PM Opens Debate With Blast At The Big Powers

UN Votes 10 Million For Initial Costs Of Force

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (CP) — The UN assembly overrode Russian objections Monday night and approved a grant of \$10,000 to pay the initial costs of the emergency police force in Egypt.

REJECT RESPONSIBILITY

After the vote was taken the assembly adjourned at 6:26 p.m. EST until 10:30 a.m. today with two more speakers, one of them Egypt, still to be heard on the Middle East situation.

LONDON (Reuters)—The government promised Monday not to retaliate against 1,100 Egyptians in Britain for the threatened expulsion of 13,000 British nationals from Egypt.

Acting P.C. Leader Charges Gov't. Tagging After U. S.

OTTAWA (CP)—The special session of Parliament opened Monday with a powerful blast from Prime Minister St. Laurent at the big powers of the world.

INVITATION TO DISASTER

He said there is no disagreement about the desirability of the UN force to patrol the canal and keep the peace in Egypt. But he assailed the government for abstaining from voting at the UN General Assembly last weekend on a U.S. resolution calling for immediate withdrawal of British, French and Israeli troops from Egypt.

NON-CONFIDENCE MOTION

Mr. Rowe said the intervention was "designed to prevent a major war in the Suez area." By meekly following "unrealistic" United States policies, the Canadian government had "encouraged a truculent and defiant attitude on the part of the Egyptian dictator."

SUPERMAN ERA ENDING

In his speech, Mr. St. Laurent said he had been told that with respect to the veto, if the Russians had not insisted upon it, the United States and the United Kingdom would have insisted upon it because they could not allow this crowd of smaller nations to deal with questions concerning their vital interests.

PROPOSAL FELT SHORT

Canada had abstained from voting on the U.S. cease-fire proposal because Canada felt the proposed resolution did not go far enough. The Canadian delegate did not speak before the vote because the assembly chairman had limited debate to six speakers.

Iraq In Appeal For American Jets, Anti-Aircraft Weapons

PROMPT CONSIDERATION

State department officials, who had been seriously concerned over reports of new Soviet agents reaching Syria, said they would give prompt consideration to Iraq's request.
