TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. News of the Great Strike.

LONDON, Sept. 2. Information has been received by the police and by Home Secretary Matthews to the effect that leader Burns to-day urged the strikers to proceed to the docks and expel the men working there. The dock company express themselves as better satisfied with the aspect of affairs. They have an increased number of men at work, composed of men who have given up the fight and new men. Officers of the companies state that plenty of labor would be obtained if the laborers pickets were abolished. A mob composed of 800 strikers invaded the Albert Docks this afternoon and compelled the workmen there to cease their labor. No damage was done to property. At a meeting of wharfingers a resolution was adopted advising the strikers to accept the dock companies offer. The Government is employing convicts to unload vessels in the Medway. T. P. O'Connor's paper, the Star, has collected £2,500 for the strikers' fund. A despatch from Melbourne, Australia, says that at a meeting there to-day £1,500 was collected on behalf of the strikers.

Ottawa News Notes. OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

The Ottawa Ministerial Conference has adopted a resolution, condemning the attractions secured for next week's exhibition.

Mr. McGe, Clerk of the Privy Council, has left for Charlottetown, to administer the oath of office to Lieutenant-Governor Carvell.

The Minister of Customs has been advised that Chinese going to China from the British colonies sell certificates enabling them to return after their return which are thus able to evade the payment on entering Canada.

Comte De Louvillres, French Consul for Canada, draws attention to the amnesty to French subjects in Canada, which was proclaimed on July 19th. It is a full and complete amnesty for all offences committed prior to the date of promulgation, and to take effect in Canada on July 19th, 1890. It is now, however, applicable to offences against the state.

The Rifle. OTTAWA, Sept. 2.

The annual matches of the Dominion Rifle Association opened here to-day with fine clear weather. The attendance of riflemen is the largest on record, aggregating 450. The first competition was for Nursery prizes—five rounds at 300 yards. The first prize went to Private Windcut, of Lindsay, who made the highest possible score. Corporal Gorley, of St. John, came second, winning \$15. Sergt. Gray, of the 66th, Capt. Silver, of the 63rd, and Surgeon Gillis, of P. E. Island, took \$10 prizes. For the team prizes there were thirteen entries. In the MacDougall match for a cup and prizes Sergt. Armstrong, of Guelph, won the cup and \$30. Capt. Silver, of the 63rd, came second, winning \$25. Scores and prizes in the Goswaki team match will be announced to-morrow.

In the League game here to-day, between the St. John and Fredericton teams, the former won, 21 to 8. Small pitched for the St. Johns, while Webb and Underwood both occupied the box for the home club. Moncton to-day added another game to its late list of victories, defeating the Socials. Score—Moncton 10, Socials 5. The excellent work of the home battery accounts, in a great measure, for the victory, only a total of 5 hits being made off Doe. Flynn was hit quite freely, a total of 16 being made off him.
