The Saint Dunstan's University football team knocked Dalhousie Tigers out of contention for Maritime Intercollegiate rugby honors on Saturday afternoon by whipping the Dal athletes 8-2 in a game on the S. D. U. field.

The Saints, already out of a contention as a result of a double loss to Mount Allison University, gave their most impressive display of the season as they presented a fast moving backfield behind a smooth working scrum.

Their win over Dalhousie automatically gives the section championship to Mount Allison. The Mounties have been undefeated in three games.

As the score would indicate the Saints enjoyed a wide edge on play in the game which was played on a wet field with a ball made heavy after the first fifteen minutes of play.

The wet ball however, did not affect the work of the Saints' backfield. The picking and flying quarter combination of the Saints, Bob Mooney and Gus Dorais exhibited excellent ball handling as they ran for long gains or set up their team-mates for smart runs.

The winners scored a try in each half and a penalty kick in the last 35 minutes of play. Wingman Lloyd Gaudet and Paul Jay each crossed the Dal line after good half-line passing plays while Rodney MacInnis scored on the penalty kick.
