

Yank Heads Famous Scottish Golf Club

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, Sept. 19 (AP)—Francis Oulmet, one-time boy wonder of American golf, became the first American captain of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews today as an antique cannon boomed the traditional salute.

Oulmet, who achieved fame in 1913 by beating Britain's Harry Gardon and Ted Ray in a playoff for the American open championship, whacked a drive 180 yards down the fairway on the first hole as the climax of the traditional ceremony of "playing himself in" as captain.

Later, wearing a red tall coat and the Queen Adelaide medal, tokens of his new office, he presided at the club dinner.

Friends from Boston watched when Willie Auchterlonie, 78-year-old Royal and Ancient pro, teed up the ball. Oulmet took a few practice swings then made a perfect drive on what has been called the most nerve-racking stroke in golf.

Decrease Shown In Egg Receipts

Egg receipts on P. E. I. as reported through registered grading stations shows a decrease, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, poultry products supervisor. Ideal harvest weaker last week may have slowed up the delivery of eggs to grading stations.

The volume of small eggs is increasing. Sales are regular to other Atlantic Provinces, and some shipments are moving to Montreal.

Paying prices have been increased from last week's values.

Producers are now receiving for ungraded eggs: A Large 57, A Medium 49, A Small 40, Grade B 42, Grade C 27. Dealers are quoting for the graded pack: A Large 65, A Medium 57, A Small 48, Grade B 50, Grade C 35. Wholesale prices are quoted by retailers for A Large 67-68, A Medium 59-60, A Small 50-51, Grade B 52-53, Grade C 37-38.

Consumers are paying for A Large (loose) 73-76, A Medium 67-69, A Small 59, Grade B 61-66. In cartons 3 to 5 cents more.

Poultry receipts are considered heavy at this time. Chickens made up the bulk of receipts. Sales are light and storage holdings are accumulating. Prices have been reduced. Live chicken No. 1 over 6 lbs. 31, 5 to 6, 29, live fowl No. 1, 5 1/2 and up to 26, 4 1/2 to 5 1/2. Dressed chicken over 5 lbs. Grade A 41, Grade B 36; Fowl 5 lbs. and up Grade A 33, Grade B 31. Dealers are now quoting for young turkeys, under 18 lbs. Grade A 52, Grade B 47, young turkeys over 18 lbs. Grade A 40, Grade B 35. Old toms Grade A 39, Grade B 34.

Canada - Wide Drop In Hog Prices Noted

The housewife shying away from the butcher shop in recent months—or years—could move in more confidently today. Pork is cheaper.

The decline on the country's livestock market, already being reflected in retail stores, has been under way about two weeks. The reason, as outlined by leading packers: a seasonal upsurge in hog marketing and consumer resistance to high meat prices.

One packinghouse official in Toronto predicted "tremendous reductions" in pork prices in retail stores this week. Some sample prices in Toronto: Shoulder, 47 cents; butts, 61 cents; loin, 75 cents a pound.

Hog prices in livestock markets across Canada have dropped from \$4.75 to \$7.50 a hundredweight in the last two weeks as more animals are brought to market in the east. The hog run in Western Canada has not yet started, but western prices follow the pattern.

The prevailing price now stands around \$29 a hundredweight.

During the summer, Canada produced less pork than she needed to supply Canadians, and prices rose. Now Canadian prices are falling in line with world market prices, the official said.

Smoked meats which take longer to process will take longer to drop in price in the stores.

In the Maritimes prices now are about \$29.50 a hundredweight except in Charlottetown where the price is \$28.50. These prices are about \$4.75 lower than two weeks ago.

One good source, who did not wish to be quoted by name said the drop may be the result of packing houses building up their stock of pork to force lower prices.

Anniversary L.O.B.A. Meeting

Rules For Potato Crop Harvesting

The spores of the late blight fungus which cause rot in the potato crop are in all probability present in very large numbers in the top soil of many potato fields of the Province.

Weather conditions from now until harvest will determine the amount of rot which will develop. Heavy rains would likely induce more rot whereas drying winds and sunshine would reduce the hazard by killing the spores before they can reach the tubers.

All growers are therefore advised by Mr. S.G. Peppin, technical advisor to the Potato Marketing Board, to follow these rules before harvesting the potato crop. 1. Do not harvest a potato field which is partly green, or doing so you are inviting trouble. 2. Fields which are partly affected with blight should be killed now with a standard top-killer. All fields which remain green or partly green as of October 1st should be top-killed as of that date.

3. Allow at least ten days or two weeks after tops are dead before attempting to harvest.

4. Blight spores thrive on moisture, so harvest your crop when the soil is reasonably dry.

5. Choose a sunny day if at all possible, and leave the tubers on the ground for an hour or so to dry thoroughly before picking.

6. Leave all rotted tubers in the field. This is important as sometimes the live spores are carried to the storage on partly rotted tubers.

7. Keep the storage well ventilated to carry off excess moisture.

8. Handle potatoes carefully. Bruised or damaged potatoes not only develop storage rot more readily than sound ones but are also unmarketable. Warn all pickers and truckers that potatoes are worth money and every care must be exercised to prevent unnecessary damage. This applies not only to harvest time but also when grading and hauling to market, loading cars, ships, etc.

Many Blood Donors For injured Children

CAMPINAS, Brazil, Sept. 19 (AP)—Long lines of blood donors formed today to give transfusions for injured survivors of a movie theatre collapse that killed 25 youngsters watching a comedy film yesterday.

Most of the 1,000 or so in the matinee audience were children. The dead ranged in age from 12 to 22.

Estimates of the injured range from 300 to 800 and 65 survivors are known to be in grave condition. The roof of the old show-house fell in on them.

New Paper To Combat Red Propaganda

TORONTO, Sept. 18 (CP)—The first edition of a weekly Bulgarian-language newspaper, designed to combat Communist propaganda in North America, was published today.

"Today we start to fight back," said Dr. Ivan Doocheff, a displaced person who came to Canada in May and now works in a Toronto furniture factory.

"I was jolted from my dreams of peace as soon as I got here," he told an interviewer. "Along with several other Bulgarian displaced persons I soon received a copy of the Communist newspaper being circulated here, written in the Bulgarian language and publishing lies about conditions at home and about free people in democ-

New Chemical Plant In Quebec

MONTREAL, Sept. 19 (CP)—A new chemical company which will build a \$2,000,000 plant in Quebec is planned by Shawinigan Chemicals, Ltd., Montreal, and Heyden Chemical Corporation, New York.

The two companies in making the announcement said they will be equal partners in the new enterprise. Application for Canadian incorporation is under way and engineering plans are well advanced. The site will be within the territory served by Shawinigan Water and Power Company, parent company of Shawinigan Chemicals. The program depends upon approval by the Canadian Defence Production Department.

The projected plant will manufacture a chemical base for quick-drying weather-resistant paints, now used industrially and in pro-

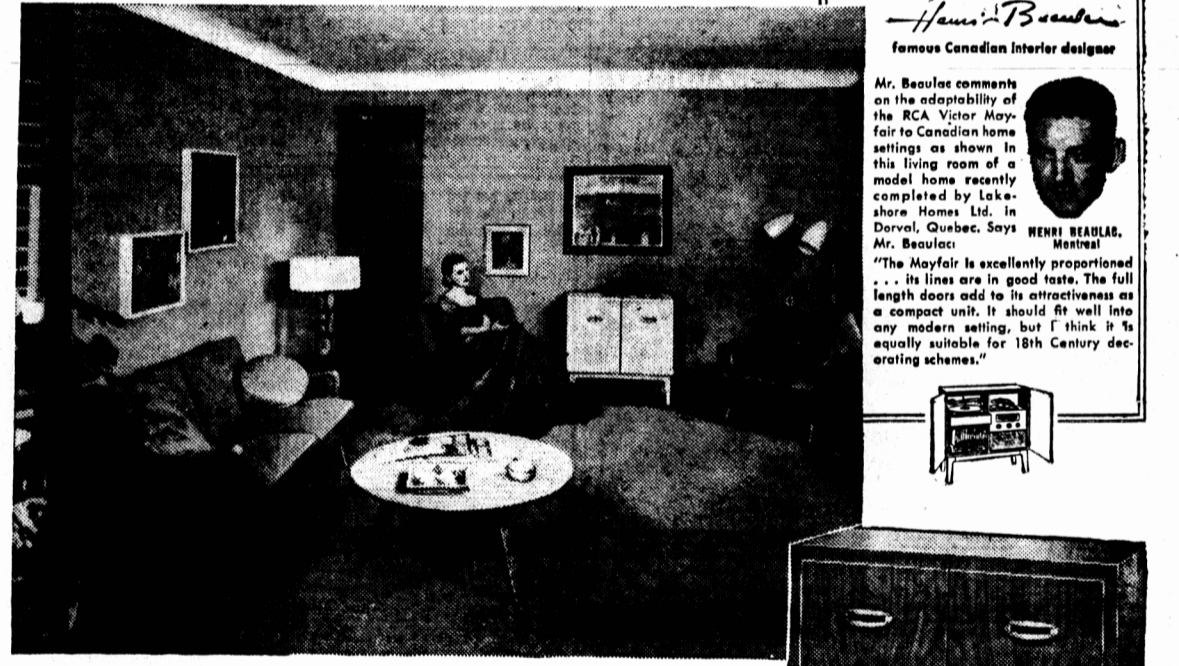
Signs Of Autumn At The Yacht Club
