SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Sunday was a good day for the Scientists. From the pulpits of Moncton were heard words of appreciation and encouragement in their work. Never, except in Yarmouth, N. S., last year, has the school experienced so many public and private courtesies as it is receiving now at Moncton. The Monctonians know a good thing when they see it. The regular work of the school progresses favorably.

Dr. J. B. Hall, of Truro Normal School, lectures each day on civics. Commencing with the school section he shows how in the government of the school we have demonstrated three parts of representative government, the legislative, executive and judicial. The government of the school section, is developed into that of the country, then the Province, the Dominion as a whole, and lastly the Empire. I wonder how many of the pupils leaving our schools have any idea of the underlying principal of government, or how many of our teachers fully understand these things. I fear that the large majority do not, and yet it is not as important that the voters should thoroughly understand these things and appreciate the responsibility that rests upon them as they cast their ballot as it is that they should be able to puzzle out an arithmetical enigma the like of which they never meet in the actual business of life?

On Tuesday the first excursion of the school was taken to the Hopewell Rocks, a drove of twenty-four miles through as picturesque a country as can well be conceived of, skirting the Peticoadian, which winds forests and glen and highly cultivated country. The rocks themselves worn into column and piles, canal and cove, illustrate the action of the tide waters of the coast, upon its outline, as can be seen in but few places. The kodak fiend was there, and a number of views were taken.

From the rocks the party drove to the Albert Plaster quarries, where they were met by Mr Osmer, M. P., manager of the quarries, who conducted the school through the several quarries explaining fully the various qualities of gypsum, the method of quarrying, the process of grinding, the shipping, etc. At present they are grinding about 300 barrels a day, and shipping from 300 to 400 tons per day in the raw or unprepared state. Were it not for the duty charged by the United States Government on the prepared material there could be developed an immense trade in the ground plaster. The supply is apparently inexhaustible. The mountains of this section are evidently all gypsum. In a large section the gypsum comes completely to the surface, and very rarely is there found more than a few feet of soil upon the gypsum. Some of the quarries are a hundred feet thick. The raw gypsum is mostly shipped to the United States, but the duty practically shuts out the manufactured article.

After "doing" the quarries, the excursionists were invited by Mr. Osmer to one of the most delightful sylvan spots to be found in this exquisitely beautiful part of the Province, and there, on the grassy, fern-strewn ground, canopied by the thickly-foliaged branches of the maple, beech and elm, was spread a tempting lunch. At the word from the manager, the scientist most scientifically disposed of the good things prepared and arranged in so scientific a manner.

The appointment to a judgeship of Mr. Choquette, M. P. for Montmagny, Quebec, is officially announced. When it was reported by the Conservative press a short time ago that Mr. Choquette had been slated for a judgeship the report was indignantly denied in certain government circles.
