

Very Latest Telegrams.

London, 15th—midnight. In the House of Commons this evening, John Bright presented a petition from Nova Scotia, praying that Parliament would repeal the act by which that Province was united to the Dominion of Canada.

Paris, May 15. In Corps Legislatif the debate on commerce which commenced early in the week with a speech from M. Thiers in favor of protection, was continued in yesterday's session by M. DeForeade La Roquette, Minister of Commerce, who made a reply to argument of M. Thiers.

Washington, May 16. The impeachment of President Johnson came up at noon to-day in the Senate, when the question was taken on the 11th article. The vote stood thirty-five for conviction to nineteen for acquittal.

London, May 16. An Ecclesiastical body waited upon the Queen at Windsor Castle yesterday, and presented to Her Majesty an address from the Hierarchy of the Irish Church, giving their views in regard to the great changes contemplated in the Establishment.

Toronto, May 14. It is stated that the Council of Roman Catholic Bishops now in session at Quebec, have chosen Bishop Lynch of Toronto to be Archbishop of the Province, subject to a final confirmation by the Pope.

New York, May 18. The acquittal of the President on the 14th article of impeachment caused considerable excitement among Republicans and rejoicing among Democrats. Salutes were fired by the latter in various parts of the country.

We clip from the Boston Journal the following analysis of Impeachment with which the President was charged.—

- 1. Violating the Constitution and the tenure of office act in removing Mr. Stanton from the War Department after he had been reinstated by the Senate.
2. Violating the Constitution and the tenure of office act in appointing General Thomas Secretary of War when there was no vacancy and while the Senate was in session.
3. Appointing General Thomas Secretary of War without authority of law, no vacancy having happened during the recess of the Senate, and there being none at the time he was so appointed.
4. Violating the conspiracy act of 1861, in conspiring with Thomas to prevent Stanton from acting as Secretary of War.
5. Violating the tenure of office act in conspiring with Thomas to prevent Stanton from holding the office of Secretary of War.
6. Violating the conspiracy act and the tenure of office act in attempting to seize and possess the War Office while Stanton was Secretary of War.
7. Violating the tenure of office act in conspiring with Thomas to possess the property in the War Department while it was in Stanton's charge according to law.
8. Violating the tenure of office act in attempting to control the army appropriations by the appointment of Thomas as Secretary of War.
9. Violating the act of March 1867, in attempting to induce General Emery to obey only such orders as came from the President.
10. Attempting to bring Congress into disgrace and odium by inflammatory and scandalous harangues.
11. Declaring that Congress as now constituted is not a legal body, to the end that he might carry out only such laws as he saw fit to approve; and violating, in pursuance of such declaration, the act of March 1867, the tenure of office act, and the reconstruction act.
