Aussies Win Doubles Title At Longwood

BROOKLINE, Mass., Aug. 21 - (AP)—Two Australian youngsters, Adrian Quist and Jack Brown, gave the United States and Yugoslavian Davis Cup forces a severe headache today when they stormed to the United States doubles tennis crown at Longwood Cricket Club with a sparkling 8-6, 6-1, victory over their countrymen, Harry Hopman and Jack Crawford.

Part of the headache came from the fact the losers in this first all-foreign final in the 58-year history of the tournament already had defeated the top-seeded American pair with the loss of but one set. Even more troublesome, however, was the fact that Quist and Brown, who looked all but unbeatable in the two final sets.

Brown, in particular, was terrific after he recovered from a string of errors in the first set. His two-handed backhand seemed to be almost as fast as lightning, and his smashes and volleys were so sharply angled that Crawford and Hopman were passed repeatedly.

While America's Davis Cup hopes certainly appeared no brighter, Alice Marble and Mrs. Sarah Ralston Fabry kept the Wightman Cup stock high by winning the United States women's doubles title from Kay Stammers and England's Mrs. Freda James Hamnerley, 7-5, 8-6.

Armstrong & Ambers Meet Again Tonight

BY SID FEDER Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, Aug. 21 - (AP)—The little guy who never loses a fight and the other little guy who never drops a return match tangle in Yankee Stadium tomorrow night for 15 rounds for the world lightweight championship, in which promises to be the cauliflower "natural" of the year.

The one is Alvin Armstrong, champion of the lightweight and the other is Lou Ambers, swing-swinging socker from Herkimer, N.Y., who lost the title to the hammer-a-year ago in one of the toughest and closest tussles seen around these parts.

Some 30,000 fans probably will contribute to a gross gate of between \$120,000 and \$150,000 to see the party, which gets under way about 11 P. M. A.T.

The tussle figures so close that Armstrong, a 1-3 favorite in their first meeting, is no better than 5 to 7 now.

Some experts, remembering the brittleness of Armstrong's hands in his fight only three months ago with Ernie Roderick in England, and taking some note of the fact the game little colored clouter had a hard week taking off eight pounds to make the 135-pound limit, like Ambers slightly to regain the title he won from Tony Canzoneri. This would lead to a third fight between the two, for the welterweight laurels this fall contracts for which have already been signed with the stipulation Lou must wind up on top tomorrow night.

The whole fight seems to revolve around Armstrong's condition. The fearful pace he set in every one of his outings in his skyrocketing rise to first heights, which saw him run up a string of 46 straight victories and become the first man in fistic history to hold three titles simultaneously, makes it a large question mark as to just how long he can keep it up.
