Pair Sentenced On Break Count

GEORGETOWN — A large docket confronted Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

Miss Kinko Saito, public prosecutor for Yokohama district, Japan who is on tour to observe Canadian court procedure in the various provinces was in attendance in court.

J. Arthur McGuigan, represented the Crown in all cases. Grain Cheques To Be Issued Soon

Compensation cheques for Island grain growers who incurred crop losses because of last year's bad weather will probably be issued in about two weeks. Agriculture Minister A. Andrew MacRae said yesterday. The provincial government set up a \$15,000 fund from which the compensation will be paid. "We will pay the claims," said Mr. MacRae, "and later bill the federal government for half of the cost." About 1,300 growers were unable to harvest approximately 7,000 acres of grain last year. Rate of compensation is expected to be \$15.81 per acre.

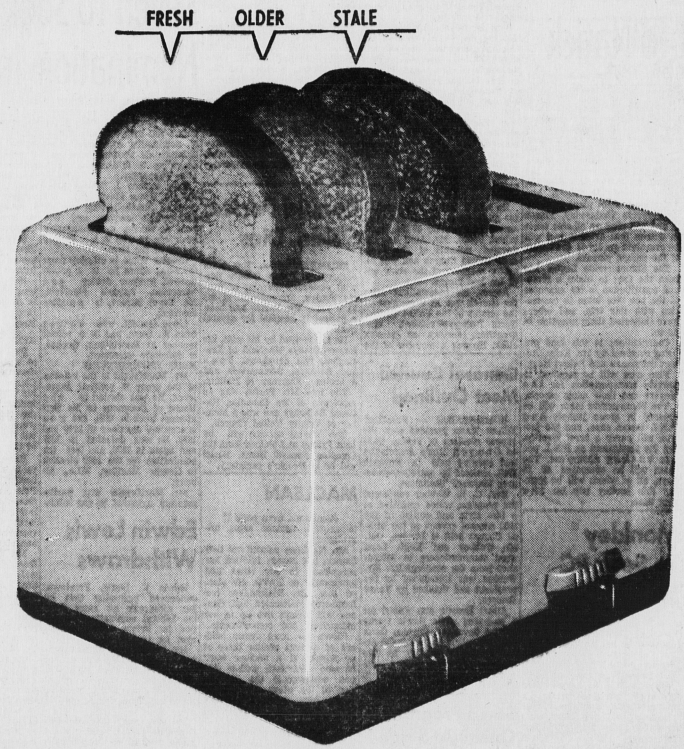
