The body of Amie Arsenault, 23, who was drowned two miles off Cape Egmont on Monday, Aug. 31, was washed ashore north from the point where the fatality occurred, on Saturday afternoon, Sept. 11.

Coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan decided that in view of the circumstances no inquest would be necessary.

The Maritime Optometric Association members put in a full day in business sessions yesterday at the Charlottetown hotel where they are holding a two day annual conference under the chairmanship of their president, Mr. J. A. Carruthers.

The morning session was addressed by Dr. E. J. Fisher, Dean of Toronto University School of Optometry and Dr. S. Grigg, research specialist of Southbridge, Mass., both of whom also spoke during the afternoon session on subjects of particular interest to the profession.

The brilliant seamanship of its commanding officer, plus the heroic efforts of the officers and crew of a 48 ft. naval launch from H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte, were responsible for bringing the craft safely to shore with all on board, during the height of the gale which swept the Province yesterday afternoon and evening.

The launch under command of Lieutenant Kenneth MacKenzie left Charlottetown on Saturday for a routine training cruise to Shediac via Summerside. On the return trip they left Summerside yesterday morning at 8:00 o'clock and with normal going should have reached Charlottetown at 3:30 p.m. However when the ship was

off Fitzroy rock in Hillsboro Bay, it became apparent that they would be unable to make port. On a clever decision of the commanding officer, they proceeded up Pownal Bay where they tied up at Halliday's Wharf. The crew proceeded from there to Charlottetown by car.

Mr. Earl Cannon was re-elected as President of the P.E.I. Communist Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., at the 22nd annual convention held at Miscouche under the auspices of the Miscouche Branch of the Canadian Legion.

Out of 24 Branches in the Province 18 were represented with 39 delegates present.

The report submitted by President Earl Cannon indicated that the increase of membership this year over the previous year was about 15 per cent with the membership this year standing at 1368.

One of the worst storms to hit this Province in recent years off-rooted trees, blew roofs off buildings, flattened standing crops, disrupted communications and plunged whole areas into black-out. Wind gusts up to 70 miles per hour with an average velocity of 45 miles an hour swept the Province.

City streets were strewn with broken branches and fallen trees. Both the Maritime Electric Company Ltd. and the Island Telephone Company were swamped with line breakages. The full extent of the damage could not be estimated.

All shipping and aircraft were tied-up until a late hour last night. The car ferry between Borden and Cape Tormentine was temporarily held up, but resumed service at 9:30 last night. The ferries from Wood Islands and Cariboo missed only one trip — the last one of the night, but the craft remained on the opposite sides of the Strait.

In the City a large tree, 15 feet in girth in front of the residence of the late Mr. Charles Carson, 54 Kent Street, fell across the road into Rochford Square. It was removed by City workmen.

A chimney on the south side of the residence of Hon. George DeBlois, former Lieutenant-Governor, toppled over during the height of the storm. When it fell it tore a hole in the roof and strewn bricks all across the lawn.

Another large tree in front of the Lennox Hotel on Water Street fell across the street when blown down by the high wind. A third large one was uprooted in King's Square.

News has been received that Rev. Cornelius Pineau, S. J., and His Excellency Bishop Cote, S. J., are flying from Hong Kong to Rome where they will have an audience with the Holy Father, Pope Pius XII.

The two Jesuit Missionaries will then fly to Canada and are expected in Montreal September 15. Rev. Cornelius Pineau, S. J., is the son of the late Theophilus Pineau of Rustico. He has been in China since September, 1935, and has endured many hardships, especially during the Japanese war and since China has come under Red domination.

"Our people contribute liberally to the cancer campaign in this City and Province because they realize that the amount of good work we can do is measured by the amount of money put into our hands," declared Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, Cancer Society president, speaking to the City campaign workers last night.

"We contribute our proportion of the money spent on cancer research and thereby contribute to the advance made in Canada along these lines. Prince Edward Island is doing well in its program against cancer and our progress here is not exceeded by that of any other Province on a per capita basis," Dr. MacMillan said.

"I am gratified to hear of the honour which the community of St. Charles, Prince Edward Island, did me in 1950," writes Sir Winston Churchill, British Prime Minister and illustrious wartime leader, in a personally signed letter received by The Guardian over the week-end.

In his letter, dated August 25 from No. 10 Downing Street, London, Sir Winston expressed his "warm thanks" for a Guardian editorial page clipping of August 15, recording the circumstances of the naming of Churchill, P. E. I., after him on that date fifty-three years ago. This action was taken by a small group which met in a tailor shop just below Mr. Dan MacKinnon's present home and petitioned the Dominion Government to name a post office to be installed between Bonshaw and New Haven on the Tryon Road after a young English war correspondent, Winston Spencer Churchill, who had just made a sensational escape from the Boers, had published his first book, "London to Ladysmith via Pretoria," and been elected for the first time to Parliament as Conservative member for Oldham.

Though he has since been showered with tributes of appreciation from all the free nations of the world, Churchill, P.E.I., is believed to be the first community in the Empire to have honoured Sir Winston in the above manner at the outset of his career. The Prime Minister's pleasure in receiving this news will be shared, it is felt, by every citizen of the Province.

The biggest school registration ever recorded in this city was marked up yesterday when over 3,500 pupils started the year here and in School District Number 1 but late pupils are still arriving. In the city there is a very heavy enrollment with Queen Square School having the largest number

of pupils as 725 registered yesterday. In the school there were so many new entrants that it became necessary to operate Grade 1 in four sections. The school itself was too crowded and three new classrooms were opened in the McGuffin residence on Richmond street and another in the Newsom Building above the school.

Air Vice-Marshal G. E. Brooks, C.B., O.B.E., C.D., National President of the R.C.A.F. Association, is due to arrive in Charlottetown by air at 10:30 this morning on an informal visit. He will be met at the airport by Mr. S. M. McInnis, Maritime Group Representative on the National Executive of the R.C.A.F. Association and Mr. Harold McKie, Vice President of 201 (Confederation) Wing, R. C. A. F., and executive members of the association.

M. F. Schurman Company Ltd., Summerside, was awarded the contract yesterday for excavating and placing the foundation and first floor in the new Charlottetown Composite High School Building on North River Road at a cost of \$73,842.00. Their tender was the lowest of the five submitted including one from Halifax, N.S., and one from Saint John, N.B. The highest tender received was for \$112,500.00. Three other firms requested plans and specifications but failed to submit bids.

Miss Geraldine Sullivan, 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur E. Sullivan, Montague, has been awarded a bursary of \$1,600 by the I.O.D.E. War Memorial Committee. This pleasing announcement was received yesterday afternoon in a telegram to Miss Jessie Fuller, Convener of the War Memorial Committee, from Miss Elsie C. Jewitt, National War Memorial Secretary of the I.O.D.E.

Col. K. S. Rogers has acquired a site at Stratgartney where he expects to locate a transmitter to be used in connection with the operation of a prospective television station. The transmitter will be connected by micro-wave with the studio of CFCY at Charlottetown and possibly extended to Summerside. The first difficulty to be overcome will be to successfully hook-up the studio and transmitter by micro-wave. The technical brief submitted by Col. Rogers has been approved and his application has been submitted to the Department of Transport for a licence.

"Many factors are involved in the erection and operation of the proposed station," said Col. Rogers. "However I am hopeful that it will be a going concern by 1955."

Lady Baden-Powell and her secretary will be the guests of Lieutenant Governor T. W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse at Government House during a two-day stay on the Island in the course of her extended Canadian tour, it was learned yesterday.

Lady Baden-Powell, who is Chief Guide of the world Girl Guide movement, is due to arrive in Charlottetown by air from New Glasgow on the afternoon flight on Thursday, Sept. 24. She will be met by Guide and Brownie officers and representative detachments from the City, Parkdale, Southport and other local areas.

Three Summerside photographers—D. W. Sears, proprietor of Read's Studio; Edwin Hecker, proprietor of Edwin Hecker Studio; and George Wotton, of the Charlottetown Guardian, together with their wives attended the twentieth annual convention of the Maritime Professional Photographers Association at the Fort Cumberland Hotel in Amherst, Nova Scotia, on Sept. 6th and 7th.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Montague, was filled to capacity last evening when a very impressive service of designation was held for Miss Anne MacEachern, graduate deaconess of the Presbyterian Missionary and Deaconess Training School, Toronto.

The problem faced by students writing Grade 10 examinations, and the high percentage of failures were discussed frankly by Hon. Keir Clark, Minister of Education, when he addressed

the opening meeting of the teachers convention held in Montague yesterday.

Mr. Clark stated that the examinations constituted what he termed a "bottleneck" and the name of them would be changed as they were no longer for the exclusive purpose of entrance to Prince of Wales College with so many students now attending rural high schools.

Incomplete enrollment figures at Prince of Wales College indicate that the number of students will be approximately the same as last year. There is a substantial increase in the Second, Third, and Fourth years and a reduction in the First year and Teacher Training class.

The lower enrollment in Teacher Training is the experience of Normal Schools in every part of Canada, while the reduction in the First Year results from the establishment of Grade XI classes in several of the schools throughout the Province.
