

**City Council.**

A meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Present:—His Worship the Mayor; Councillors Ings, Lawson, Davy, Smith, Blake, Koughan, Morris and Byrne.

Read a letter from Mr. Michael Daley, asking to be relieved of payment of taxes on an unoccupied horse. No action was taken.

On motion of Councillor Ings, Messrs. Fred'k W. Hyndman and Jos. R. Brecken were appointed auditors of the city accounts during the present year.

On motion of Councillor Blake, Mr. Bernard McQuillan was appointed Keeper of Victoria Park.

On motion of Councillor Ings a bye-law imposing a tax upon horses and carriages passed a first and second reading and was committed to a committee of the whole Council. Councillor Ings moved that Councillor Blake be chairman of said committee. Councillor Koughan protested on the ground that Councillor Blake was a member of the Finance Committee. It was explained that Councillor Blake is not now a member of the Finance Committee. Councillor Blake took the chair. Councillor Koughan again protested. No notice was taken of him; and he left the room in an excited state of mind.

This put a period to the consideration of the bye-law, for the law requires the presence of eight Councillors, while a bye-law is being passed. The Committee accordingly rose without reporting.

It was moved by Councillor Blake, seconded by Councillor Byrne.

Resolved, that the Market House be painted on the outside with two good coats of No. 1 English White Lead and oil, and that the Market Committee be authorised to call for tenders and superintend the work providing the sum does not exceed Three hundred and fifty dollars.

An amendment was moved that the work be dispensed with until next spring, but it was lost.

The original motion was carried. Councillor Ings then gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would introduce a by-law relating to horses and carriages, for the purpose of taxing the same. A meeting for this purpose will be held on the 1st of September next.

Councillor Horne gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would move for a reconsideration of the appointment of the Park Keeper.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**EUROPEAN.**

LONDON, Aug. 23.

The Times says: Should the Irish peasantry be tempted to use force against the law, and should the refusal to pay rents be supported by an organization of murderous terrorism, it will be the duty of the Ministry, at whatever cost, and however reluctantly, to apply to Parliament for the largest and most efficient repressive authority.

GULISTAN, Aug. 24.

Cavalry scouts report that Ayoub Khan has moved out with his Heratense on the Kheleti Ghilzai road to oppose Gen. Roberts. Natives report a detachment of cavalry from Candahar garrison out foraging were attacked by Ayoub Khan's cavalry; the latter were repulsed.

LONDON, Aug. 24.

A Simla despatch states that in a sortie from Candahar, Brigadier-General French, Capt. Crnikshank and three Lieutenants were killed, three officers severely and two fatally wounded, 118 men killed. The enemies artillery and sharpshooters fire constantly.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 24.

Competent authorities say that the Russian harvest is the worst since the famine of 1873.

GENEVA, Aug. 24.

Bishop Herzog left Switzerland for the United States with the object of promoting a scheme for the federation of all Christian churches in the universe.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 24.

A gun burst on Monday on a Government schooner and two men were killed and eleven wounded.

ATHENS, Aug. 24.

The Russian Admiral Kremel is ordered to Cagusa where he will receive further instructions in connection with the naval demonstration. There are three Russian vessels at Ragusa which will join Admiral Kremel's vessel. The effective force of the Greek army is now 25,000.

**UNITED STATES.**

BOSTON, Aug. 24.

Gen. Grant has promised to be present in this city on Oct. 6th, when the Middlesex Club will give a banquet and reception in his honor. Governors and Senators and representatives in Congress of New England, and other prominent people will be invited.

At Chicago, yesterday morning, Simon Zimmerman, a young German, shot his wife and himself in the presence of their three young children. The affair was not discovered until late last night when the children, who were locked in with their dead parents, were heard crying by a brother of Zimmerman's.

TECSON, Aug. 23.

Reges with his hand left Sonora on Thursday, and while marching towards Tributama, was attacked by the Federal troops. It is asserted that 18 of Reges' followers were killed and the rest routed. Last Saturday the same party had a fight with Federal troops at Altar and were routed and pursued into Arizona. They had a fight at Alsess Flats, where four rebels were killed. They were pursued to Wilbur's rancho, two miles from Arivacca, where they took refuge. The Government troops surrounded the house and demanded the rebels, but employees on the rancho refused. They returned to the border for instructions.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.

The President informed the Cabinet today that he would leave Washington on Thursday to visit the Pacific coast. He will probably be absent until about November.
