CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.—The Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals met to-day, and adjourned, to meet at the City Hall on Thursday afternoon next, when reports will be read and other business transacted.

CAUGHT IN THE ACT.—David Willoughby, a member of the London, O., City Council, is now in jail at that place awaiting trial on a charge of attempted safe-blowing. He was caught on the premises all ready for the operation. The snap was given away by a person whom he asked to assist him.

AN EXPLANATION.—Nearly every person has heard or read of the death recently of the York County, N. B., girl who "sewed with her mouth" in the absence of hands. It is now explained that the reason she was not admitted to the sewing circle was because she could not sew and talk at the same time.

TRIP TO THE CAPES.—A number of ladies and gentlemen are going to Cape Traverse by special mail train to-night, returning in the morning. One fare is allowed for the double journey. Doubtless many will avail themselves of the pleasant little trip, and witness the arrival and departure of our winter mail service.

A MISER'S DEATH.—Charles Tuft, aged 85, a miser, worth \$50,000 died in a filthy room at Cambridge, Mass., a few nights ago. He had lived there for years. A week ago he was taken with la-grippe, which developed into pneumonia. On the night of his death the police were attracted by his outcries, but before medical assistance came Tuft died in great agony.

AFTER THE BOUNTY.—It is stated that Bruns Levesque, of St. George de Cacouna, Que., has filed an affidavit in the superior court to the effect that he has twelve children living, so as to claim the one hundred acres of land granted by the Quebec government in such cases. Levesque, who celebrated his golden wedding last year, had seven other children who are dead.

PROMPT PAYMENT.—We understand that the Rev. J. G. Cameron, of Souris, whose property was destroyed by fire on the 12th ult., received from F. W. Hyndman, Esq., insurance agent, on the 24th, the sum of \$1,000—the amount of the insurance. This is as it should be, as Mr. Cameron's loss was a very heavy one, the property being insured for only the half of its value, and only about one-half the contents being saved.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 5.

In the House of Commons to-day.—Sir Richard Cartwright urged that a day be fixed for the discussion of the "Ryker scandal." After some discussion it was agreed that the matter should be debated on Tuesday next.

Mr. Charlton introduced a bill to secure the better observance of the Lord's Day. He said the bill was supported by all the Christian bodies. A similar measure was being passed by legislatures in the United States. The bill proposed to make the publication of Sunday newspapers a misdemeanor, and prohibit unnecessary traffic on railways.

Replying to Mr. Amyot, Sir John Thompson said the Government in making Queen's Counsel appointments intended to continue the form of commissioners hitherto in use. The commissions conferred the right of procedure to which the recipients might be entitled by law.

Mr. Charlton moved a resolution proposing that where an election is held in a constituency for the Commons, provincial lists shall be used, unless the Dominion lists have been revised within a year, for such election. The resolution was supported by Messrs. Wilson, Patterson, Laurier, Jones, and Bain, and opposed by Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir John Thompson and Messrs. Colby and Sproule. The resolution was declared lost on division.

Mr. Davin moved for the appointment of a committee to investigate Commissioner Herchmer of the N. W. Mounted Police.

After recess several private Bills were advanced several stages.

House adjourned at 9.

Trouble in South Africa.

LONDON, March 5.

Despatches from the South African Republic say a serious demonstration had been made there against the existing government. A mass meeting adopted resolutions denouncing the Transvaal Government, and after the meeting a crowd proceeded to the government buildings and tore down the flag of the Republic. Subsequently the crowd went to a house where Kruger was receiving a deputation and sang "Rule Britannia." The railings around the house were destroyed by the crowd, and the Transvaal flag hauled down and trampled under foot.

Master Abraham Lincoln Dead.

LONDON, March 5.

Master Abraham Lincoln died at 1:10 this morning. The cause of his death was blood poisoning, arising from a malignant carbuncle on his left side.

It is announced from Ottawa that the Duke of Connaught will leave Bombay on March 13th on the Peninsula and Oriental steamship "Kaiser-i-Hind," which takes him to Ceylon, Penang, Singapore, HongKong and thence to Japan as far as Yokohama and on to Vancouver, B. C. On arrival at Ottawa His Royal Highness will become the guest of His Excellency the Governor General.

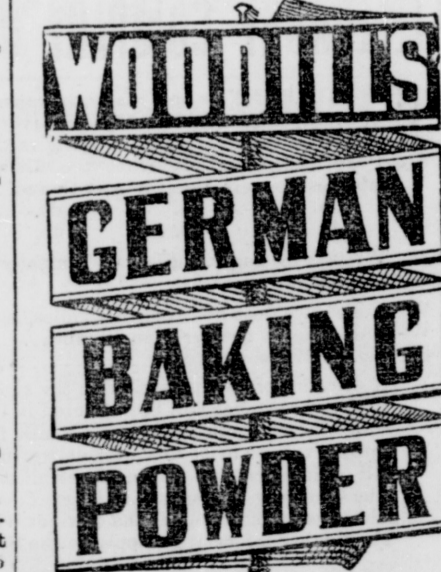
