TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

News of the Great Strike.

LONDON, Aug. 26.

The condition of the strike becomes graver hourly. Burns addressed 6,000 men at Tower Hill, giving, as a watchword "No surrender." He was cheered to the echo. Three thousand iron workers at Veigley have struck, and the strikers are boasting that Monday will witness a gigantic amalgamated strike of workers in every industry, unless the ultimatum is accepted by noon to-morrow. In an interview, this evening, Burns said he felt depressed although he hoped for the best. A notice was posted at the strikers committee rooms, suspending relief measures, owing to the fact of tradesman upon whom orders were issued demanding that committees coupons be exchanged for cash. The outlook for the strikers is decidedly gloomy. Cardinal Manning, Sir Andrew Lusk and Lord Mayor Deputy Smith conferred with the dock officials to-day. It is understood that the Cardinal pleaded the cause of the strikers. It is reported that the gas workers are discontented, and fears are entertained that London will be in darkness in case they strike, with additional danger by reason of neglected retorts. The seamen's and wharf laborers' union at Brisbane, Australia, cables here to-day saying that employment will be furnished there to 250 of the striking London dock men. A committee of wharfingers have compiled another proposed agreement for submission to the dock companies.

Late Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, Aug. 30.

Mr. D. McKenzie, of Sarnia, brother of Hon. A. McKenzie, ex-premier of Canada, has been nominated by the reformers of West Lambton as their candidate for the Ontario Assembly in place of the late Hon. T. B. Pardee.

An explosion occurred at Chambley Canton this morning in the packing room of the Beloit powder works, killing two men named Joseph Fairaure and Samuel Betti. Tenders for the steamship service between Halifax and St. John and ports of South America and West Indies will be opened to-morrow.

Riflemen are beginning to arrive from all parts of Canada to attend the annual Dominion matches which commence on Monday.

Behring Sea Matters.

OTTAWA, Aug. 30.

A despatch from Victoria, B. C., says the schooner Pathfinder, which was seized by the United States revenue cutter Rush, has arrived there. The commander of the Rush had placed a seaman on board the Pathfinder and ordered that the vessel be taken to Sitka. After the Rush left the Pathfinder was headed for Victoria, despite the protests of the American seaman on board. Officials of the Marine Department say if it be true that the sealing schooner Black Diamond, though registered in Canada, is owned by American citizens, she is liable to be confiscated under the provisions of the Canada Shipbuilding Act.

Disastrous Storms.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 30.

North China and Japan have been visited by a series of typhoons of unprecedented severity. At the lowest estimate 15,000 people were drowned. Advices from Yokohama say disastrous storms recently occurred in Wakayama. Five thousand persons perished in the floods following the storms, and 20,000 were rendered homeless. The loss to property is enormous.

The Socials Again Defeated.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Aug. 30.

The Socials were again defeated to-day by the Shamrocks, by a score of 10 to 1. Davison was hit quite heavily and at most opportune times, while the Socials were unable to find Sullivan, and only twice found him safely. The visitors put up a much better fielding game today. O'Brien got three beautiful flies in left field. Like yesterday, the Socials were clearly outplayed at every point.

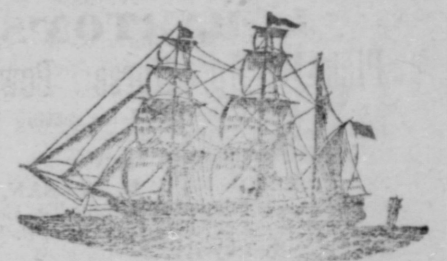
