

why are not their number and names, like every thing else paraded before the world? I am personally acquainted with most, if not all, of the Indians of this Island, and can confidently say, that they have the greatest aversion to Mr. Rand's teaching, and laugh at his boasted pretensions of seducing them from the Catholic Faith. They are sincerely attached to it; perfectly satisfied to live and die in it; and, with exceptions, assiduously attend to the practice of their religion. As for his future hopeful prospects, they appear much more cheering and interesting from the generosity of the Committee of Gentlemen who sent him, than from the accession of the Indians from their faith. Indeed, his views and wishes on this subject are too transparent to be mistaken. He speaks of the comforts of home, and of his house being made a refuge for the Indians, and then, not very delicately but very significantly asserts, that these is power in kindness, and that the Indians whom he has fed and sheltered, will not turn him out. Mr. Rand evidently feels that he is an unwelcome intruder; and dreads, perhaps, with some reason, being turned out unceremoniously. The Indians are not ungrateful; but are not disposed to exchange their Faith for a night's entertainment or unsolicited kindness. It is one thing to be generous of one's own substance; quite another to collect money in the adjacent Colonies and even in wealthy England, for the ill-disguised purpose of buying over the Indians from their faith. No honorable man can applaud external conformity, procured by the prostitution of cherished convictions nor countenance such a cause. It is not my wish, if I had the power, to prevent Mr. Rand and family from being well supported, if his kind patrons and employers be so inclined; but only to prevent the Faith of Catholics committed to my charge from being tampered with by unjustifiable means.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—We mentioned in our last, that the Lieut. Governor of Prince Edward Island, had issued a proclamation directing all officers of the Revenue, Magistrates, and other subjects of her Majesty, to render all aid in their power to the unfortunate fishermen of the United States, who were wrecked on the Northern coasts of that Island, and especially to exert themselves for the preservation of property, and its restoration to the rightful owners; but it appears from what we learn of our fishermen who have returned from the scene of the late disaster, that this proclamation, though evincing the generous humanity of the Lieut. Governor, was unnecessary; for they all speak in the warmest terms of gratitude, of the universal hospitality and kindness they and all the shipwrecked men received at the hands of these generous and humane Islanders. In the midst of the storm they were on the beach to render every aid in their power to save life. After it had abated they cheerfully offered their services to assist in the preservation of property. They bore from the wrecks the bodies of those who perished, at their own expense prepared them for the grave, and administered to them the last sad rites of humanity. Nor was this all; they opened their doors to those who had no shelter, fed and clothed the destitute, and bestowed upon the sufferers generally every possible assistance which could alleviate their misfortune, and every attention that humanity could devise. At the instance of many of our returned townsmen, our exchanges at Halifax, and the P. E. Island papers are requested to make known to their readers the feelings of grateful remembrance in which the wrecked fishermen of Gloucester will always hold the generous hospitality extended to them in their misfortunes.
