

Cards Win To Gain On Braves; Yanks Win Twice

Staggering Milwaukee saw its National League lead shrink to 2 1/2 games Sunday as the Braves bowed to Philadelphia 3-2 in 10 innings and the surging St. Louis Cardinals took a pair from Pittsburgh, 9-6 and 11-3.

Losing eight of their last 11 games, Milwaukee has scored only 14 runs in their last seven games. Ted Kazanski's single in the 10th won for the Phillies, who had tied the score against Warren Spahn in the ninth.

The Cardinals ripped into Pirate pitching for 24 hits, including two homers by Wally Moon and one each by Ken Boyer and Walker Cooper as they closed the gap. Herm Wehmeier and Sam Jones were the winners although each required relief help.

New York Yankees stretched their American League lead over Chicago to 5 1/2 games with 10 games to go by whipping Kansas City twice, 5-3 and 3-0. Tommy Byrne's three-run pinch homer was the big blow of the opener

as the Yanks rallied for five in the seventh. Don Larsen allowed only three singles in the second game, pitching his first shutout since his perfect game against Brooklyn in the 1956 world series.

LOST GROUND
Chicago won a single game, scoring three in the ninth to nip Washington 3-1 but lost ground.

Any combination of Yankee victories and white Sox defeats totalling seven will clinch the pennant for New York.

If the American League race was nearly over, the National had new life pumped into it by the Cards' success and the Braves' slump. The three-game series between the Cards and Braves at Milwaukee, Sept. 22-24-25 now looks as the big event of the year.

Warren Spahn was trying to win his 20th for the Braves. If

he had succeeded he would have tied the major league record for left-handers.

Spahn led 2-1 going to the ninth, with Ed Bouchee's homer the only Phil run. In the ninth, singles by Willie Jones and Richie Ashburn and Chico Fernandez safe bunt loaded the bases. The tying run scored as Bouchee hit into a double play.

After two hits in the 10th chased Spahn, Kaanski singled off Bob Trowbridge to win it for Dick Farrell, who worked the last two innings after Curt Simmons was lifted for a pinch-hitter.

Boyer and Cooper hit homers during a six-run spurt in the fifth inning for St. Louis' opening game victory. Herm Wehmeier won his fifth in a row and 10th of the year but needed help from Billy Muffett and Lloyd Merritt

in the eighth.

Moon hammered two homers in the second game romp in which the Cardinals scored five in the first to knock out Art Swanson.

Cincinnati thumped Brooklyn 11-6 although the Redlegs had some anxious moments in the ninth as the Dodgers chipped away at their 11-2 lead. Winning pitcher Hal Jeffcoat, Bob Thurman, Ed Bailey and Frank Robinson homered for the Redlegs, who knocked out Don Newcombe in the fifth.

Chicago Cubs won two from New York Giants 6-2 and 7-6. Bob Rush went the distance in the Dale Long and Bob Speake. Later in the game Long suffered a neck injury. The second game was won by rookie Ed Haas' pinch single with the bases loaded and the score tied.

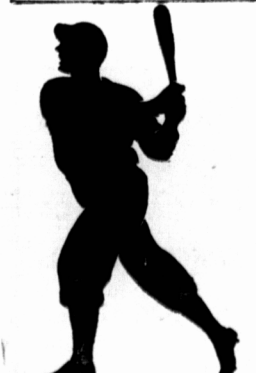
Royals will meet the Nova Scotia winners next weekend. Trenton and Liverpool are entered in the N.S. finals.

Hamilton Tiger-Cats, sparked by the determined driving of Gerry McDougall and end Paul Dekker, staged a final quarter comeback Saturday to defeat Ottawa Rough Riders 18-14 and take over first place in the Big Four Football Union.

Montreal Alouettes, showing their best offensive display of the season, defeated a surprisingly ineffective Toronto Argonaut team 43-1. Ottawa and Montreal now have six victories and two losses.

Mexicans Win Tuna Ch'ships

WEDGEPORT, N.S. (CP)—Mexico joined the circle of three-time winners of the international tuna cup here Saturday on the strength of a 655-pound opening day catch.

Final standings for the 1957 tournament gave Mexico 1,221 points; Cuba 651 points; the British Commonwealth 616; Peru, Spain, the United States and Venezuela, none.

Mexico received 200 bonus points for catching the largest tuna in the series. The champions, together with the British and Cubans, divided another 200 points for most fish in the tournament. Each had one catch.

In a dramatic bid to offset Mexico's first-day success, the British Commonwealth held six other competing teams, Wedgeport presidents, visitors and press representatives in suspense for an hour after the official close of the tournament.

Dr. Jan Gideon Nels of Germiston, Transvaal, South Africa tied into a battling bluefin at 11:58 a.m. Dr. Nels battled in the swirling rip waters off Spectacle Island for one hour and 37 minutes before the tuna was close enough to gaff and heave aboard his vessel, the Blue Mary.

The official weigh-in gave the exact poundage for the British catch as 595.

Mexico, the British Commonwealth, the U.S. and Cuba have each won the heavy tackle classic three times now. Last year's

champions, the Commonwealth squad, also won on the strength of one fish, a 648-pounder. And as in 1956 this year's series produced a total of three bluefin.

Mexico's six-man crew was jubilant, especially engineer Juan de Dios de la Torre of Guadalajara whose 655-pound prize boated Wednesday morning provided the championship. Not on hand to see the presentation of the Allan B. Sharp trophy to his teammates was Mexican captain Roberto Cantu Arreola. Several days before the start of the tournament Arreola was injured in a fall from a horse.

Cuba's catch was a second-day 485-pounder, taken by Gonalo Nune of Havana. The Mexicans almost had insurance Saturday when Francisco Corcuera began an early-morning tussle on the Rip waters. His fish, however, pulled free in two minutes.

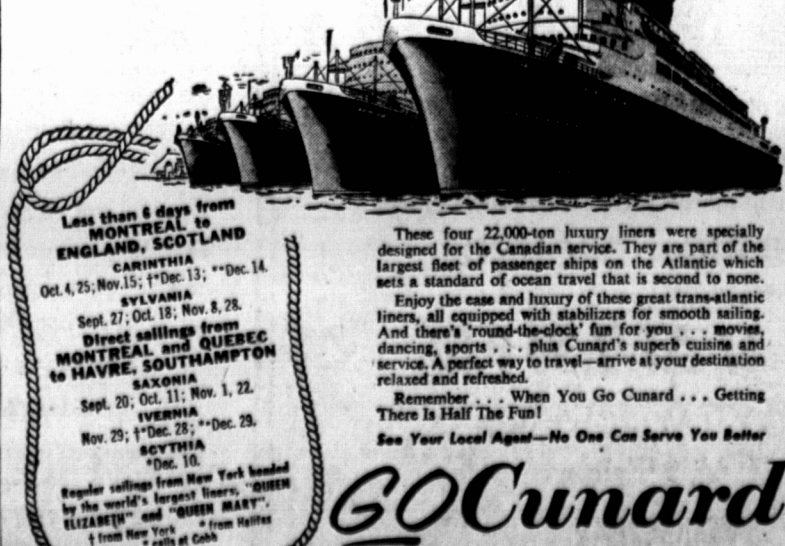
