

Virgil Atkins Chosen As June Boxer Of The Month

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The U.S. National Boxing Association Tuesday chose welterweight champion Virgil Atkins as July boxer of the month.

The power-punching St. Louis fighter won the spot after stopping Vince Martinez of Paterson, N.J., June 6 to take the vacant title.

The NBA's latest ratings list Martinez second leading contender for the crown behind Cuba's Isaac Logart.

Harold Carter, Camden, N.J., heavyweight, was placed fifth among contenders for Floyd Patterson's title after winning a 10-round decision from Germany's Will Besmanoff in his first fight after a 17-month army tour.

Eddie Machen of California is ranked as top heavyweight contender followed by Zora Foley

o. Arizona, Roy Harris of Texas and Willie Pastrano of Louisiana. Alex Miteff of Argentina dropped one place to seventh behind Ingemar Johansson of Sweden after fighting to a draw in Toronto with George Chuvalo. The Canadian, who came back impressively in that fight to floor Miteff in the 10th round, was not listed in the top 10.

DURELLE SOLE CANADIAN

The only Canadian in the first 10 of any division is Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., fourth in the light-heavy class. Harold Johnson of Pennsylvania, Tony Anthony of New York and Erich Schoppner of Germany are ranked 1-2-3 in contention for Archie Moore's title.

Carmen Basilio of New York, Joey Giardello of Pennsylvania and Gene Fullmer of Utah are

ranked in that order as contenders for Ray Robinson's middleweight championship. Top three in line for Joe Brown's lightweight title are Ken Lane of Michigan, Duilio Loi of Italy and Ralph Dupas of Louisiana.

Davey Moore of Ohio is ranked first behind champion Hogan Kid Bassey of Nigeria in the featherweight division with Cherif Hamia of France second and Paul Jorgensen of Texas third.

Alphonse Halimi of France is the bantam champ with Leio Espinosa of the Philippines, Mario d'Agata of Italy and Jose Toluco Lopez of Mexico ranked as three leading contenders.

Establishes New Record In Winning Monza Race

MONZA, Italy (AP)—Jim Rathmann of Miami, Fla., Sunday beat the greatest 500-mile drivers of Europe and America in the fastest auto race ever run.

His timing 166.798 miles an hour in a Zink Leader Card Special was six miles an hour faster than Jimmy Bryan's time winning here last year and 31 miles an hour faster than the Indianapolis record. Bryan, from Phoenix, Ariz., won this year's Indianapolis 500.

Rathmann even beat the old 162-mile-an-hour world record which German Hermann Lang set in a Mercedes 20 years ago on a track near Berlin that had a six-mile straightaway. The Monza speed track is a 2.6-mile steep-banked oval.

The terrific pace and the

bumpy track knocked out all but six of 19 starting cars and left two drivers ill.

The Indianapolis racers still dominated at Monza over the challenge of special built European racers and Europe's great open road drivers.

BRYAN SECOND

In final placings, Bryan was second in three hours, one minute, 9.6 seconds. Rathmann had a total time for three heats of two hours, 59 minutes and 37.3 seconds. It was six miles an hour faster than Bryan's time last year. The Florida driver's time on the last heat was 1:00:04.6.

Rathmann smashed last year's Monza record and made Indianapolis times look slow.

He averaged 167.376 m.p.h. on the first heat 165.282 m.p.h. on the second, and 167.376 on the third.

Last year Bryan won with an average of 160.168. The Indianapolis record is 135.601 m.p.h. set by Sam Hanks of California in 1957.

This was a long awaited showdown between the top drivers from Europe and South America against the American speedsters. The Europeans skipped the Monza race a year ago, calling it too dangerous.

The world champion, Juan Manuel Fangio of Argentina, withdrew after the second lap when a clogged fuel line started his motor sputtering and missing.

Giambra Wins Over Giardello

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Midweight Joey Giambra won a financial gamble and recaptured some boxing prestige Monday night on the slim margin of an unpopular split decision over Joey Giardello.

The loser, from Rosedale, N.Y., complained he lost his first bout in two years on a home-town decision. Giardello is the No. 2 contender.

Giambra, now looking forward to some bigger paydays, collected \$3,710 for his 10 rounds at the Cow Palace. Giardello, who weighed in at 160 pounds to 156½, came out loser but picked up \$10,000.

TWO FAVOR GIAMBRA

The \$10,000 was a flat guarantee while the former was figured on a percentage of the net gate of \$22,850.59—the gamble Giambra took to get the bout.

Neither the National Boxing Association nor Ring magazine ranked Giambra among the first 10 middleweights for June but the NBA July list, compiled before Monday night's fight, had him No. 8.

Boos greeted the announcement that referee Jack Downey and judge Jack Silver scored the bout for Giambra while judge Eddie James saw Giardello well ahead.

Downey scored 96-94, Silver 95-96 and James, the dissenter, going for the New Yorker, 99-94.

Giardello took the first three rounds as Giambra's timing appeared rusty after the long lay-off. The action dulled in the middle rounds and brought boos and stomping for action from the crowd of 4,631. Then Giambra caught fire and scored with left hooks and rights to the head.

From time immemorial, mankind has turned to nature for aid in expressing the more delicate emotions inherent in the human nature. When the occasion demanded that some outward token must be used to show joy or sympathy, the earth's early inhabitants went out into the fields and forests to gather the beauty that was provided everywhere in such abundance.
