There are a number of stories that have been written about the Two Little Old Ladies. They are the composit, fictional characters who play against the experts in bridge tournaments and sometimes manage in their own sweet, innocent way, to wreak havoc with the masters.

One of the most famous of these stories occurred the time the Two Little Old Ladies sat down against a couple of celebrated life masters in a national pair championship. They were quaking with fear, and it is not as-

tonishing that when the bidding was over, Little Old Lady No. 2 (East) led the queen of diamonds out of turn.

The tournament director was called and he ruled South could call the lead of any suit (that was the rule in those days), or treat the diamond queen as an exposed card.

So South asked for a club lead from West and Little Old Lady No. 1 said she didn't have a club to lead. Declarer, having exacted his penalty, even though West could not comply, no further rights, and Little Old Lady No. 1 was informed she could lead anything her heart desired.

She shrewdly opened a low diamond, knowing her partner had the queen. East won with the jack—the queen was back in her hand—and returned a club, the suit West had announced she was void of.

West ruffed, of course, and led another low diamond, which East won with the queen. Another club return was ruffed by West, and by now the Two Little Old Ladies had run out of tricks. But they had snatched the first four, and a greatly perturbed South found himself on one.

All over the room everybody was making four or five spades, while our expert South was the only one to be defeated in the four spade contract.

Moral: "Never relax against the Little Old Ladies."

BUSINESS SPOTLIGHT

Well-Equipped Home Will Be Vastly Changed

The well-equipped household of 20 years from now may make today's gadgeted home appear pretty primitive.

Gwilym A. Price, chairman of Westinghouse Electric Corporation of the United States, recently added together some of the things which he sees coming up. Some items he predicts for 1978:

An electrostatic cleaning wand which, when waved over a dusty surface, will attract all dust within several feet and which, when it is loaded, can be washed off in the sink.

Prepackaged units in bedrooms which will provide conventional hanging storage for suits and dresses and also a laundro-closet that will clean clothing without agitation or tumbling.

When one hangs up a suit or dress, moving tracks will carry it successively into wash, rinse and drying chambers. Within minutes the garment will be returned to the rack in the hanging-closet, clean and ready to wear—the dirt removed by ultrasonic energy through inaudible sound waves.

LIGHT FROM PANELS

Electric - lighting panels, no thicker than a pane of glass, will be used architecturally—as a decoration—and a turn of a dial will produce light of almost any intensity or color.

The home entertainment centre television in three dimensions, a tape recorder and a movie projector.

Television will be shown on a screen resembling a framed picture, with perhaps one hanging from the wall of every room—with programs picked up by a central receiving unit. Viewers will be able to record and play back any shows they choose.

Mr. Price's predictions, which involve many things still in the laboratory stage, were quoted by George L. Wilcox, president of Canadian Westinghouse Co. Ltd. in a recent address to the Niagara District Electrical Club.

MAY BE CONSERVATIVE

Mr. Wilcox commented: "In my years in the electrical industry I have seen developments surpassing even the most uncontrolled imaginations of industrial forecasters. We are probably still too conservative today in what we foresee."

Some of the most important requirements to bring about the advanced electrical age, he said, are in the fields of metallurgy and insulation.

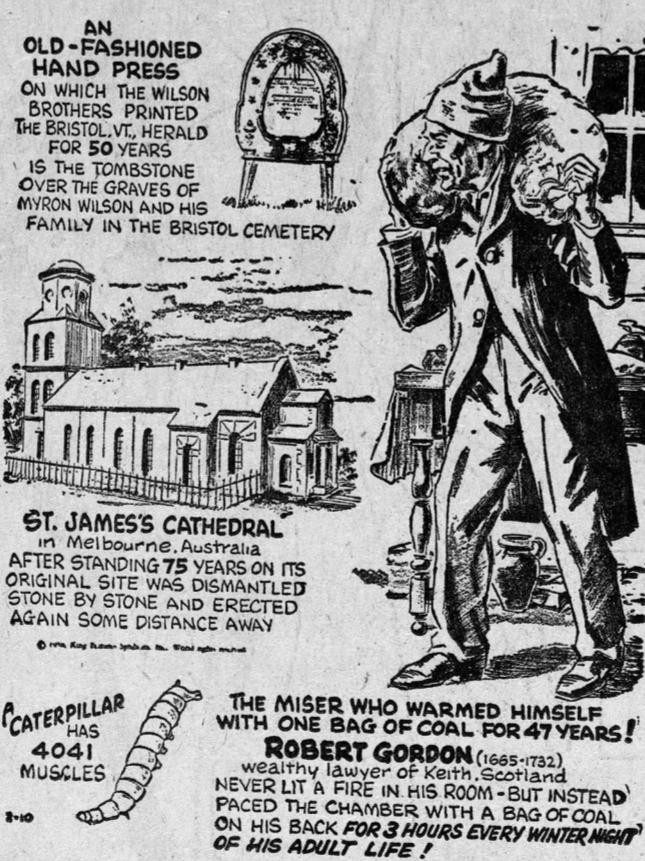

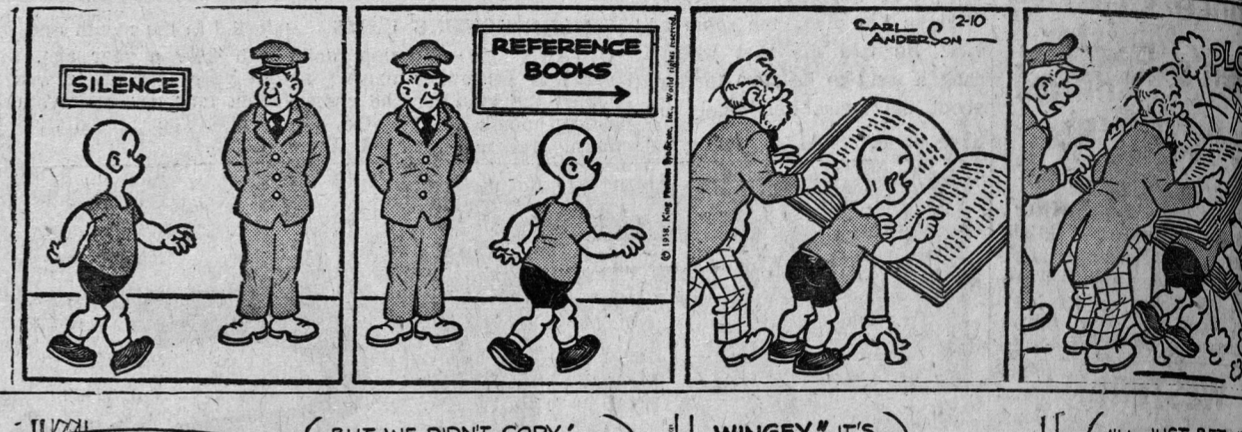
