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Britons Continue "War Of Nerves"

Calm In Europe's "War Of Nerves"

LONDON, Aug. 25 - (CP Cable) - Prospects of war and the trading of handy air raids precautions hints filled conversations tonight in suburban London where housewives busily blacked out windows and men put finishing touches to air raid shelters.

Typifying British calm in the face of the German invasion, together with being "fed up" at the continued suspense, one janitor paused in his tasks of directing sandbag emplacements to ask a newspaper man:

"Wot in 'ell does this 'ere merchant 'Hitler think he's doin' o'?"

In the evening streets people appeared grimaced, and typical comment came from a barber who said, "We don't want this 'ere war. We don't want to fight Germans or anyone. But if they start anything 'ell finish it and there's no question who will win."

Over The Fence

Over backyard fences serious, aproned housewives discussed the food question in the event of hostilities.

"At first we were going to store a lot of food but then I said to all that we had a lot of stuff spoil during last September's crisis and anyhow it doesn't seem fair to hoard at a time like this."

"Yes, I know, but this time it seems different," said another woman. "That's what my son thinks and he's in the territorials. He's been called up and I'm worried because I just cured him of a chill he got last week in camp."

It seems terrible we've got to fight them all again," said one man. It wouldn't be so bad if the German people knew what they were in for."

So it went over the suburban backyard fences while London proper presented a swift-moving kaleidoscope.

Hospitals were asked to hurry their emergency casualty arrangements and restrict admission to all except the most acute cases. The health ministry asked local authorities to reopen schools in evacuation areas for an evacuation rehearsal tomorrow. Lorries carried away official documents about London in addition to the secret hideout. Only the domestic book and the famous "scrap of paper" of 1914 remained in London.

Russia Sponsors Bulgarian Claims Against Rumania

SOFIA, Aug. 25-(AP) - Deputy George Markoff, Vice President of the national assembly, said tonight that Russia had signed a full approval of Bulgaria's territorial claims on Rumania.

Markoff who returned today from Moscow with 21 other deputies told the national assembly that Molotov said "the Soviet finds Bulgarian claims fully justified."

It was the first sign of possible German-Russian co-operation in affecting territorial changes in South Eastern Europe. Nazi German leaders have publicly returned the compliment that Soviet Russia's help would be forthcoming because "it is the opinion of Comrade Stalin that Bulgaria should have justice."

Board Of Trade "Reconsiders" Borden Route

The Charlottetown Board of Trade at a quarterly meeting last night decided to "re-consider" the resolution concerning the Charlottetown Borden Highway. Previously the Board had suggested that if the most direct route via the shore road were not to be paved then an alternative road involving opening of a new road for a short section, be considered by the government. The new resolution proposed last night was made "in the light of additional information," the Board announced. Neither the short cut proposed by the Board nor the route which it contemplated was suitable winter roads. The Board stressed it was not opposing the route via Albany and connecting with the present pavement at Trueman's Corner but wanted a road which would be "reasonably free" from snow.

The text of the new resolution would be prepared later, it was said. The resolution was moved by Mr. R. E. Mutch and would probably be seconded by Mr. W. A. Stewart, who was absent last night. The two above men were the moving and second of the original motion.

A delegation from the Cape Traverse section presented its views to the Board of Trade prior to opening of the regular session. Capt. John Read of Borden headed the group which included Mr. Fred Bell and Mr. A. K. Lord, both of whom spoke briefly. Capt. Read was official spokesman.

Mr. C. N. Bisset President of the Board presided last night. The meeting was a postponed quarterly session.

Mr. W. S. Grant introduced the question of air service linking this Province with the mainland and the present standing with regard to arrangements to connect this Province by means of a feeder line with the Trans-Canada terminal at Moncton. He urged the Board of Trade press for some definite arrangement so the Company contracting for the feeder service would have an opportunity to train personnel before the service between Moncton and Charlottetown opened by Trans-Canada.

A resolution would be presented to the local Board later, it was announced. In addition the Maritime Board would be informed the question would be brought up at the annual meeting in Kentville next month.

had feared previously the answer would reach him after his speech. There was a report in political circles that the Prime Minister might summon his cabinet tomorrow for an emergency meeting.

War would bring a national government of all parties, authoritative sources said today. The plan at present under consideration would involve Winston Churchill, Anthony Eden, Clement Attlee and Sir Archibald Sinclair entering the government.

The same sources said an inner cabinet would be set up, consisting of Mr. Chamberlain, Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lord Chatfield, defence coordination minister, Mr. Attlee, who leads the Labor opposition, Sir Archibald, who is Liberal leader, and Mr. Churchill.

Mr. Eden might be included and possibly one or two front bench Labor members.

A meeting of executives of the Labor movement today decided that Labor would not accept office in a wartime cabinet unless the step was approved by a full delegate conference of the party including the trade unions. So far there has been no approach to the party but if made it would probably be addressed to the party as a whole rather than individual members. In that event the party would select its representatives.

had feared previously the answer would reach him after his speech. There was a report in political circles that the Prime Minister might summon his cabinet tomorrow for an emergency meeting.

War would bring a national government of all parties, authoritative sources said today. The plan at present under consideration would involve Winston Churchill, Anthony Eden, Clement Attlee and Sir Archibald Sinclair entering the government.

The same sources said an inner cabinet would be set up, consisting of Mr. Chamberlain, Sir John Simon, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lord Chatfield, defence coordination minister, Mr. Attlee, who leads the Labor opposition, Sir Archibald, who is Liberal leader, and Mr. Churchill.

Mr. Eden might be included and possibly one or two front bench Labor members.

A meeting of executives of the Labor movement today decided that Labor would not accept office in a wartime cabinet unless the step was approved by a full delegate conference of the party including the trade unions. So far there has been no approach to the party but if made it would probably be addressed to the party as a whole rather than individual members. In that event the party would select its representatives.
