## MONDAY

**CONFIRMATION CONFERRED** — His Excellency Bishop James Boyle conferred the sacrament of Confirmation on 110 children at the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer yesterday afternoon. Following the ceremony Bishop Boyle celebrated Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament assisted by Very Rev. E. Baldwin, C.S.S.R. as deacon and Rev. J. MacGillivray, C.S.S.R. as sub-deacon. Rev. P. J. Henessey, D.S.S.R. was master of ceremonies.

**GENEROUS DONATION.** — An early morning visitor to the Provincial Red Cross Headquarters was a Junior Red Cross member from Millville School. The members of his Branch had a special collection at their meeting Friday afternoon at 7:40 in the Red Cross Emergency shelter in Manitoba. This will be forwarded to National Red Cross Headquarters in Toronto to go towards the heavy expenditures the Society is under in connection with the Winnipeg floods where thousands are being spent every day on emergency housing, feeding, clothing, etc.

A Charlottetown man, John Strain, was found dead in his room at a boarding house on Sydney Street about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Cause of death has not been determined but it was thought due to natural causes.

The body was discovered by City Police after the landlady reported that the deceased had not been seen during the day and that his room door was locked. He was last seen at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The body was taken to the morgue and it will be decided today whether or not an inquest will be held.

**DIES IN WINNIPEG.** — Mrs. Ida Josephine MacLeod, 70, widow of Alexander MacLeod of 638 Strathcona street, Winnipeg, died Thursday at her home. Born in Belfast, P.E.I., in 1879. Mrs. MacLeod came west in 1912. She lived in Hartney, Boissevain, Emerson and Crystal City prior to coming to Winnipeg in 1933. Her husband died in 1938. Surviving are five sons, Blair and Melvin of Winnipeg, Burton of Dartmouth, N.S., Douglas of Calgary and Dixon of Melville, Sask.; a sister, Harriet of Boston; and three granddaughters. The funeral service was held at 245 P. M. Saturday at the home of Mrs. MacLeod. The body was taken to Boissevain for burial in the family plot where Rev. F. Mitchell officiated at the graveside ceremony. In 1947 Mrs. MacLeod spent her vacation on the Island among her many relatives and friends.

Prince of Wales College was cordially welcomed as a new member and given full recognition at the annual sessions of the Maritime Universities' Council held on the Mount Allison Campus, Sackville last Friday and Saturday. Some 40 members were present from Acadia, Dalhousie, U.N.B., Mount Allison, St. Mary's, Nova Scotia Technical College and Prince of Wales College.

Problems common to Maritime Universities were under discussion. These included teaching methods, the combining of liberal and technical education, the status of research in universities of the Maritime Provinces, the response of the university and adult education, and the teaching of Political Science in the Maritime Universities.

Representing Prince of Wales College at the conference were Dr. Frank MacKinnon and Professor Gordon Bennett. Dr. MacKinnon led the discussion on the role of Political Science in the Maritimes.

A four months-old child, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Grant, Martinvale, died as result of a fire which destroyed the home and all outbuildings Saturday afternoon.

The child was resting in the kitchen when the fire broke out, apparently from an overheated stove. The mother had just left the house to do some work outside. Looking back she saw flames coming from the kitchen. Attempting a rescue she was driven back by smoke and flames.

A neighbour, Elmer Grant, on hearing screams raced across several fields to the scene of the fire and after several attempts succeeded in bringing out the then three months old child.

At the time of the fire the father was away fencing and was unaware of the tragedy.

The fire occurred about four o'clock. The two-storey house, a barn and two outbuildings were destroyed. It represented 12 years work of Mr. and Mrs. Grant in establishing a home in the district.

There are three other children in the family, two girls and a boy. It was not known if the buildings were insured.

Martinvale is about 12 miles north of Montague.

Hon. Joseph A. Bernard was appointed Lieutenant-Governor of this Province on May 30, 1945, and today completes five years in that office. It is anticipated on his retirement he will be succeeded by Hon. T. W. L. Prowse, former member for Charlottetown in the Provincial Legislature.

Both the Liberal and Conservative Parties are in search of leaders at the present time. In the case of the Liberals the choice seems to be between Hon. A. W. Matheson, Hon. Walter Darby, K. C., Hon. Eugene Cullen and Hon. Fred A. Large. So far as the Conservative Party is concerned, the names most prominently mentioned are Mr. D. L. Matheson, K.C., M.L.A., Mr. R. R. Bell, K. C., M.L.A., Mr. Heath Strong, K. C., Col. Ernest Strong, K.C., and Mr. Walter R. Shaw, who at present is in Europe. Nothing definite is known regarding the plan of campaign for the appointment of the leaders but it is understood as far as the Conservatives are concerned everything will be in readiness by the 27th inst. when the Provincial Conservative Association meeting takes place.

Seven British Agricultural Scientists will pay a three day visit to this Province from July 9 to July 11 this year as one phase of a two months Canadian tour sponsored by the Canadian Government and Dominion Department of Agriculture.

Hon. C. C. Byker, Minister of Agriculture is honorary chairman of the committee formed by Mr. R. C. Parent, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm to entertain the visitors. Committee members are: Richard Hurst, Stewart Wright, Richard Hurst, S. C. Peppin, H. W. Gray and Fred Nash of Charlottetown, Lorne MacFarlane of Summerside and Austin Scales of Freetown.

The British scientists are returning a visit made by 10 Canadian scientists to Britain last year. At that time the Canadian agriculturalists were entertained by the British Government.

Visiting scientists will include: Sir William Osg, Director of the Rothamstead Experimental Station; Dr. D. P. Cuthbertson, Director of the Rowett Research Institute, Aberdeen; Professor W. Ellison, Professor of Crop Husbandry, University College of Wales, Aberystwyth, Mr. J. H. Anderson, Regional Director, Eastern Division, National Agricultural Advisory Service, Cambridge.

**OTTAWA, May 30** — (Special) — A spur of the Trans-Canada highway will run from the New Brunswick-Nova Scotia border near Amherst, N.S. to Cape Tormentine to link up with the National highway in Prince Edward Island. Renwick and Development Minister Winters told the House of Commons today.

Announcing that New Brunswick had reconsidered its stand of a month ago and decided to sign an agreement for the highway with the Federal Government, Mr. Winters announced the route. It will begin near Edmundston on the New Brunswick-Quebec border and follow the St. John River to Grand Falls, Woodstock and Fredericton. Thence the highway will swing east to Essex, Moncton and Sackville, ending a short distance north of Amherst.

In signing the Trans-Canada agreement, New Brunswick became the second of the Maritime Provinces to do so. Prince Edward Island having agreed to the agreement at the first conference last month in Ottawa. New Brunswick Highways Minister W. S. Anderson was doubtful at the conference if his Province was ready to meet the financial obligations embodied in the agreement. It has now been decided that the benefits outweigh the financial burden as far as New Brunswick is concerned.

Mr. Winters' department has received no definite word as yet as to whether Nova Scotia will sign to meet the Trans-Canada Highway this summer. Quebec still holds aloof from the agreement, but her roads from New Brunswick to Ontario for the next part measure up to and in some cases are far above Trans-Canada specifications.

Hence with the New Brunswick agreement signed, Prince Edward Island is assured within the next few years of excellent highway connections to and from the eight Provinces to the west. Newfoundland is expected to sign the agreement as soon as a few financial stumbling-blocks are removed.

The advent of summer has resulted in stepped-up activity at the Charlottetown Airport.

Maritime Central Airways planes have made three flights to Goose Bay, Labrador, with gangs of construction workers. A dozen or more flights are scheduled, it was announced yesterday by Capt. Carl Burke, M. C. A. manager.

In July M. C. A. will transport 20 loads of strawberries to Boston and Montreal markets. This marks an expanding movement by air of the berry crop to outside markets. It is expected that the bulk of the 20 loads will be moved inside a two week period.

M. C. A. has been authorized also to transport reserve army units to summer camps.

There will be about 20 pilots employed in the increased air ferrying operations during the summer period Capt. Burke stated.

Some 1,500 Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland Reserve Army troops, Army Cadets and Sea Cadets will be transported to summer training camps by air, it was learned yesterday.

The history-making movement of Army and Navy personnel by air transport will be made by Maritime Central Airways Ltd. M.C.A. will use DC 3's on the operation each carrying from 27 to 29 passengers.

Units which will be transported from here by air include, Prince Edward Island Regiment (17th Recce), Lt.-Col. A. W. Rogers ED, officer commanding; the 28th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment, R. C. A. F., Lt.-Col. G. G. K. Peake, D.S.O., ED, officer commanding; and the 5 Signals Regiment, (RCOS), Lt. Col. Keith Johnston, officer commanding.
