Two Ways of Doing It.

A number of Halifax ladies the other day undertook to convince a liquor dealer of the necessity for his withdrawal from the traffic in which he was engaged, by visiting his premises and by the use of remonstrance and argument. They had, however, very poor success, the dealer holding stubbornly to his opinion that he had a right to sell liquor if he pleased, and peremptorily refusing their request to be allowed to pray in his saloon. A despatch to the New York Herald from Fredericktown, Ohio, described the result of a different system of tactics which was adopted by a number of women in that place. The despatch says:—

Thirteen women marched to Kelley's saloon to-day and beat in the door and windows with hatchets, and destroyed everything within, including several barrels of liquors and beer, cases, casks, bottles, jugs, demijohns, counters, stove and all the fixtures. The building is a total wreck. O'Connor's saloon was also visited and all the liquor destroyed. Drug stores were notified to remove their liquors before Monday or they would be treated like the others. The women will be arrested on Monday. They have a strong money backing. Great excitement prevails.

Character is always known. Thefts never enrich; alms never impoverish; murder will speak out of stone walls. The least admixture of a lie—for example, the least attempt to make a good impression, a favorable appearance—will vitiate the effect, but speak the truth, and all Nature and all aids will help you with unexpected furtherance.

The revolution or rather *coup d'etat* which took place in Hayti on the 3rd instant will, it is hoped, be the means of putting an end to a state of things which was growing insupportable. All summer the country has been in a lamentable condition. The two opposite factions carried on a sanguinary struggle in which they spared nothing that came in their way. Towns were either destroyed by fire or given up to pillage, and suspense prevailed to such an extent that continuous industry was practically impossible. The defeated Provisional Government belonged to the so-called Conservative party, so that the country is now in the hands of the Liberals, but if, as is announced, they maintain the constitution and have given the people a fair chance to elect a President, their rule will at any rate be preferable to the anarchy which it has superseded. In the republic of San Domingo or Dominica (the eastern portion of the island) the utmost tranquility has been devoting his attention to the advancement of agricultural enterprises, from which it is expected that much good will result to the people at large. The Spanish Commissary-General returned home some time ago, and the difficulty at issue between Spain and Dominica is believed to be settled.

The fires that have swept over the North-western prairie regions have not been more destructive than those in the forests of the Northeast. The ravages of forest fires in Canada, New York, Pennsylvania, Vermont and New Hampshire are described as almost unprecedented. At Montreal, and below, the smoke was so dense for several days that vessels were compelled to anchor and wait for a favorable wind to lift the smoke and allow them to proceed. The loss by detentions is estimated at \$100,000 to Montreal merchants alone. In Vermont and New Hampshire large tracts of valuable timber have been destroyed. Several thousand acres have been burned over in Pike County, Pennsylvania, and a large amount of valuable timber has been destroyed, with cordwood and bark.

The Manitoba Free Press of the 28th inst., announces the arrival at St. Boniface of Mr. Prittie's sixteenth and last party of immigrants for the year. They numbered 285. They had a pleasant trip, but the time occupied in the journey was longer than usual, on account of the train being a very heavy one. The season has been a very successful one for Mr. Prittie, having brought through between 7,000 and 8,000 people. He will prosecute the work next year, and anticipates a larger immigration than ever. His first party next season will leave Ontario about the 2nd of March.

The Ottawa banquet to Sir John A. McDonald is to be given on the 27th of November.

The Bangor "Whig," yesterday, published a list of twenty-eight divorces, decreed at the October term of the Supreme Judicial Court.

Cleared from Port Hill, on Tuesday, the 28th inst. Barkentine "Annie," Thomas Davies, master, for Plymouth, with a cargo of twelve tons birch timber, 600 feet of pine boards, 1 cord lathwood, 20,854 bushels of oats and 13,000 feet deals, shipped by the Hon. John Yeo.

Mr. Mackenzie's country "Texas," is turning out badly. Many English, with their families, who went there this year are already returning northward, having been deceived in regard to the character of the land and the purchasing terms. Mr. Mackenzie must see to this.

The Greenbackers of Massachusetts are again in trouble, their candidate for secretary of the Commonwealth, Mr. Jonathan Arnold, of North Abington, having concluded that he can best serve the cause by declining. This is the third candidate of that party who has given up the battle during the campaign in that State.

The Liverpool Post tells a strange adventure of a venturesome small boy. It appears that he played truant from school, and dared not go home at night. He managed to get into the station-yard at Chorley, with the intention of passing the night in one of the passenger carriages; but he failed to gain access, the doors being locked. He then crept under the guard's van, and pulled himself on the couple of short iron rods between the axle of the wheels and the carriage floor, and between which the brake apparatus passed. In this position he went to sleep, and at 5 o'clock in the morning the train started for Wigan. The lad was actually brought to Wigan, and again taken to Chorley, clutching the rods. At the latter place he was discovered, still fast asleep, and rescued from his perilous position. The marvel is how the lad remained on this frail support during his 18 miles journey, and asleep all the while. Had he moved death was certain.

Sir George Elliot, M. P. for North Durham, has signified his intention to dedicate a piece of land on his estate, West Cliff, Whitby, to the public, and erect thereon a monument to Captain Cook, the circumnavigator. Captain Cook spent several years of his early life at the fishing village of Staithes, a few miles to the north of Whitby. In later years he sailed from the harbor of Whitby, and it is an historical fact that in undertaking his adventurous voyages round the world he preferred the vessels which were built at Whitby by Whitby men. The site chosen by Sir George Elliott for the erection of a monument to the illustrious circumnavigator is one of the most prominent on the hon. baronet's estate. It commands an uninterrupted view of the German Ocean, of the coast scenery both north and south, of the romantic Abbey ruins on the opposite side of the harbor, and of the vale of Esk.

DEATH FROM SUCKING A MATCH.—Says the *Kenish Mercury*, of Greenwich, Eng.:—An inquest was held at the Fortune of War, Woolwich, on Saturday, on the body of Frederick Osborne, aged two years, son of John Osborne, coachman, commandant's stables, Woolwich Common. Mrs. Osborne said that the child not being well on Thursday she obtained a powder from Mrs. Rastriek's; but not getting better she took it to Dr. Maxwell on Friday, on the afternoon of which day it died. There was a box of matches on the chimney piece, the top of some of the matches being wet, and from the child's manner she inferred that he had sucked them. He must have done so when alone in the room.—Dr. Maxwell, 27 Woolwich Common, said the child was brought to him suffering from symptoms of poison. He administered medicine and called twice in the day to see it, but it died in the afternoon. He should say if the child sucked one match it would be sufficient to destroy life, one grain of phosphorus being fatal to a child. The poison being taken on Monday would have disseminated itself all over the body by the time he saw it. The jury returned a verdict of "Death from Misadventure."
