## School Chairman Is Disappointed

**MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
Eighteen rate payers at this annual meeting is a disgrace stated Gilbert R. Clements, chairman of the Montague Ele-

mentary School at the annual meeting held last evening in the school auditorium.

"This school is important business and a much larger attendance would have been appreciated," he made this statement previous to presenting his annual report.

In his report he advised two teachers Mrs. A.G.J. Steeves and Mrs. Bessie Martin were leaving. Mrs. Steeves is moving from the province and Mrs. Martin is retiring. He said replacements have been procured and will take up their office for next term. He also advised that although more money would be required for the operation of the school for the next year, there would be no increase in taxes. On motion \$89,105 was voted as budget for the ensuing year. In answer to an inquiry from the floor he advised the debt of the school was \$59,690.

W.R. Doane, auditor of the books and who were re-appointed for the next year stated they found the books to be correct and outlined the following: outstanding taxes receivable at the end of the year decreased slightly in the amount of \$297, compared to the same date last year. Taxes collected during the year totalled \$36,728 — arrears \$7,193 — current year's assessments \$31,334. Scheduled payments on long-term indebtedness of \$4,939 have been made by the district on maturity dates.

The matter of consolidated schools came in for discussion especially in its effect on the Montague school district. A wait and see approach with further information to be obtained from the department of education with a general meeting to be called if necessary, concluded the discussion.

The possible assessment of \$3 to be added to the school tax for fire protection by the Montague Fire Brigade for the rate payers on the outskirts of the town was dropped. It was felt this method might simplify the matter for the rate payer and the brigade and assure all of the protection of a fire department. At present a large number of residents in this area are not covered and will remain unprotected until their fee of \$3.00 is paid.

Mrs. Marjorie Fraser, secretary recorded the minutes and clarified several points in the school operation for those present.
