Winter Communication with the Mainland.

Some days ago Sir Charles Tupper laid on the table of the House of Commons correspondence between the Government and other parties, referring to the improvement of winter communication between P. E. Island and the mainland.

The correspondence extends over two years, and is between the Government and E. J. Hodgson, Dunlop Bros., J. C. Brundage, H. G. C. Ketchum, C. Schreiber, Senator Carvell and the members for the Island.

On the 7th inst., Mr. Schreiber in a report shows that Mr. Ketchum has offered to build the Chignecto Marine Railway for a subsidy of \$150,000 per annum for 25 years.

There is also a letter from A. E. Botsford and Josiah Wood, of Sackville, accompanied by a report from R. C. Boxall, C. E., on the proposed railway from Sackville to Baie Verte.

Referring to this report, Mr. Schreiber points out that the Amherst line would possess an advantage over the Sackville line of half a mile in distance and in the matter of grades.

A letter was read from Mr. R. F. Quirk, requesting permission to transfer the lease of Pownall Wharf to Messrs. Carvell Bros. It was moved by Councillor Blake, seconded by Councillor Horne, and carried.

Councillor Murphy gave notice that at the next meeting of Council he would introduce a by-law for levying and specifying the rates of an assessment on real estate and incomes in the City of Charlottetown, for the year ending 31st December, 1882.

Resolved, that a special meeting of the City Council be called on Monday, the 24th of April, to consider the above named by-laws.

A letter from R. B. Huestis, asking exclusive right of advertising on Market Square, was referred to the Market Committee.

A letter was also read from Judge Young regarding Victoria Park, and was referred to the Public Property Committee, to report upon it at the next meeting.

Moved by Councillor Murphy, seconded by Councillor Blake, that the City Clerk be directed to call tenders until Saturday, the 8th of May next, for the purchase of \$20,000 of debentures of the City of Charlottetown, of the denomination of \$500 each.
