Judge Black writes from abroad that Mr Bradlaugh has great intellectual powers, and he looks it in face and figure. The adds that he is not so handsome as Mr. Ingersoll, or nearly so brilliant a talker, but as a bold blasphemer he can beat his American rival all hollow.

Mrs. Reilly, a young and handsome widow, to whom the Grand Duke Alexis paid some attention while visiting St. Louis, had her head completely turned by the episode, and insists that Alexis loves her and is coming soon to claim her as his wife. Her people are well-to-do and cultivated. This mania recently led Mrs. Reilly to call at the leading Louisville hotels to see if Alexis was at any of them.

For four days a land breeze prevailed at Cape May, bringing clouds of swamp mosquitoes. Life was unendurable day and night; hops were brought to an end, for no lady could wear a low-necked dress and short short sleeves, or even short dresses, under the attacks of millions of searching, hungry Jersey insects. Hundreds of guests departed for other climes, and one hotel proprietor said that land breeze cost him \$5,000 of decreased receipts. Probably Cape May is a loser, all told, of \$50,000 by the visit of so insignificant a being as the mosquito.

The newly created peer, Lord Ardilaun (Sir Arthur Guinness, the brewer), having at a cost of £20,000 converted St. Stephen's Green, Dublin, into a beautifully ornamented public park and presented it to the people of that his native city, a movement was set on foot to present him with some public testimony of gratitude. His Lordship, however, has written: "While I fully appreciate the good feeling which has prompted this suggestion, I wish at once to say that I could not, I regret, accept any testimonial. My efforts have sprung solely from a desire to benefit my fellow-citizens; and I shall esteem it my highest reward to know that they believe in the genuineness of my motives and value anything which with the co-operation of others, I have been able to effect."

Dom Pedro, Emperor of Brazil, is indulging the fondness for progress which caused him to express so much admiration for the countries which he visited a few years ago. He has just given the last stroke to the completion of a splendid system of water works for Rio Janeiro, bringing water into the city from eleven miles away, carried by 32-inch mains. He has also just turned the first sod of a new and important railroad. Six millions of dollars are being expended this year in Brazil on public works. In addition to this, considerable expenditure on capital account the ordinary expenditure this year, as in several years past, largely exceeds the revenue. The national debt, which amounts to some \$407,000,000, steadily increases. Some \$17,000,000 were added to the liabilities last year, and in pursuance of the projected improvements the debt will necessarily be further increased from year to year. The Emperor is finding out, as we have found in Canada, that public works cost money.

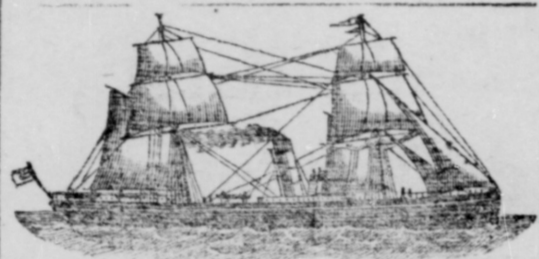

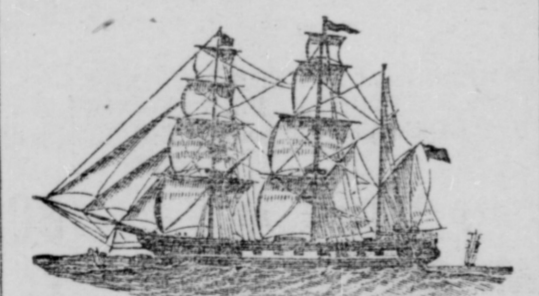
