A snow plough with two engines from Teeswater coming along ran into them. All four engines were wrecked.

IMPERIAL FEDERATION.—An Imperial Federation League Branch was instituted at Kingston, Ont., on Saturday. Vigorous denunciations of annexation were made. It was stated by Alderman W. Robinson that annexation was not a new subject. Forty years ago he attended a meeting in the City Hall when annexation was discussed and almost unanimously approved of. Next day the stars and stripes floated over the City Hall.

At latest accounts Bennett had not been arrested, but he is summoned to stand trial on Monday next, when full particulars will be given.

The Winter Carnival.

St. John, N. B., Feb. 28.

The weather was beautiful to-day, and the whole city was en fete over the Carnival. It was a grand success in every respect, far surpassing anything the projectors had dreamed of. About five hundred people were in parade. There were many attractive and brilliant features in it. Manchester, Robertson & Allison, who represented King Carnival, spent over \$500 in their display. The car was drawn by twelve horses, driven tandem fashion. There were scores of other beautiful things, the business houses sparing no money or pains to make it a brilliant success. In the evening, 5,000 people sought admission to the Carnival, and many hundreds had to be turned away. There were also horse races at Moosepath Park. The Carnival was such a success that probably there will be another next year on a more elaborate scale.

Toronto Tidings.

Toronto, Feb. 27.

One hundred and fifteen settlers left here last night for Manitoba, where they will take up land. The majority are from Essex County.

Father Chiquiquy is lecturing here against the Jesuits and Roman Catholic Church. A. J. Catanach, a leading lawyer and prominent Liberal, writes to the Globe in favor of Imperial Federation.

Twenty-five Protestant lady boarders have left Notre Dame Institute, Bond street. Enquiry has elicited from them the statement that they left on account of the efforts of the nuns to proselytize a young Protestant girl named Dods. On Sunday night, they allege that the nuns attempted to force the girl to prayers, but, by pre-arrangement, she cried out, and the Protestant ladies rushed to her rescue.

Through a Bridge.

OUR JUDICIARY.

A RIDICULOUS REPORT.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.

Islanders up here were considerably amused to-day on reading the Ottawa despatch to last Saturday's Patriot, wherein Mr. E. J. Hodgson is reported to be here urging his claim to a seat on the bench, supported by Mr. Ferguson, who opposes Mr. Sullivan's elevation.

There is not a spark of truth in the concoction, which is rendered more ridiculous by the fact that Mr. Hodgson did not meet Mr. Ferguson, who had left Ottawa before the former had arrived.

Not only are no vacancies anticipated on the Island bench, probably for many years except by interposition of Providence, but Mr. Hodgson assures me his mission is partly on business with the Department of Marine, and partly on business of his clients, which may yet take him as far as Kingston.

The gaudiness of the Patriot's Ottawa special is painful, and its domestic source apparent among those who take an interest in Island matters.

There is a good deal of speculation as to what Laird means, first by his attack on the Judges, and now by assuming their speedy death or resignation.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

Ottawa, Feb. 27.

The Speaker took the chair at three o'clock.

The following bills were introduced and read a first time: An Act incorporating the Winnipeg and Northern Pacific Railway; an Act incorporating the Ontario, Manitoba and Western Railway Company, and an Act to extend the provisions of the Extradition Act.

In answer to Mr. Edgar, Hon. McK. Bowell said the first payment of interest upon the fifteen million dollars of Canadian Pacific Railway bonds authorized in 1888, fell due on the first of January. The amount, \$267,500 was all paid by the company, the Government not being called upon to pay any sum upon the guarantee.

After recess, several private bills were read a third time and passed, amongst these being the act respecting the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Railway Company.

The House went into committee on Mr. Brown's Bill to prohibit pigeon shooting from traps.

Col. Tisdale opposed the bill and moved that the committee rise without reporting. Carried 68 to 67.

NOTES.

House adjourned at 10.40 p. m. Another delegation of Ontario millers struck town to-day, and will remain until after the budget is delivered, circulating petitions among members in favor of increasing the duty on flour.

A joint committee of both Houses will be appointed to consider the best means of reducing the expenditure incurred in legislation.

A suggestion has been made to amalgamate the Senate and Commons law journal records and translation of departments.

Captain Warren, owner of the fishing vessel seized at Behring Sea two years ago had to assign, owing to the losses sustained by the outrageous conduct of the United States Government.

The Labor Committee terminated its labors to-day and presented two reports to the Government. They will be presented to Parliament next week.

PARNELL COMMISSION.

The "Times" Withdrawal.

PARNELL ON THE STAND.

PIGOTT TO BE EXTRADITED.

Opinions of the Press.

London, Feb. 27.

In the Parnell Commission this morning, on the opening of the court, Sir Richard Webster read a statement on the part of the Times announcing complete withdrawal from the enquiry of the evidence relating to Parnell and other letters, and expressing regret of the Times that it ever published them.

Sir Charles Russell expressed a desire to investigate the conduct of Houston and the conspiracy behind him.

Judge Hannen suggested in reply that Sir Charles place his clients in the witness box and consider what action to take concerning Houston.

In accordance with this suggestion Mr. Parnell was called as a witness. His appearance in the box caused a stir in the crowded court room and every eye was fixed upon him. Mr. Parnell, in quiet but firm tones, denied that the signature appended to the letter of May 15th was his, nor did he know by whom the body of the letter was written.

In reply to a general question by Sir Charles Mr. Parnell announced that all the letters attributed to him were forgeries and declared that those with Egan's name attached were equally spurious.

The court thereupon adjourned until Friday to allow the presence of Campbell, Parnell's Secretary.

In the House of Commons to-day, Right Hon. Henry Matthews, Secretary of State for home affairs, stated that the authorities were taking steps to secure the extradition of Pigott from Paris.

Mr. Matthews also said he had no information regarding Houston which at present would justify him in preventing Houston from leaving the country.

The Opposition will not raise a formal discussion in Parliament on the Parnell Commission, but the Nationalists will closely question the Government regarding the assistance given by the authorities to the Times.

LONDON, Feb. 27.

The Daily Telegraph considers the work of the commission ended. The result must seriously affect the political situation. The Standard says the Times' case is completely overthrown, and the managers of the journal are answerable for a great breach of public duty in trumping up charges against Parnell.

The Times to-day in its leading editorial quotes in full the apology tendered by Attorney-General Webster before the Parnell Commission for the publication of the forged letters, and continues: "We desire to endorse as appropriate, every word of the foregoing statements. Parnell having in the witness box stated the letters to be forgeries, we accept in every respect the truth of the statement and express our regret most fully and sincerely at having been induced to publish the letters as Parnell's or use them in evidence against him. This expression of regret includes also the letters falsely attributed to Egan, Davitt and O'Kelly. This withdrawal, of course, refers exclusively to letters obtained from Pigott."
