THE KING'S COUNTY TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE. The annual adjourned meeting of the above pursuant to the call of President and Secretary today at 2.30 o'clock. President Goldsmith occupied the chair. He explained the cause of the misunderstanding as to the place of meeting, which was deemed satisfactory. The minutes of last annual meeting being read and confirmed the Committees appointed to arrange for public meetings in view of the then coming plebiscite all reported. And it was shown readily that they all had been successful in carrying out their plans. It was also observed that the sold and hard campaign work which had been done in King's County had told mightily at the polls on Dec. 14th. It was also pointed out that this degenerated King's County, which was the cause of anxiety in the other counties, led them in a majority vote. It seemed also that had such united work been put in by a similar body to the Alliance, in the Western Counties, they must have rolled up a larger majority than we did. All the ground we have won it was the contented we should retain by demanding the right of what was promised if we wanted it—Prohibition. A memorial was submitted to the Alliance by a committee appointed to draft it follows: Whereas nothing of an effective or general character has been attempted by the Government for the enforcement of the Scott Act throughout King's County for a considerable time and in consequence thereof said Act is regarded as a dead letter by many engaged in the liquor traffic in King's County. Therefore Resolved, That this Alliance memorialize the Government of P. E. I., asking that in view of the large majority voting for the Prohibition of the liquor traffic in the Plebiscite recently taken that energetic measures be adopted to ensure the impartial enforcement of the Scott Act as being in harmony with the wishes of the majority in this County. Also Resolved, That a sufficient salary be attached to the office of Prosecutor in King's County as to adequately remunerate them for their important and arduous work. After one of the freest and fullest discussions possible these resolutions were adopted unanimously. In the discussion it was anticipated that a committee would be appointed to bear this memorial to the Government. The following were appointed for that purpose: Rev. W. Phelan, J. Goldsmith, Mason and McLeod. A committee was also appointed to receive charges against Prosecutors and presenting them to this Alliance for investigation and action. Revs. Phelan and Spencer to be said committee. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Rev. G. D. Weaver, Montague; Rev. W. Lawson was re-elected Secretary, and Rev. W. E. Mason, Treasurer; Vice-Presidents, Rev. W. Phelan, W. M. McLeod, Rev. Mr. Cameron. The President, in a brief speech, thanked the Alliance for the honor conferred. He said the temperance cause was now and had been for years near to his heart, and he would aid the Alliance all in his power in its efforts to overthrow the liquor business in this county. The other officers intend to work the speeches they were refused to give in the Alliance. We are proud of our President, as he is an outspoken, aggressive worker in the temperance cause, and commands the confidence of his fellow-townsmen. The retiring President was earnestly offered continuance in his seat but declined on the ground of being out of the country. At the same time he would continue his connection with the Alliance, and do all in his power to push it forward. He was tendered a unanimous vote of thanks, before the meeting of which many testimonies to his fidelity and ability were made by clerical and lay members of the Alliance. The following resolution was then passed unanimously: That this Alliance pledges itself to give the Government its sympathy and support in the event of any opposition or loss it may sustain by a vigorous enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act. Revs. W. Lawson and G. D. Weaver, were appointed to represent the Alliance at the Convention and Temperance meeting in Charlottetown, 20th inst. Revs. Phelan, Goldsmith and Mason, and Mr. W. McLeod, were appointed delegates to the Convention. The Juvenile Templars, of Montague, paid a welcome visit to the Alliance. President Goldsmith gave them greetings of the Alliance and proclaimed them as the hope of the future in our good cause. The next date and place of meeting was on motion left to the president and secretary. W. LAWSON, Secretary.
