Hunter River School.

The half-yearly examination of the Hunter River school was held on Friday, 27th ult. There were present a large number of parents and visitors. The ladies were well represented. All present seemed to take a lively interest in the proceedings and to be greatly pleased with the progress made since last examination. The pupils gave evidence, by their intelligent answers to the questions asked them, of very careful and thorough training. Although the schoolrooms were crowded, the order was excellent. The Principal, Mr. J. H. Monaghan, is thoroughly at home with his pupils, who evidently respect and love him. Hunter River is to be congratulated on securing his services for another year.

A very fine essay, entitled "The future of Canada," was read by one of the young lady pupils, which evinced much patient study and careful thought, and a mastery of language that would reflect credit on a graduate of a high school academy. Mr. M. manifestly does not neglect English Composition, which is, without doubt, the most important subject on our curriculum.

A pleasing feature of the examination was the singing of several pretty choruses by the pupils.

Mr. Norton, Principal of the New Glasgow High School, assisted at the examination. He said that the pupils had made marked progress since he last visited the school. Messrs. Wayne, Bagnall and others also spoke, using the highest terms of praise with reference to the work being done.

Then followed a most exciting scene, the distribution of a large number of valuable prizes by the Principal. He seemed to have something for everyone, and it was very interesting to notice how each little face would light up when its owners name was called out.

This most enjoyable examination was then brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.

Upton School.

The examination of the Upton School, Dundas, took place at the schoolhouse, Monday, 29th inst. There was a good attendance of pupils. School officers and rate payers were present including some of the ladies of the district.

The children acquitted themselves remarkably well, which reflects great credit on the teacher, Miss Mary Smith, of New Perth, who has taught the school for the two years past and is now engaged for the third, with a liberal supplement. The school is in a flourishing condition, as two or three second-class teachers have passed out of it within the past year.

St. Margaret's School.

The annual examination of the pupils of St. Margaret's School was held in the schoolroom on June 30th. The examination was conducted by Rev. J. C. McLean and Mr. H. McPhee. A number of parents and school officers attended. The pupils present, 35 in number, were examined in reading, writing, arithmetic, British and Canadian history, geography and grammar. They acquitted themselves very creditably, and showed very fair progress since the annual examination. Prizes were presented to the most deserving in the several classes. The exercises were closed by the children singing several pieces. Miss Alice C. McIntyre, who has satisfactorily taught the school during the last three years, leaves the district of her own accord, having given the trustees timely notice to that effect. Miss Minnie Creel, who has successfully taught in some of the neighboring districts, has been engaged to succeed her.

The schoolhouse is to undergo considerable repairs this summer, forty dollars having been voted at the annual meeting for that purpose.

The Twelve Per Cent. Curse.

SIR,—I see by THE EXAMINER of the 3rd that it is the intention of the present Government to make a reduction of twelve per cent. to those who were too lazy or neglected to pay the balance due on their land to the Land Office. Now, Sir, that is very unjust to those that have struggled hard and paid off their land, and in some cases borrowed money to do it.
