### A MEETING OF THE CABINET

### The Meeting of Parliament was Discussed

MARCH 16 AND APRIL 6 THE DATES MENTIONED.

But the Final Decision is Held Over Until To-day.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Feb 24.—A meeting of the Cabinet was held yesterday at which there were ten Ministers present. The Washington delegates explained to their colleagues what had been accomplished, or rather not accomplished.

The date of the meeting of Parliament was discussed, the majority being in favor of Thursday, March 16th. Some Ministers, however, pressed strongly for April 6th, holding that it would be far better to delay meeting until then and have all the business of the Government get ready than to meet parliament in March in a state unpreparedness.

Owing to the absence of Tarte, Sifton, Fisher and Burden, and especially the two former, it was decided to leave the final decision over until to-day, although at present writing March 16th., has the call.

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The New Brunswick elections are over, votes are not now needed, let us therefore have a new arrangement for the carriage of our mails between Sackville and Tormentine by a special train.

—Under Liberal rule the debt of Nova Scotia has been raised to the sum of \$3,742,156—nearly four millions of dollars. The Liberal party of P. E. Island is going the pace too—though P. E. Island lacks the mineral resources of Nova Scotia to fall back upon. How long will the people permit the Liberals to go on? Will the policy "expand?"

—Let us see! Are not the gentlemen who have failed in the recent negotiations at Washington the very same gentlemen who went about the country, before the general election, boasting that all that was necessary to secure a favorable treaty of reciprocity with the United States was to put the Liberal party in power?

—Sir Charles Tupper remarked, a few days ago, that "bungling incapacity has marked the administration of every branch of the public service since the Liberal's accession to power, save and except those cases in which they have walked humbly and closely in the footsteps of their predecessors." A great truth, tersely stated.

—Advices from Ottawa state that "The postmaster general has hit upon another device for "raising the wind." Surcharge stamps are regarded as of great value by collectors, especially if the number so altered is but limited. Mr. Mulock had a number of envelopes with three cent stamp embossed upon them on hand when the recent reduction in postage was made. He has had them changed into two cent stamps by placing a big figure on the Queen's head. The result is a big rush for this envelope, and an augmented revenue."

### The Biggest Loss That "Has Been."

Mr. Mulock conducted the Post-office at a loss of \$69,000 last month. This is a deficit of \$2,200 per day, or of \$828,000 a year.

In addition to this loss of \$828,000 on the working of the Post-office in Canada we pay \$560,000 a year for the carriage of mails in steamships.

So that in round figures the loss is \$1,388,000 annually.

They are going to put a tax on tea to cover this Mulock deficit, caused largely by the two cent rate.

Ten cents is the tax proposed; but at six cents a pound the Government will raise on the 24,000,000 pounds imported just \$1,440,000.

The average man who posts a letter a week and uses a pound a tea a week will save fifty-two cents a year on his letters and pay for this saving \$3.12 a year on his tea.—Mail and Empire.

Mail and Empire: The Ottawa Government promised to kill off monopolies, and fulfilled its pledge by introducing the most gigantic of United States trusts to tax and toll the Canadian people.
