General Telegraphic News.

VICTORIA, B. C., July 21.—The Empress of India arrived at Victoria at 4:35 o'clock this morning.

LONDON, July 21.—The action for libel brought by Thomas Sexton, member of parliament for Belfast, against the Edinburgh Scotsman has been dismissed with costs. Mr. Sexton claimed the Scotsman charged him with drunkenness. The defendants asserted that they only intended the reference complained of by Mr. Sexton to be a supposititious case.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—Instructions were to-day sent to the commanding officer of the revenue steamer Woodbury now in the vicinity of Eastport, Me., to proceed to St. Stephen, N. B., for the purpose of co-operating with United States consul Neil in an investigation of the recent seizure near Eastport of seven American fishing vessels for the alleged violation of the Dominion fishery laws. The revenue officer was instructed to prepare charts showing the position of each vessel at the time of the seizure to determine the question of jurisdiction.

LONDON, July 21.—The deliberative committee of the council of the Imperial Federation League, appointed to consider definite proposals for federation, have met to settle the preliminaries and adjourned till November, when the holidays end. The committee is unusually strong, and represents liberals and conservatives, free traders and protectionists. It includes Lord Reay, ex-governor of Bombay; Sir Lyon Playfair, Lord Brassey and Dr. Brice, members of Gladstone's last ministry, and Sir Daniel Cooper, Sir John Calomb and other well known supporters of the present ministry.

LONDON, July 21.—Mr. Balfour's intimation that a local government bill for Ireland would be introduced by the government at the next session of parliament is causing much comment and speculation in political circles to-day. The most remarkable feature of the curious rapprochement between Balfour and the Irish members. The change has been on both sides and Balfour has perhaps learned the most. Nothing is more striking than the manner of the arch opponent of the Irish in pioneering the land bill through the House of Commons.
