# Five Survivors Of Hockey Club Gather For Centennial

By BERNARD DUFRESNE Canadian Press Staff Writer RENFREW, Ont. (CP) — "I never heard so many lies in all my life."

That was Art Ross, great Boston hockey figure, talking Wednesday as five survivors of the old Renfrew Millionaires club of 1909-10 gathered to help this Ottawa Valley town celebrate its centennial.

Ross, retired general manager of Boston Bruins of the National Hockey League, sat kibitzing as the five great hockey stars of 50 years ago recalled the old hockey wars.

They were: Lester Patrick, 74, of Victoria; Fred (Cyclone) Taylor, 70, of Vancouver; Newsy Lalonde, 74, of Montreal; Bert Lindsay, 77, of Sarnia, Ont.; and Herb Jordan, 73, of Renfrew.

But Ross needed them. He got some of his own back. "Hey, Newsy," said Patrick, "wasn't it Halleybury we beat 17-2?"

"It was like hell," butted in Ross, who played for Halleybury the year that a couple of Renfrew Millionaires — the late Senator M. J. O'Brien and Alexander Barnett — bankrolled a team of stars with the hope of bringing the Stanley Cup to this small town, 65 miles west of Ottawa.

**ANOTHER TEAM**  
Then Newsy, who had scored nine goals in that game, explained out of Ross' hearing that it was against the old Silver Sevens in Ottawa.

Remembrances  
"Well, it's like this," said Newsy, a great lacrosse player as well as hockey center, "these fellows are getting pretty old and their memories aren't as good as they used to be, the incidents they recall usually lead to argument."

Later, Ross also in his 70s, paid tribute to the five returnees. The only one missing was Frank Patrick of Vancouver, not well enough to make the trip.

In a more serious vein, Cyclone Taylor, said "it's not everybody who can come back to old haunts and meet old friends."

"The memories come crowding in and it's difficult to find expression for them."

**LEGENDARY FEAT**  
Cyclone prefers to let the aura of legend and mystery surround his feat of scoring a goal while skating backwards the length of the ice against Ottawa.

"Look it up in the old papers. I'm not saying anything," he said. Then, to Herb Jordan: "I hear you played quite a bit of tennis after your hockey days."

"That's right," said Herb, a Quebecer who came here with his French-Canadian bride in 1909 to play hockey and work for Senator O'Brien's construction company, and never returned to Quebec City.

"If I had known I would have come down and beat you in five minutes," said Cyclone.
