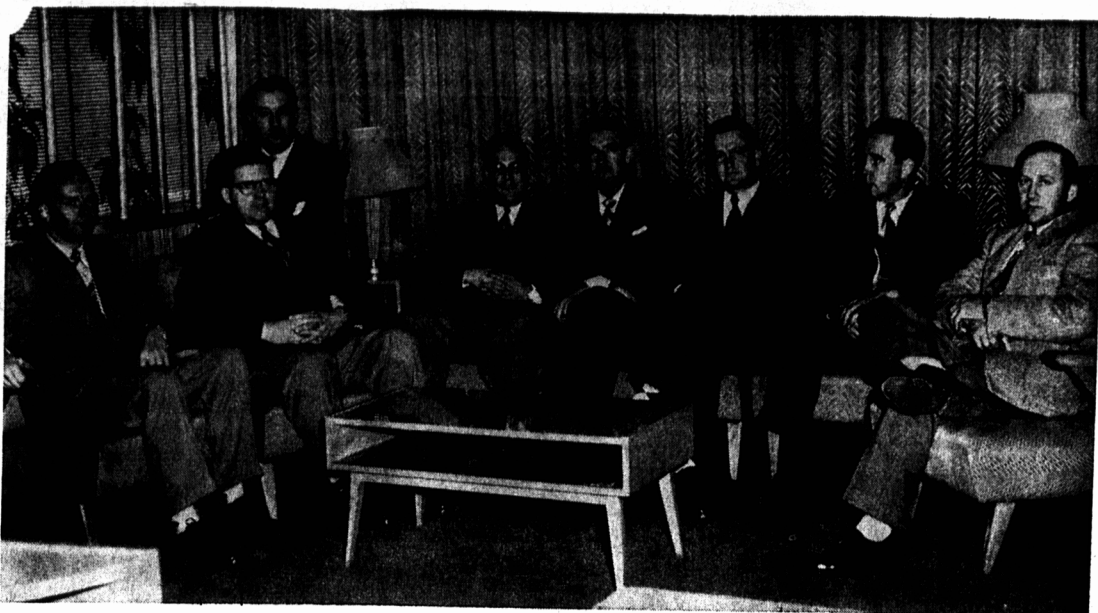

Provincial Air Cadet League Annual Banquet

Mr. George D. Will, president of the Air Cadet League of Canada in his address at the annual banquet of the Provincial Air Cadet League held last night at the R. C. A. F. Station expressed pleasure at the re-election of Mr. Greg Mulholland as the provincial Canadian Air Force for none of its accomplishments would be possible without their aid and paid a glowing tribute to the commanding officer G—C W. H. Swetman of the R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside. He pointed out that other countries, the United States in particular, look upon the Air Cadet League as a great youth training program which makes for better youth of tomorrow and the custodians of posterity. Regarding the future he said that there is still a high job to be done. "We have contracted with the R. C. A. F. to provide 22,500 air cadets and we are now crawling up to that number and until that number has been reached I do not think we have completed our job." A vote of thanks was moved by Dr. Gilbert Gallant and tendered to the speaker by the chairman, Greg Mulholland. Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, guest at the dinner meeting said that he had always maintained an interest in the air cadet movement and expressed the hope for its continued progress and expansion in the future. Representing the Premier, A. W. Matheson, who was unable to be present, Mr. E. P. Foley Minister without portfolio brought the greetings from the Province of Prince Edward Island. He said that the air cadet movement was a great potential of the R. C. A. F. and in its ranks the young men learned the value of discipline and the ability to get along with their fellow men. During the annual meeting in the afternoon, Mr. Greg Mulholland presided and reviewed the activities of the provincial league during the past year. A special guest at the meeting was Air Commodore M. Costello, O.B.E., C.D., air officer commanding Maritime Air Command who expressed his pleasure that the past year had been a successful one for the movement. He said that his presence at the meeting was in the capacity of one of listener and receive suggestions on how the R. C. A. F. could help the air cadet movement and pledged his assistance and support in anything that could be done. G—C W. H. Swetman, commanding officer of the station said that in his opinion the P. E. I. Squadron was the equal of any in Canada and thanked the squadron and its officers for the cooperation shown him and the personnel at the station during the period of training there.
