# Marlene Stewart Advances To Quarter-Finals In Golf

GANTON, England (CP)—Pert Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ont., wearing bright tartan trousers, reached the quarter-final Tuesday in the defence of her British women's golf championship.

The 20-year-old Canadian reached the quarter-finals with a thrilling 19-hole victory over Irish champion Philomena Garvey following an earlier 4 and 3 victory over Margaret (Wiffy) Smith, 17-year-old challenger from Pasadena, Calif.

Miss Garvey was runner-up to Marlene in last year's British championship at Porthcawl, Wales, where she lost 7 and 6.

This year it was much closer. The Irish champion squared the match at the 16th after Marlene bunkered her second shot. Marlene shot a 36 on the front nine to lead two up. She was outdriving her opponent and playing a better short game. Marlene went three up at the 12th where Miss Garvey was bunkered.

Marlene three-putted the 13th where she drove into some trees. Miss Garvey squared the match at the 16th, where Marlene drove

into the bunkers on her second shot.

**UNUSUAL RULING**

An unusual ruling was made at the 17th. Marlene was allowed to move her ball without penalty from a patch of ground behind the hole. It was ruled that the depression had been caused by a roller. Marlene dropped on a clear spot and laid her chip dead for a half.

The 18th was halved and Marlene clinched the match at the 19th where Miss Garvey was bunkered and Marlene shot a four.

Miss Smith couldn't match Marlene's steadiness in the morning round. Three down at the turn, she won the 11th hole to keep within striking distance. But the diminutive Canadian closed her out with a four on the 15th where Wiffy three-putted after reaching the green in two.

In today's quarter-finals, Marlene plays Arlette Jacquet of Belgium, who defeated Jean Macin of England one up, and Miss A. E. Schiff of Holland, 5 and 4, in Tuesday's matches.

# Flyers Whip Stars 10-0 In City League Contest

Lorne MacDougall pitched for the Stars and allowed only five hits. He gave up three of these hits in the first inning when the Stars defenses collapsed allowing the Flyers to score eight unearned runs.

From the second inning through to the sixth MacDonald set the Flyers down without a hit. In the sixth inning the Flyers obtained two hits, a single by Forbes Kennedy and a fluke double by Vern Handrahan. MacDougall struck out four men and walked eight while MacDonald struck out five and walked four.

The Stars committed five errors in the first inning. The Flyers ran wild to score nine times. Forbes Kennedy and Malcolm MacFadyen hit back to back singles with MacFadyen driving home two runs. Willie Dunn hit a double on his second trip to the plate to account for two more runs. MacDougall issued four walks during this inning.

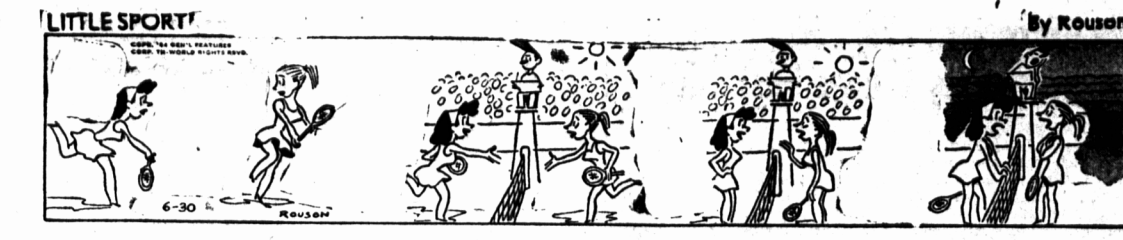

# Chase Decisions Poulton To Win Canadian Crown

SAINT JOHN, N. B. (CP)—Charlie Chase of Montreal won the Canadian middleweight boxing championship Tuesday night with a unanimous 12-round decision over Charlottetown's Harry (Kid) Poulton. The title had been vacant. Chase weighed 157 and Poulton 156. The winner showed general superiority and proved a faster puncher.

Judge Gerry Donovan gave seven rounds to Chase, two to Poulton and called three even. Danny Lee saw it as seven, one and four, in the same order, and the other judge, J. O. Johnson, favored Chase in every round.

The bout was sanctioned by the Canadian Boxing and Wrestling Federation which ordered the winner to meet Lou Lawrence of Vancouver or another suitable opponent within 30 days.

Poulton replaced Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N.B., as top middleweight in the Maritimes when the latter moved up to a heavier division.

Chase gained a technical knockout over Cary Simon of New Glasgow, N.S., in a bout here last month.
