

"We expect a large increase in all fields of trade again this year," said Mr. Rossiter.

NEW MACHINERY FOR PLANT

Britain in E.C.M. Seen As Aid To Commonwealth

A forecast that Britain would make its decision in early autumn this year, as to whether it would join the European Common Market, was made here yesterday by The Hon. Viscount Amory, C.M.G., British High Commissioner in Canada.

He said in an interview that he believed it would be the end of the summer or early autumn when Britain would announce what terms she could enter the common market.

"It is a British decision but she won't decide until she hears what the commonwealth's views are on the matter," he said.

Viscount Amory arrived in Charlottetown yesterday, as part of a tour of the Maritime Provinces, and is staying at Government House. Tonight he will address a special meeting of the P.E.I. Canadian Club at the Charlottetown Hotel.

Mr. MacLeod received the degree of Master of Arts from Glasgow University, and was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Divinity following studies both in Glasgow and at the University and at Queen's University. He served as a missionary in India for 16 years. He returned with his family to Scotland in 1920 and was, for four years, pastor of the Harper Memorial Baptist Church in Glasgow. Mr. MacLeod came to Canada in 1956, and since that time he has been widely used as a conference speaker.
