

Jrs. Edge Intermediates 6-5 In Exhibition Game

The Junior Abbies won their third consecutive exhibition baseball game of the young season last night as they edged the Intermediate Abbies 6-5 in a well played game under the lights at Memorial Field.

The Juniors collected five runs in the fifth inning to build up a 6-3 lead and then snuffed out an Intermediate rally in the seventh and final inning to preserve the victory.

Two singles, a walk, a hit batter and an error provided the Juniors with their five runs in the fifth frame. Kenny MacDonald opened the inning with a single and Duck MacLeod closed the assault scoring two runs on a single into centrefield.

The Intermediates rallied in the seventh inning as two men were out. Jack "Spy" Ready drew a walk and consecutive singles by Charlie Kennedy, Gus Flynn and Phil Murphy accounted for two Intermediate runs to make the score 6-5.

Donnie MacLean started on the mound for the Intermediates and gave up one hit in the first four innings. The hit was a home run by Don "Duck" MacLeod over the right field fence. MacLeod won the first Henderson and Cudmore shirt of the year for his belt.

MacLean struck out five batters during his turn on the mound and did not issue a walk. He was succeeded by Gus Gustavson in the fifth but it wasn't Gustavson's night although the big fellow only allowed one single. He had trouble with his control and left the game in favor of Jack "Spy" Ready.

Ready gave up one hit, struck out three and walked one. Vernon Handrahan pitched the first four innings for the Juniors and turned in another good performance. He was charged with one run, gave up three singles and struck out five. For the second game in a row he didn't issue a walk.

Lorne MacDougall took over in the fifth and earned the victory. He gave up two runs in the fifth inning and two in the seventh while allowing the Intermediates five singles. He struck out three and walked one.

Duck MacLeod led the Juniors with two hits, a home run and a

single. Charlie Kennedy and Gus Flynn both had two hits for the Intermediates.

Kenny MacDonald played a strong defensive game for the Juniors making a nice catch off Pineau in the fifth.

The game was handled by Charlie Ryan with Glen Matheson on the bases.

Savoie Scores 4th Round TKO Over Howard

HALIFAX (CP)—Montreal lightweight Armand Savoie scored a technical knockout over Dick (Kid) Howard of Halifax at 1:33 of the fourth round of an exhibition match before 7,000 spectators here Tuesday night.

Howard was leading on points on most score sheets going into the fourth, but Savoie seemed to be studying him from the first.

They were hardly out from the corners in the fourth when the thin-faced Savoie rammed Howard with a right that didn't travel more than six-inches. Howard fell and took a count of six.

Howard got up to meet a right cross that sent him sprawling for the count of nine. He got up again, clinched and held on but Savoie pulled himself clear and drove him into the ropes, then dropped him with another right. The referee then raised Savoie's hand without bothering to count.

Howard weighed in at 139, Savoie at 138.

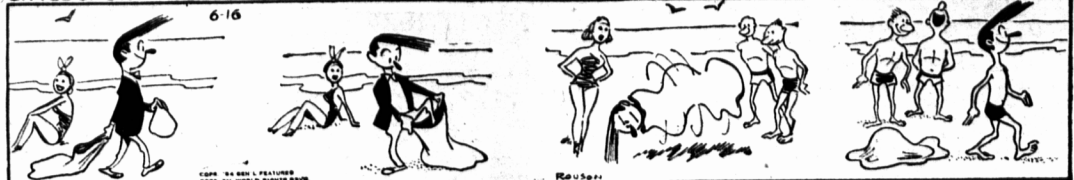

Although its far from winter and thoughts of hockey a picture and a story in an old 1935 newspaper which by chance has crossed our desk has caused us to devote a little more space to hockey in this baseball month of June.

The hockey story and picture depicted the players and feats of the 1935 Midget Rangers. Many of the players and their coach, Johnny Williams are living in the City and might be interested to recall what was said about their outstanding feats.

The lead in the story deals with some apparent travesty of justice by the C.A.H.A. and gives the impression that the Midget Rangers suffered considerably from a C.A.H.A. ruling. The second paragraph reads: "Rangers' first went to Amherst where they startled the fans with their clockwork plays, trimming the home team 6-2. Next day they over-ran an all-star Amherst crew 8-2. In the return game Rangers repeated over Amherst 8-3 before 1200 Charlottetown people who were amazed at ability to turn complicated passing plays into goals."

"Pleased beyond words hundreds of hockey lovers subscribed to the opinion that the future of the game hereabouts is in safe hands and next year several well known business men will equip midget teams. The convincing demonstration of brilliant hockey given by the Rangers in fact had a most exhilarating effect on the public and accomplished more missionary work for the good of the pastime than was ever foreseen."

"No team, senior, intermediate or junior appearing here this winter, showed more polish or general ability than this great little organization in overwhelming Amherst. At the end of the game Lt. Gov. DeBlois presented the Midgets with a cup which he had donated for the series. Led by Johnny Williams, their ver-capable coach, who handled them for three years, Rangers will step into junior ranks next year. All of them are under sixteen years and it will be a long step but they feel confident of going places as juniors in a few years."

Poulton Gets Middleweight Title Chance

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Sanction for a June 29 Canadian middleweight championship fight between Montreal's Charlie Chase and Harry (Kid) Poulton of Charlottetown has been granted by the Canadian Boxing and Wrestling Federation, the Saint John Boxing and Wrestling Commission announced Tuesday night. The bout will be staged here.

The middleweight title has been vacant for nearly six months. It was last held by Yvo Durelle of Bale Ste. Anne, N.B., who outgrew the class and moved into light heavyweight ranks.

In granting the sanction, the CBWF said the winner must meet Lou Lawrence of Vancouver or another suitable opponent within 30 days.

Charters For Pari-Mutuels

OTTAWA, (CP)—Racing associations operating pari-mutuel betting will have to obtain charters in every province in which they hold race meetings.

The Commons Tuesday passed a change to the Criminal Code which will have that effect. The bill, already approved by the Senate, goes into effect when given royal assent.

Agriculture Minister Gardiner, such department supervises pari-mutuel betting said there have been a great number of instances which require a ban on such race associations incorporated in one province operating betting in another province without a charter.

Such a situation had arisen in British Columbia and on one or two occasions in Saskatchewan.

PHILADELPHIA, (AP)—Philadelphia Phillies sold pitcher Karl Drews to Cincinnati Redlegs on Tuesday for an undisclosed amount of cash.

The 33-year-old right-hander has a 1-0 record for the season, but as was true last season, he hasn't shown the form he once displayed as a stalwart of the Phil's pitching staff.

Club officials said the Phil's weekend acquisition of pitcher Herm Wehmeier from Cincinnati was not related to the Drews transaction.

Marciano Solid Choice To Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Rocky Marciano remained a solid 12-to-1 favorite to beat back ex-champ Ezzard Charles' bid for his heavyweight boxing title Thursday night as the big fight began to "catch on."

Promoter Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, said Tuesday \$300,000 worth of tickets had been sold. He predicted a house of \$500,000 or more at Yankee stadium with a break from the weather.

The weather man held the key to the success of the entire venture. If the fight has to be pushed back, it must be delayed a full week until Thursday, June 24 owing to a conflict with night ball games Tuesday and Friday and lack of coaxial cable facilities for theatre television on Monday.

The bout will not be seen on home TV although it will be carried on network radio (ABC) Sixty-one theatres in 45 U.S. cities will be hooked up on theatre TV.

Hank Sauer Belting Homers

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Big Hank Sauer, 35-year-old veteran outfielder of Chicago Cubs, is back in the home run clouting business and that spells bad news for all National League pitchers—especially Pittsburgh Pirate hurlers.

Hank took it easy Tuesday as the schedule gave the Cubs and Pirates an off day. But he was still thinking of the home run which gave the Cubs a 6-5 victory over the celler-dwelling Buccs in the opener of a three-game series last night.
