

Angie Carroll Stars As Royals Nip Aces 4-3

Man, what a game!—All 77 minutes and 47 seconds of Angie Carroll won the game for Charlottetown after three periods of regular time, 10 minutes overtime and seventeen minutes, 47 seconds of sudden death, in one of the best games seen in recent years at the Charlottetown Sports Arena.

Approximately 2,400 fans turned out to cheer their favorites and cheer they did.

The Royals drew first blood in the opening period when Orin Carver denied the twines, with the help of linemates Buck Whitlock and Angie Carroll. At the 15:40 mark Wally Shepherd made a 2-0 for the Royals, but the Aces rallied back and at the 17 minutes mark made the score 2-1, on a goal by Uric Gallant, his first of a pair.

The only goal in the sandwich session was fired by Uric Gallant at the 10:48 mark on the session, and from then till the end of the period both teams worked hard, but neither squad could break the tie.

The third period was scoreless, but only through the efforts of the goaltending goalie, Frankie Roper for the Royals and Thane Mann for the Aces.

This being a playoff game, a ten-minute overtime period was called, due to the score being knotted at 2-2.

Aces went into the lead at the 4:07 mark of this session, when Benny Grady took the puck from his own blue line all the way to outguess Frankie Roper. The game was far from over however, as Angie Carroll soon proved. Fans Of 2 Nations Watch Progress Of Young Pitcher

PENTICTON, B.C.—(CP)—Baseball fans of two nations are keenly watching this southern British Columbia fruit-growing centre.

Twenty-three-year-old Ted Bowsfield caught their fancy late last summer with three straight pitching victories over the world champion New York Yankees. Twice he prevented bullet Bob Turley from gaining his 20th pitching victory of the season.

When Boston Red Sox rolled into New York for a four-game season-opening series, Bowsfield was on the spot to prove that last season was not a flash in the pan.

Bowsfield is confident he'll get one of the starting assignments and just as confident he'll prove the Yankees can be beat, again.

Ted was refused permission to play winter baseball by the Boston management. So, for working out at home here, he built himself a plastic-covered pen, 80 feet long, nine feet high and six wide, to keep the snow off the ground and the brisk wind from interfering with his throwing.

Each day he and Alan Richards, a 17-year-old neighbor with major league dreams of his own, worked out in the make-shift pen. Bowsfield himself was 18 when he signed a Boston contract for the regular \$4,000 fee.

It was three years before the six-foot, one-inch 190-pounder got his first break and signed with a triple-A club, the San Francisco Seals in 1956.

"I felt I was really on my way because many of the players on our team and playing against us were either going to or coming from the majors," he said.

BUGGED BY INJURIES
That first break, however, almost turned into a nightmare.

Bowsfield broke his leg in his first game and when he got back into action late in August he was knocked out for the season by a line drive. Neither injury had had any permanent effect.

"The next season I was down with Oklahoma of the double-A Texas League. I guess they didn't think I was ready for triple-A."

Although Ted finished with an unspectacular 7-10 record his 2.54 earned run average, third best in the league, earned him another chance at higher calibre baseball. He was sent to Minneapolis Min-

nesota of the American Association and when called up at mid-season by Boston had a nifty 8-4 record and a solid 2.64 ERA, again third best in the league.

HAD 4-2 RECORD
Bowsfield entered 22 big-league games, started eight, finished three and ended the season with a 4-2 record.

Canada Tops Russia 3-1 In Probable Title Clincher

PRAGUE (CP)—Canada defeated Russia 3-1 Wednesday in a do-or-die game that cleared the way for another title in the world hockey championships.

Playing it cautious and cool, the Belleville, Ont. team protected an early lead in the struggle seen by observers as the deciding moment in the championships, although other contests remain.

The undefeated Canadians, defending champions, played shut-out hockey until 12:50 of the third period. Dennis Boucher and Moe Benoit fired goals in the first period and playing-coach Ike Hildebrand tallied in the third before the Russians scored. The second period was scoreless. Victor Yakushev was the Russian marksman.

THREE-WAY TIE
With Russia going down for its first loss, the victory put Canada in a first-place points-tie with Czechoslovakia and the United States.

But the Belleville team is considered a certainty to take its remaining three games—against Sweden today, the U.S. Saturday and the Czechs Sunday, the final.

Canada had shutouts over Poland and Switzerland in last week's preliminary rounds and

defeated the Czechs 7-2. On the opening day of the finals Monday, Canada defeated Finland 6-0.

The Russians also had three preliminary victories and proclaimed the U.S. 5-1 in a final game. They're considered likely to win their remaining three games—against the Czechs, Finns and Swedes.

All eyes were on the Canadian-Russian clash and it turned out to be a close-checking, clean game featured by brilliant goaltending. The only other action of the day was a 10-3 victory by the U.S. over Finland.

TWO QUICK GOALS
The Canadians got off ahead when Boucher, 25-year-old right winger from Montreal, took a goal-mouth pass to score after nine minutes. Three minutes later Moe Benoit, another winger, finished off a two-man rush by poking the puck into an open corner of the net.

After a scoreless second period, in which the Canadians didn't have a shot in the first five minutes, each team scored once in the third.

The Canadians mobbed goalie Gordie Bell after the game and whooped it up for 10 minutes before lining up for the closing ceremony. They acted as if they had already won the title.

Gordie (Red) Berenson, with an assist on Boucher's goal, held his place in a tie for the scoring leadership with Russia's Eugeny Grubchev, who also had an assist Wednesday. Each has 10 points.
