CIVIC ACCOUNTS.—The civic accounts will be submitted at the meeting of the Council to be held tonight. We have not been able to obtain a detailed statement of the revenue and expenditure, but understand that there is a large balance on the right side.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon John Corrigan was fined \$5 or 30 days for being drunk, disorderly and fighting on the streets. A similar charge preferred against another man was dismissed. Summonses were ordered to issue for two men charged with larceny and another man charged with assault, all three having failed to respond to their summonses.

NECK BROKEN.—Mr. Fred Simpson, near Petitcodiac, N. B., was found dead from a broken neck, in his barnyard, a few days ago. He had been hauling hay during the day. When found he was lying in the hayrack. The direct cause of the fatality is a mystery, but he may have been attacked suddenly by some weakness and fell backwards, striking on his head. He leaves a widow, two sons and a daughter.

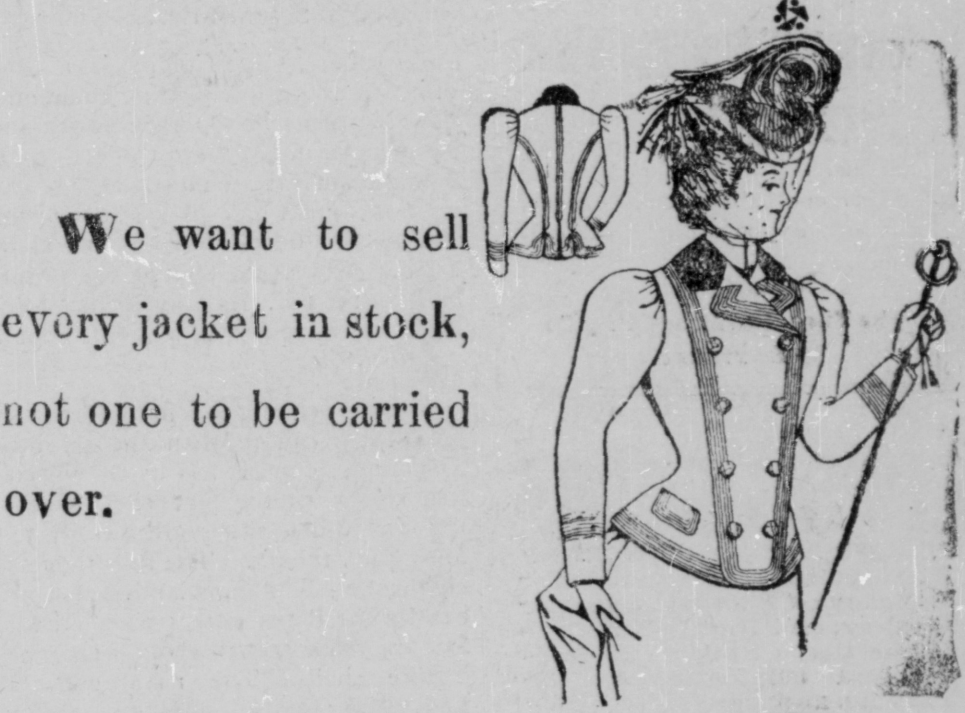
