

**Mickey Mantle is Convalescing**

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., (AP) — Mickey Mantle, New York Yankee outfielder, got on crutches Monday another step in his recovery from a knee operation. He hopes to leave hospital this week. Mantle underwent the operation a week ago for removal of cartilage in the right knee he injured in the 1951 World Series. He re-injured it last July.

**Fight Managers May Have Stormy Session Today**

MONTREAL, (CP)—While the principals in Wednesday's world lightweight championship fight finished off training Monday with the mildest of routines, their managers prepared for what may be a not-so-quiet session with the Montreal athletic commission.

This little get-together at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, features stout Willie Ketchum, manager, general director and pilot of champion Jimmy Carter. In the other corner will be lanky Cliff Sowers, who has a fatherly interest in Montreal's own Armand Savoie.

They must agree on minor rules, bandages and gloves. Willie says he wants "a square deal."

"We got the worst of it here the last time," proclaimed Willie, "and I'm going to insist that none of the three judges used that time be on the list again."

**Prejudiced?**

Willie recalled the night last spring when Savoie took a decision over champion Jimmy in a non-title bout, in the same Montreal Forum where the two meet Wednesday night.

"They're prejudiced in favor of Savoie; they see only one man in the ring," said Ketchum. "No judge who wasn't biased could have given the decision to Savoie that time."

Willie would "like to see Jack Dempsey in there" as referee. "Or some referee on the Pennsylvania or New York commission's staffs."

Despite Willie's squawks, there is belief that a Montreal man will get the assignment but the names of the officials won't be known until just before the fight.

Carter is favored 5 to 2 but it was reported not much money has showed. Advance ticket sale was reported at \$30,000 Monday.

**Ruling Forces Greyhounds To Release Clements**

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP)—A ruling by the Northern Ontario Hockey Association has forced the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds to release left-winger Marcel Clements.

Clements, who failed to don a uniform with the Greyhounds despite the fact he signed an agreement with the NOHA southern group senior league entry during the summer, was declared a free agent Monday and returned to his home in Sudbury.

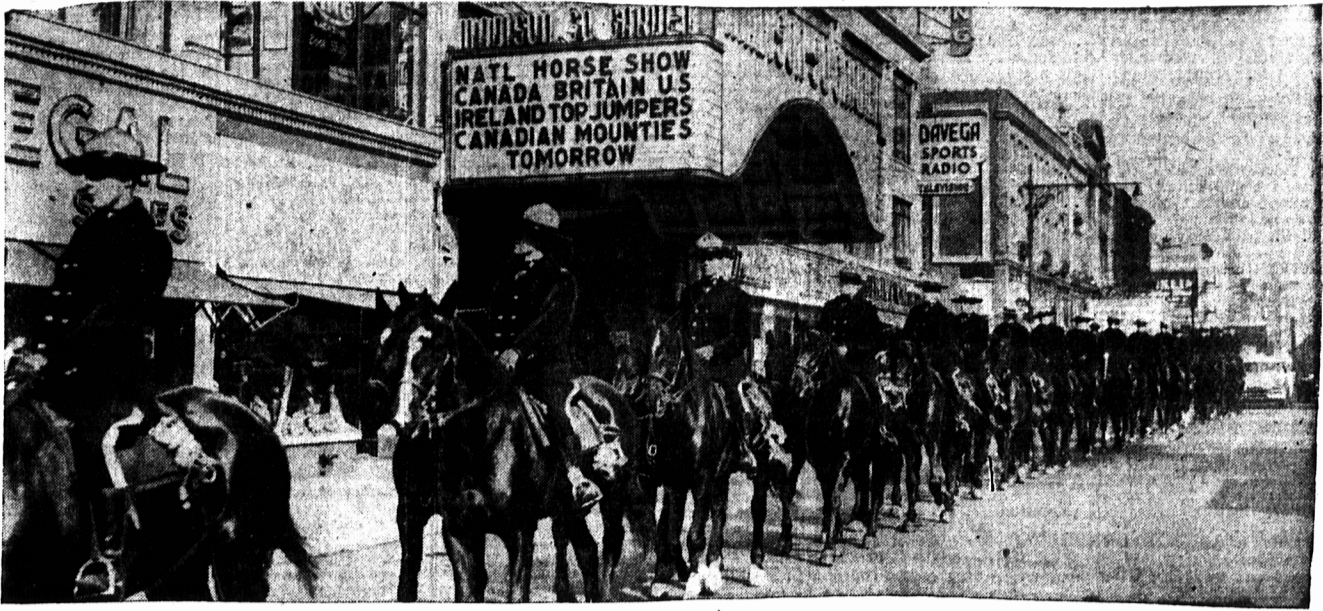
The NOHA earlier ruled that the Greyhounds must settle Clements' case by Monday or give up all rights to the former Maritime Major League star. Filled with the allotted branch-to-branch transfers, the Greyhounds seniors were forced to cut the 23-year-old winger loose.

Earlier Clements had been declared Sault property after a meeting of the NOHA. He signed agreements with both Sudbury Wolves of the NOHA and the Greyhounds prior to the opening of the 1953-54 season.

It is expected Clements will now hook on with the Wolves, who are waging a two-way fight with the Greyhounds for possession of first place in the league standings.

**Record Betting At Ontario Tracks For '53 Reported**

TORONTO, (CP)—Race-track customers poured a record \$50,000,918 into pari-mutuel betting machines at Ontario tracks in 1953, an increase of \$8,392,885 over the 1952 figure of \$41,602,048, the previous high.

This year's figure would have been higher but for a burst of winter weather which led to cancellation of the last two days of racing at Dufferin Park in Toronto Saturday and Monday.

The 1952 total came from 157 days of racing, 11 more than the 146 days of 1953.

Racing in Ontario this year was at Dufferin, Long Branch and Woodbine at Toronto and Fort Erie in the Niagara peninsula. There was no thoroughbred racing at Stamford Park near Niagara Falls, Thorncliffe at Toronto and Hamilton, which operated in 1952.

**Club Buys Charters**

The Ontario Jockey Club, which has conducted racing at Woodbine for years, purchased the charters and assets of the Hamilton, Thorncliffe and Stamford tracks in a consolidation move which has as its eventual aim establishment of a new racing plant in the Toronto area. It also purchased the Fort Erie charter and track and embarked on a modernization program there.

The Open Interests of Toronto, which own Long Branch and Dufferin, also operated their Ascot charter on the Fort Erie track for one week.

Long Branch, which had 14 more days racing than in 1952, showed the biggest increase in mutual handle with a total for the year of \$10,978,631 up \$4,801,639 from the 1952 total of \$6,084,992.

Fort Erie was up \$1,872,037 with a total of \$8,203,355 compared with \$6,331,398.
