## THE ISLAND CONTINGENT.

The men who had volunteered to help our Queen fight her enemies in the Transvaal assembled there at about ten o'clock, and everyone of them was on the qui vive. Were they to go on were they to stay? Who were to be the lucky men? Out of every ten four were to go—six to be left behind.

Lieutenant Colonel Moore and Major Week, were closeted by themselves, and the surgeon having performed his duty the fates were being decided by them.

When, a few minutes after eleven o'clock, the door of the private room was opened and Sergt. Hurdis L. McLean, of No. 2 Co., of the artillery was called in the interest rose still higher. After a few moments he came out and J. S. Walker was called in. Then came A. R. Dillon, and so on until the necessary number of men were enrolled.
