

# Braves Defeat Phillies Dodgers Edge St. Louis

**BROOKLYN (AP)**—Duke Snider blasted his 20th home run with a man on base in a four-run fifth inning that broke a 2-2 tie Tuesday night and carried Brooklyn Dodgers to a 7-5 victory over St. Louis Cardinals.

It was the fifth in a row for the four-place Braves.

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Righthander Ray Moore gave up two hits in the first inning and then retired 21 men in a row while pitching Baltimore Orioles to a 3-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox Tuesday night on the strength of Billy Gottman's two-run homer.

**PITTSBURGH (AP)**—A home run by Frank Thomas seconds after a suspended game of June 16th had been resumed gave Pitts-

burgh Pirates a 5-4 victory over Chicago Cubs Tuesday night. The two teams then began a regularly scheduled contest.

The game, suspended because of the Pennsylvania Sunday curfew law, was resumed with the score tied at 4-4 and one man out in the Pirate half of the seventh.

**CLEVELAND (AP)**—Cleveland Indians won their fifth game in a row Tuesday night, rapping 13 hits off three Washington pitchers for a 9-3 victory.

Veteran righthander Early Wynn went all the way for the Indians, earning his 12th victory against 10 losses. He allowed eight hits, including a two-run homer and two singles by Lou Berberet.

Every man on the Cleveland

starting lineup except Bob Avila connected for at least one hit.

**PITTSBURGH (AP)**—The seventh-place Pittsburgh Tuesday Pirates shoved Chicago Cubs deeper into the National League cellar Tuesday night, taking a 5-3 decision in a regularly scheduled game after earlier completing a suspended game and winning it 5-4 on a homer by outfielder Frank Thomas.

Bob Rush had a one-hitter until the seventh inning of the regular game when the Pirates scored three times, two of the runs on a double by Thomas.

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)**—Milwaukee's Warren Spahn slowed down Philadelphia's National

League express train with a six-hitter Tuesday night as the Braves trounced the first-place Phillies 6-2 at Connie Mack Stadium.

The rarefied atmosphere of the league summit proved bothersome to the upstart Phillies. The only thing that kept them in their half game lead was second-place St. Louis's 7-5 loss to the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Milwaukee, however, remained in third despite the Card's loss but was only one percentage point behind St. Louis, Brooklyn, meanwhile, moved up a game from the top and the Phillies, though in first, were ahead of the Dodgers by only nine percentage points.

The Dodgers jumped into an early lead in the first inning when they scored three tallies on three hits and a walk. They added another one in the fourth when after Carson had led off with a double, Handrahan hit into what

## Blasingame Has Impressed Everybody In St. Louis

**BROOKLYN (AP)** — Remember when Frank Lane traded Red Schoendienst to New York Giants? St. Louis residents, who had idolized the brilliant Cardinal second baseman for a dozen years, wanted to boil the new general manager in oil.

That was just about a year ago. There still are occasional rumblings but the majority of the Redbirds rooters have long ago conceded that Lane knew what he was doing when he shipped the popular Schoendienst and three other Cardinals for four Giants including shortstop Alvin Dark.

Not because they think the Cards got the better of the deal. Not so much because Dark has been doing a thoroughly satisfactory job in the field and at bat. And certainly not that Schoendienst has shown any signs of slipping. The 34-year-old star is playing as well as ever.

The new enthusiasm stems from his splendid all-round play of Don Blasingame, who has impressed everybody with the way he has filled Red's shoes at second base. The only reason young Don isn't the best second baseman in the National League is because his tutor, Schoendienst, is still around.

It is obvious that Blasingame would never have had a chance at second base if Schoendienst hadn't been traded.

That, more than anything else, prompted Lane to make the deal with Giants. The man whose trading brought Billy Pierce, Minnie Minoso, Nellie Fox and Sherman Lollar to Chicago White Sox for players now out of the majors, realized more than anyone else that Blasingame's value to the Cards would be as a second baseman only.

## Surprised And Disappointed That Grass Is On Courts

**MONTREAL (CP)**—Brazil's Jose Agiero was both surprised and disappointed that grass grows on Canada's tennis courts.

Agiero, 24-year-old member of Brazil's Davis Cup tennis team, said during workouts for the Canada-Brazil first round North American zone tie this weekend he had hoped the matches would be played on clay.

He and Carlos Fernandez, 19, had a three-hour practice Tuesday with captain and number one player Armando Vieira.

The Canadian team, meanwhile, was also completed with the arrival Tuesday of 25-year-old Paul Willey of Vancouver. Willey is likely to draw a doubles berth with Canada's mainstay, Bob Bedard, 25, of Sherbrooke, Que.

Bedard and Willey practised Tuesday morning while Don Fontana of Toronto, 26, who with Bedard is expected to draw a singles assignment, took it easy.

It is the first time Brazil has challenged in the North American zone and the first trip to Canada for Agiero, Fernandez and Vieira.

Vieira beat Bedard, considered Canada's best, in a hard court tournament last year but Canada's non-playing captain Gordie MacNeil expects Bedard to get the best of Vieira on grass.

Fernandez, a powerful youngster with a booming serve, ranks first in Brazil's tennis ratings. Agiero and Vieira are unranked, but the two are considered better players and are likely to play the singles matches.

Vieira and Agiero do most of their campaigning outside Brazil and Vieira is ranked 13th in the United States. He hasn't played enough tournaments in his home country to earn a rating.

The Canadians are counting on the familiar grass and Bedard's power to carry them to at least two singles victories, although on paper Vieira and Agiero have better records.

Bedard said he feels fine except that an ankle he sprained while playing in Europe still hasn't completely healed.

## New Epoch For Christian Church

**LONDON (Reuters)**—The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Geoffrey Fisher, said Tuesday night that a recent statement by the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Liverpool was "the most hopeful utterance" made by the Catholic Church in Britain for some time.

Fisher told a dinner for the British Council of Churches.

"The Archbishop of Liverpool said it was no use going on bickering as to whether the Archbishop of Canterbury was right in thinking he was descended from St. Augustine, or the Archbishop of York thinking he came down from Wilfrid; the real thing was that we should get on with each other, until we came to the real truth."

If that could be followed up, said Fisher, "then a new epoch would arise of hope and promise for the Christian Church in this land."

## Dew Line To Be Handed Over

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Formal turnover of the Distant Early Warning line in the Canadian north from the builders to an operating contractor is to be announced shortly by the United States and Canadian governments.

Construction of the 3,000-mile system of fixed and rotating radar stations—intended to provide up to four hours warning of hostile bombers coming over the polar routes—has been completed.

The Western Electric Company was primary contractor for the huge job of constructing buildings, installing equipment and creating airfields and port facilities in the frozen north.

The job done, that company now is delivering the DEW line to the Federal Electric Corporation, a firm organized to operate the radar warning system.

Both United States and Canadian civilians have been in training at special schools in the United States. They will run and maintain the radar stations under over-all direction of military personnel.

Although the building of the line is finished, it is not expected to be put into full military use before this fall. Meanwhile, Federal Electric technicians will conduct extensive tests with the equipment and conduct final, on-site training

## Siamese Twins Die In Regina

**REGINA (CP)** — A four-day struggle for life by two Siamese twins, whose vital organs were so intimately inter-connected they could never have been separated, ended suddenly Tuesday.

After 85 hours in an incubator, Beverly Ann and Barbra Lee Zaharik, died at 2:55 a.m. in Regina General Hospital.

"There was no choking or anything," said a doctor. "They just stopped breathing."

Until late Monday, the infants, born a month prematurely to 34-year-old Mrs. Pauline Zaharik Friday, were believed to be "progressing slowly," but doctors say they could not have survived for more than another couple of days.

No separation could have been attempted because they shared a common liver and the mechanisms of their hearts and lungs were too closely interconnected.

Meanwhile, the mother, who saw her daughters only once, is in good condition. She was on her feet for a short period Monday.

Her husband, Vassil Zaharik, 35-year-old grocery store proprietor, broke the news to her.

"We cried together," he said, "but she took it very well."

The Zaharikis who have two other daughters, Gail, 12, and Shirley, 9, know twins were in the office a month ago but didn't know they would be joined. The infants, perfectly shaped but joined facing each other at the abdomen, were born in an hour-long caesarian operation. They had a combined weight of eight pounds and 13 ounces at birth.
