A little over a week ago, Mr. Gordon was attacked with congestion of the brain, which, sad to say, ended fatally. He had the best medical attendance in the city, and everything possible was done in order to effect a recovery. We tender our sincere sympathy to the relatives of the deceased.

ODD-FELLOWS EXCURSION.—The moonlight excursion under the auspices of Willey Lodge, I. O. O. F., was a most enjoyable affair. At half-past eight, last evening, the steamer "Princess of Wales," with about two hundred happy excursionists on board, left the Steam Navigation Wharf and after steaming as far as Point Prim Light, returned to the city at midnight. We understand that it is the intention of Willey Lodge to repeat, at no distant time, this excursion, and that they will devote the proceeds to charitable objects.

The Lobster Factory at Bull Creek, Lot 46, owned by John McLean, Esq., M. P. P., is we learn, a total loss. This was one of the largest factories in the Province, and its destruction at this season of the year, will be a serious loss to the owner as well as the fishermen and men employed about it. Mr. McLean, in addition to the lobster packing, packed last year a large amount of mackerel, and it was his intention to do the same this year—giving employment to over 100 hands. The factory burned contained the cans, and can-making machinery, for supplying this and two branch factories with. We learn the whole is a mass of ruins. It is not known how the fire originated, but some of the hands barely had time to get out of the two houses adjacent in which they were sleeping—both of which were consumed—and some of them lost their clothing. The fire was discovered about half-past one o'clock on Tuesday night, and half an hour afterwards there was nothing left but ruins. The property was, we understand, partially insured in one of the offices represented by Mr. F. W. Hyndman of this city.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

A Query for "A Barrister."

SIR,—I have read the letter of "A Barrister" in yesterday's EXAMINER, wherein that legal gentleman attempts to defend the Supreme Court of this Island, or at least Judge Peters, in reference to the recent appeals to the Supreme Court at Ottawa.

"A Barrister" having thus come out, it is very strong evidence that his legal mind discovered the necessity of a defence, and having done so, and he appearing by his letter to have a full knowledge of the old Bank affairs, I venture to ask him did Judge Peters decide that every depositor, who was also a shareholder, was legally entitled to pay the amount of his call by setting off the amount of his deposit against it, and in this way receive the full face value of the deposit, instead of dividend on it as other creditors have to take?

If such decision were given, was it in the opinion of "A Barrister" a sound one, and was it acted on by the liquidators and the shareholders, and if not, why not?

The letter of "A Barrister" would appear on its face to be simply a remonstrance against your editorial remarks regarding the result of the recent appeals to Ottawa; but I think a careful reading of the letter will convince every reasonable person that the letter was not published for the purpose of defending the Supreme Court or Judge Peters, but for the purpose of defending the enormous expense and costs incurred in endeavoring to sustain a decision which has always been considered by the leading Lawyers of Charlottetown as wrong, and which has now been pronounced as erroneous by the highest Court in Canada.
