Mrs. Heber Jones, Charlottetown presbyterial president, in defining stewardship stated that "it is working out, over the whole range of everyday living, the recognition that Christ is Lord of all life. It is the response of the individual and of the group to the demands of Christian faith and Christian living. It finds expression in joy and in love, in a readiness to give of time, of skills and abilities, possessions, etc." Mrs. Jones noted the formation of a new committee namely, organization and promotion and informed those present that this committee was most anxious to meet with UCW's and also areas where such groups might be organized.

BRISTOL
Fred Mosher, a former resident of this old village, was seriously hurt in a car crash near Mount Stewart last week and removed to the P.E.I. Hospital. An old navy veteran of the Duxbury days, Fred has been in poor health for many years. In fact, he spent months and months in army hospitals but in the last few years has been able to work again. He has resided in Savage Harbour for quite a number of years. His old home is still here and we like to remember Fred as one of the best fellows Bristol ever had in years gone by. We learn from our old friend John Lund that he and his father (this was in 1913) and brothers hauled the old butter factory from Bristol to Midgell in the winter months. The old factory was near McEwen's store on the road to the railway station and the last butter was made there way back in 1910 or a little later. This old buttery factory was on the site of the Bristol race track that went out of business more than 50 years ago and the late Walter McEwen bought the property and farmed parts of it while the old circle was never touched on one side, it was left as a memory. Mrs. Addie O'Brien, a resident of the Sacred Heart Home in the city well remembers the old butter factory and race track as her old home was at few yards away. She thinks of the anvil and other tools her late father used in his blacksmith shop more than half a century ago are still around. The old home where horses were shod for 30 cents and "bring your own nails" blacksmith shops and country race tracks are gone forever now.

OTTAWA (CP) - The magazine Soviet Union Today plans other quizzes and competitions for its readers.
