

Canadiens Tie With New York Rangers Saturday

TORONTO (CP)—Detroit Red Wings kept pace with Toronto Maple Leafs' three-goal first period Saturday night and then went on to defeat Leafs 5-3 in a National Hockey League game.

An opening-night crowd of 12,938 fans watched Leafs set a stalling pace in the first period and then with a deft wing pressure in the remaining 40 minutes as they went down to their second loss in as many starts in the young season.

Veteran centre Earl Reibel scored twice for the winners with right winger Gordie Howe getting his first goal of the term and rookie right winger Tom McCarthy and veteran Bill Dineen adding the other goals.

Sid Smith, performing as he did three seasons ago when he

was chosen all-star left winger, scored twice for Leafs. Centre Bill Harris, who had a brief trial with Toronto last season, was the other Leaf scorer.

The teams were tied 3-3 at the end of the first period but Wings scored the tie-breaker in the second and added an insurance goal in the last period.

Wings had a 37-30 edge in shots and many of their drives were more dangerous than the ones fires by Leafs. The wide-open style of play which Leafs used seemed to catch Wings off guard in the first period but they settled down and turned back the Toronto drives after that.

BOSTON (CP)—Boston Bruins defeated Chicago Black Hawks 3-1 Saturday in the opening game of the National Hockey League season here.

Bostonians Don McKenney, Flem Mackell and Vic Stasiuk scored for the Bruins as a crowd of 13,521 saw the Bruins, Stanley Cup finalists last spring, in the opening game.

Displaying mid-season form on their scoring rushes, the Bruins broke a 1-1 tie at 13:45 of the first period when Mackell let go an angle shot from the left which he squeezed between goalie Glenn Hall and the post.

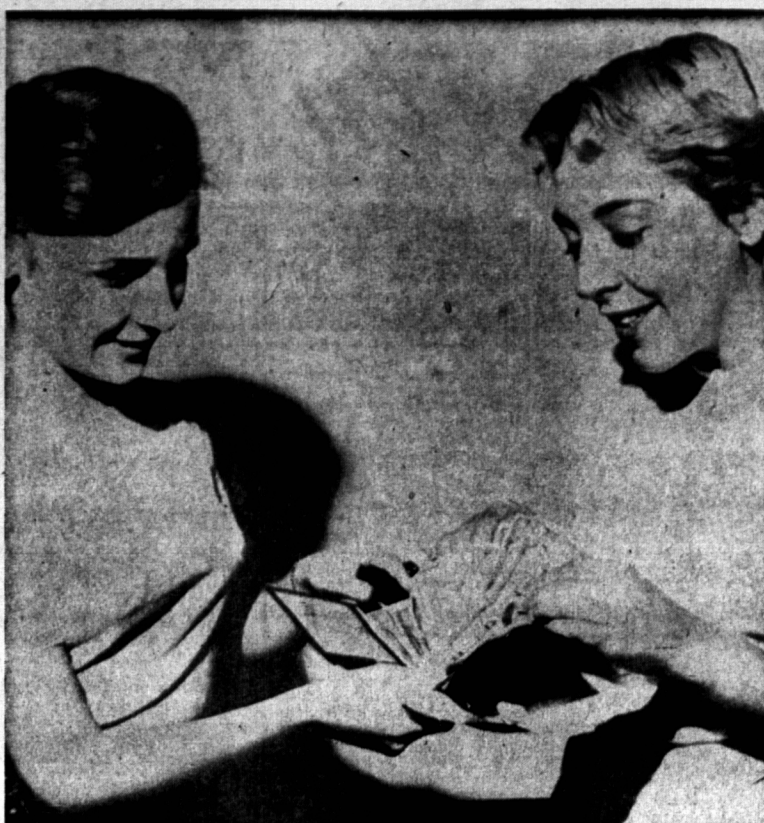
Stasiuk took a pass from Bronco Horvath, playing his first game for Boston since he was acquired from Rochester, and connected on an eight-footer into the far corner from a tough angle for insurance.

That tally came at 14:46 of the middle session.

The teams traded goals while they were shorthanded in the early stages. McKenney scored from 10 feet out at 6:18 of the first period and Ted Lindsay returned the compliment at 8:25.

Lindsay's goal was his 323rd in major league competition and left him one behind the late Neil Stewart in the records. Stewart now ranks fourth.
