THE CASE DISMISSED.—The Ottawa Free Press of the 8th inst. in a police court report says: James Kelly appeared on remand charged with having maliciously cut and wounded Mr. Palmer, G. E., at Charlton, P. E. I., on September 21st last. It will be remembered that a fortnight ago, on the conclusion of the prosecutor's evidence, the case was laid over to allow of the court, and Mr. Wyld who appeared for the defendant, to consult the Attorney-General of P. E. I. Mr. Palmer to-day stated that he had received a letter from the Attorney-General expressing the latter's willingness to prosecute provided Kelly was brought back to the Island. He, Mr. Palmer, had no money and deeply regretted his inability to pay the costs. Mr. O'Gara said as there was no one prepared to pay the expenses, he was relieved from the consideration of whether Kelly ought to have been sent back or not. He dismissed the case.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, April 12. J. Currier has been appointed Private Secretary to Mr. Haggart. Mr. Currier acted in a like capacity for Hon. J. C. Pope for some years.

A petition is in course of preparation for presentation to His Excellency praying for clemency for J. R. Arnold.

D. A. McPherson, Assistant Secretary of the Public Works department, died yesterday from a nervous shock to his system, resulting from an operation in which his right arm was amputated.

Miss Galt, daughter of Sir A. T. Galt, has been appointed to the command of the Ottawa detachment of the Salvation Army.

J. T. Richardson, official reporter to the House of Commons, has entered a suit against the corporation of Ottawa, and demands \$5,000 damages, for injuries sustained from a dangerous sidewalk.

Manufacturers' Combine.

AMHERST, April 12. Rhodes, Curry & Co., comprising the business of Rhodes, Curry & Co., here and of the Harris Car Works, of St. John, have been formally organized. The directors are: President, Nathaniel Curry; Vice President, N. A. Rhodes; Consulting Director, J. A. Robertson; Directors, T. R. Black, J. T. Smith, J. M. Townsend; Secretary-Treasurer, John M. Curry.

A Fatal Jump. MONCTON, April 12. Fletcher, Kinney, while attempting to jump over a flat car on the Albert southern railway at Alma yesterday, fell between two cars and the wheels passed over one leg severing it just below the hip. It was amputated, but Kinney died from the shock and the loss of blood.

Fishery Protection. OTTAWA, April 12. Commander Wakeham will supervise the Fishery Protection Service during the coming season; but Captain Spain will have practical control, as Wakeham will be engaged all summer in his capacity as International Fish Commissioner.

Smugglers Imprisoned. BOSTON, April 12. J. G. Crowell, of East Boston, and Charles Stibbins, of Yarmouth, N. S., were each sentenced to six months in Cambridge jail by Judge Nelson. They were convicted of smuggling valuable drugs from Nova Scotia.

St. John Mayoralty. ST. JOHN, April 12. In the mayoralty election yesterday, Mr. Peters was re-elected. He had more votes than the three other candidates combined.

General Telegraphic News. OTTAWA, April 9.—A despatch has been received from the colonial office stating that the Spanish Government has decided that the direct trade between the Spanish Antilles and Canada is placed on the same footing as between those colonies and the United States. Orders have been given that the export duty wrongfully levied on goods sent to Canada from those islands shall be returned.

LONDON, April 9.—The steamships Montebello and Romeo put out from Hull docks last night and anchored in the roads. Two companies of dragoons escorted the crews to the tenders. The police tried to keep the mob back, but the strikers broke through the lines repeatedly and stoned the soldiers and sailors. The dragoons beat the strikers back with the butts of their lances. Several policemen and dragoons were injured with stones and about a dozen strikers were carried from the scene by their comrades. At the docks the crews were placed on the tenders and proceeded to the Montebello and Romeo. The steamships sailed this morning.

VIENNA, April 10.—Great excitement has been caused by an attempt to assassinate Cardinal Vazsly, primate of Hungary. He and his secretary were attacked by a well dressed young man armed with a knife. The cardinal evaded the thrust of the assassin, but his secretary received two severe stab wounds. The would-be murderer was arrested. He appears to be a fanatic.

BOSTON, April 9.—The boiler makers and iron ship builders union voted to-night to strike every shop in Boston, East Boston, South Boston and Cambridge, to-morrow morning. It is expected that seven hundred and fifty men will go out. The fight is for the nine hour work day. Last year a similar strike was in progress for three months, but tonight was accomplished. The work on the U. S. cruiser Marblehead at the works of Harrison Loring, South Boston, and other government contracts will be tied up. The struggle will be a long and bitter one.

MONTRÉAL, April 9.—Judge Jette rendered judgment yesterday in the case of Thompson vs. Senecal, the minister of justice having taken action against the ex-superintendent of the printing bureau, Ottawa, to recover \$14,307, which Senecal had received as commissions from different parties for supplying the department. His honor took the ground that the defendant was an agent rather than an employe, consequently the law justified the dismissal of the case since the government had lost nothing by the transactions. Judge Jette remarked, however, that Senecal's action was reprehensible and punishable by criminal law.

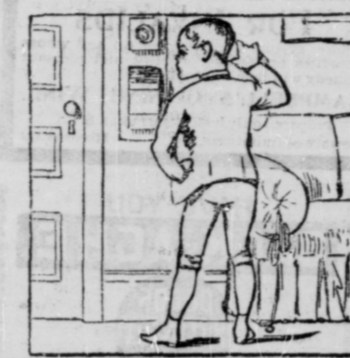

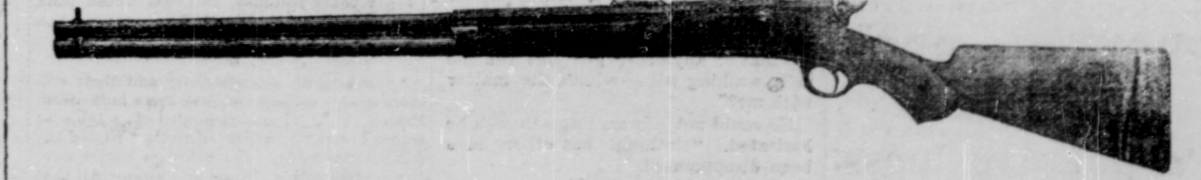
