

Loss of the Reata.

Report of Thomas William Chearley Townsend, master of the brigantine Reata, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., 141 tons, from Charlottetown, Nov. 10, for Liverpool, with starch, lobsters and canned meats (about 200 tons).—Proceeded, all going well till Nov. 21, when a heavy gale from N. W. coming on, the ship was holed to. At 3.30 p.m. a heavy sea came on board, bursting in after house, filling cabin, etc., also bursting mastsail, which was close reefed, starting waterways and bulwarks, light screens and stanchions, which caused the ship to make water freely. A second drag was now constructed (in addition to another put out when the ship was first holed to), but the hawser parted, losing royalyard and kedje anchors. Crew at pumps and bailing out cabin. Nov. 22, at 8 a. m., made sail, and kept ship away, strong W N W winds and heavy cross sea, pumps constantly going, and ship making much water. 23rd, fresh W N W gale. 24th, strong W N W gale, pumps still going and shipping much water on deck. 25th, wind and sea getting too heavy to run, hove ship to. 26th, began with heavy gale from W S W; goosewinged the lower foretop-sail. At 2 p. m., wind increasing, and ship inclining to heave down on her beam ends, closed up topsail and constructed a drag. At 3.30 p. m., wind chopped to N W, blowing a terrific hurricane, ship on her beam ends, and inclining to capsize, was compelled to cut away foremast, after which the ship righted. After clearing the wreck, tried the pumps, and found her making more water than before. At 5 a. m. of 27th began discharging cargo to lighten her stern. At 8 p. m., wind shifted to W N W. At 5 a. m. on the 28th began making juremast. At 11 a. m., a vessel was sighted on starboard bow coming towards the ship. All hands being exhausted through pumping and exposure, and the pumps being choked with the starch, decided to leave the wreck and set a signal of distress. The vessel proved to be the Beagle of London, which hove to and took all hands off the wreck, which had 5 feet of water in her hold at the time.—Dartmouth, Dec. 6.

M. Anderwert, the newly elected President of the Swiss Confederation, committed suicide at Geneva on Christmas day by shooting himself on a public promenade.

Cyprus has been visited by disastrous floods, which have occasioned the loss of several lives and destruction of property valued at several thousand pounds.

Aleko Pasha, Governor of Roumelia, has tendered his resignation, owing to a resolution of the Assembly which he interpreted as a vote of want of confidence in his administration.

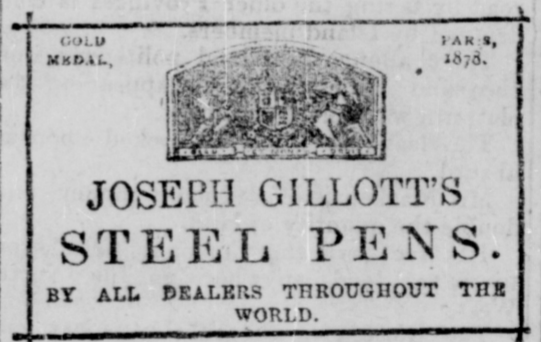
